How To Vote by Mail

Every NC registered voter can request an absentee mail-in ballot up until October 27th. These ballots must be postmarked by 5 pm on November 3rd and received by November 6th.

Please Note, your mail in ballot must be signed by you and a witness. Also, If you decide to vote in person after mailing your ballot, you must contact your county board of elections to cancel your mail-in ballot.

How To Vote Early In Person

Every NC registered voter can vote in person and/or access one stop voter registration at approved locations, from October 15th-31st.

- You may return your absentee ballot to an Early Voting Location.

How To Vote in Person on November 3rd

How To Vote by Mail

Every SC registered voter may request an “**in-person absentee ballot**” or a “**mail-in absentee ballot**” application under the “**State of Emergency**” stipulation. Applications for mail-in ballots must be received by your voter registration office by October 24th, or, dropped off by an authorized representative by October 30th. All mail-in ballots must be received by November 3rd.

- Your ballot must be mailed to or dropped off at your designated voter registration office.

Please Note, your mail in ballot must be signed by you and a witness. Also, If you decide to vote in person after mailing your ballot, you must contact your county board of elections to cancel your mail-in ballot.

How To Complete In-Person Absentee Voting

Every SC registered voter can vote in-person from October 5th-November 2nd. You must have voter identification with you.
