FIGHTING ANTISEMITISM



The <u>Jewish Community Relations Committee</u> (JCRC) is the Richmond Jewish Community's primary convener and consensus-builder, community relations voice, and policy advocate.

Our focus is to speak out and build partnerships to combat hate and prejudice.

The JCRC tackles critical issues in common cause with diverse coalitions and partners.

JCRC is comprised of four outreach areas and subcommittees:

- Government and Legislative Affairs
- Israel Education and Advocacy
- Intergroup and Interfaith Outreach
- Education
- ✓ May 2023 Through JCRC's work, Virginia Governor Glenn Youngkin signed historic legislation adopting the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance's working definition of antisemitism into Virginia law.
- February 2023 Attorney General Jason Miyares announced the creation of Antisemitism Task Force.
 - The Task Force is in response to the recommendation of the <u>Governor's Commission to combat</u>
 <u>Antisemitism</u> report issued in December 2022
 - The Task Force's mission centers around four strategies: monitoring, information-gathering, educating, and investigating instances of Antisemitism in the Commonwealth.
 - This state Task Force is the first of its kind in the United States.
 - June 2023 JCFR CEO Daniel Staffenberg was selected as an initial member.
- ✓ November 2022 At the Federation's request, Richmond Mayor Levar Stoney participates in Mayors Antisemitism Summit along with the Richmond JCRC representatives resulting in Richmond recognizing Jewish American Heritage Month

SECURING THE COMMUNITY

- For the past three years, The Jewish Community Federation of Richmond has partnered with Secure Community Network (SCN) and the Jewish Federation of the Virginia Peninsula to strengthen our community's safety, security, and preparedness.
- ✓ SCN is the official safety and security organization of the Jewish community in North America.
- Dave Brackins, our Regional Security Advisor, serves each of our agencies and synagogues and is a key resource and liaison for the Jewish and general community
- \checkmark Since the launch of the program, 1,417 Individuals have received one or more Security Training.
- Federation's investment of \$225,000 over the past 2 years has resulted in over \$3.1 million in grants to Greater Richmond synagogues and agencies.
- Over the past 12 months:
 - Engaged with almost every local agency and Synagogues to provide training.
 - Met with 53 different agencies, synagogues, and government agencies.
 - 556 security meetings with Jewish agencies, places of worship, government agencies, and colleagues.
 - 46 different trainings

DIGNITY GROWS

A national program run locally by the Jewish Community Federation of Richmond

- ✓ Period Poverty affects 1 in 3 women.
- ✓ Dignity Grows is the national leader in addressing Period Poverty through action-forward volunteerism and community engagement.
- Federation sees Dignity Grows as a community program connecting Jews and the general community for good. Dignity Grows builds bridges across the community, assisting the fight against antisemitism and all forms of hate, and fostering relationships with other local social service agencies.
- ✓ To date, our local chapter of Dignity Grows has:
 - Activated, educated, and inspired 193 volunteers have been activated, educated, and inspired, together giving over 780 hours of time.
 - (2,475) tote bags distributed! Impacting 100s of lives locally.
 - \$130,000 Raised through JCFR, all outside of annual campaign dollars.
- ✓ Distribution partners include: YMCA at Shady Grove, Safe Harbor, RC Longan Elementary School, Jewish Family Services, the KBI Food Cooperative, and Bon Secours Violence Intervention Program.
