Chairman's letter

The Four Questions

Many of us recently enjoyed the annual Passover rite of asking the four questions. As we close our annual campaign, prepare for our allocations meeting, and continue producing the programs and services of Federation, another set of four questions comes to mind. These are the four questions that legendary Harvard Business School Professor of Entrepreneurial Management and fundraiser Howard Stevenson suggests any philanthropic organization should be prepared to answer to its donors and constituents.

- Are you doing important work?
- Are you well-managed?
- Will my gift make a difference?
- Will the experience be satisfying to me?

So here's my perspective.

Are we doing important work? Our mission is "to unite the local Jewish community to sustain and strengthen Jews locally, in Israel, and around the world." This is the work of repairing the world, of maintaining the continuity of our people, of caring for our sisters and brothers in need. What work could be more important? If we do not do it, who will?

Are we well-managed? We have a capable and dedicated professional staff headed by an accomplished executive who has successfully led our community on both the lay and professional side. In my time on JFGR's Board, I have seen us to be careful stewards of our community's resources, always raising funds before committing (allocating) them, running a balanced budget every year, keeping our fixed costs low, and combining community resources (e.g. moving our offices to Ahavas Israel, funding a community school) where it is efficient and sensible to do so. And I have seen us striving to promote our values of collaboration among the Jewish organizations in the community, Jewish connectedness and continuity, and *tzedakah* and *tikkun olam*.

Will my gift make a difference? We are a small Jewish community. Our ability to take care of Jews here in Grand Rapids and outside depends almost entirely on what *we* do and what *we* give. We do not raise money from Jews outside the community, and we do not raise money from non-Jews in West Michigan. In addition to our gifts; our energy, our participation, our talents, and our leadership contributions make a difference to the people we serve. Whether you can give \$18 or thousands, your gift makes a difference; whether you can contribute an hour of time or hours every week, your efforts make a difference. If you would like to see the direct connection between what we raise and whom we help—and the difference that every dollar makes—I encourage you to attend our allocations meeting, which is open to everyone, in May.

Will the experience be a satisfying one? Giving and participating in JFGR have enabled me to meet great people in the Jewish community here in West Michigan, to learn more about our people and the wider Jewish world, and to participate in the mitzvot of *tzedakah* and *tikkun olam*—through contributions and through hands-on participation. Leaving home for meetings or Federation-related trips, while difficult, has provided opportunities to teach our children these values by example. Being involved on the JFGR Board has been a leadership learning experience, one that has helped me in other areas of my life. Ultimately, this work is fulfilling, almost transcendent, in a way unmatched by almost any other work I do outside of our family. Will you find it equally satisfying? If you're not yet involved to the extent you wish to be, there's one way to find out.

Finally, to all of you who have given in this year's campaign, I want—on behalf of Jews here in West Michigan, in Israel, and around the world—to thank you. I hope the experience has been satisfying to you, and I would appreciate hearing your thoughts on how JFGR could make it more so.

Executive Director's Letter

May 2012



Dear Friends,

Ok, I know I'm no film critic. That said, I'd like to tell you about this year's exciting lineup for the *2012 Jewish Film Festival of Grand Rapids*, now in its 14th year.

Our Film Festival Committee has done a fantastic job, and let me take this opportunity to thank them for their passion and dedication to this marvelous program on our community's cultural calendar. This year's movie selections include two dramas, two documentaries, a comedy and an award winning, family friendly film that kicks off the series on Sunday afternoon, April 29 (a complete description of the films, along with time and cost details and other information, including regarding the two dinner events during the Festival, can be found inside this *Shofar*). My wife Carol and I were able to screen three of the films, and in different ways they each moved us. We found them to be of the highest quality.

One film I'd particularly like to bring to your attention is the movie *Torn*, which will be shown on Wednesday evening, May 2, following our community dinner held at the Celebration! Cinema North theater. As I've written in these pages previously, this year Grand Rapids is celebrating the *2012 Year of Interfaith Understanding*, our community's uplifting response to the horrific events of 9/11, ten years prior to Grand Rapids Mayor George Heartwell's declaration of this greater community-wide effort. *Torn* is an especially appropriate film and event for the *2012 Year of Interfaith Understanding*.

It is the story of a Catholic priest who discovers he was a hidden child of the Holocaust. He recounts how he learns the truth about his background, and how he goes about trying to reconcile his past and present. Only 75 minutes in length, it will be one of the most emotionally riveting 1 ¼ hours you will ever spend in a movie theater. In addition, Sari Cohen, our programming director and driving force over many years for the Film Festival, was able to find and is bringing to Grand Rapids a Holocaust survivor from Chicago to speak following the film about her own experiences as a hidden child.

If you choose to come and watch *Torn*, or any other night from April 29 to May 3, I believe you will find it to be a worthwhile use of your time. And please, tell your family and friends to join you!

As we conclude our 2011-12 fundraising campaign, I'd like to thank you for your generosity and support of our community. As Greg writes elsewhere in this month's newsletter, the opportunity to give back to our Jewish community, here in Grand Rapids and around the world, is a life fulfilling experience. *Tzedakah* is a core value of the Jewish people, and your willingness to live that value by donating to your Jewish community is much appreciated



Based at Congregation Ahavas Israel, Corners of the Field Community Garden is a grass-roots gardening group working to provide fresh food for needy residents of Grand Rapids. Members of Temple Emanuel, Ahavas Israel, and All Souls Church till soil, plant crops, maintain the garden and deliver produce. Currently in its third year, "Corners" has organized deliveries of fresh grown produce to Temple Emanuel's Food Bank and Catholic Ministries God's Kitchen in downtown Grand Rapids. Deliveries of peppers, potatoes, tomatoes, zucchini and herbs were made several times during the 2010 and 2011 growing seasons.

This year, we intend to step up production by improving the infrastructure, creating crop teams, and engaging more community members than ever.
