In an effort to increase sensitivity in our pluralistic society and to avoid scheduling conflicts that might impact local Jewish community members, the Jewish Federation has created this eight-year calendar of Jewish Holy Days. We hope it will provide you with guidance when scheduling dates. Some Jewish Holy Days are marked by two-day observances and **all holidays begin at sundown the night BEFORE the date listed.**

The following holidays are not listed within the calendar because their observance does not include possible absence from school or work:

Purim

Typically February or March
A joyous festival based on the story in the Book of Esther.

Yom Hashoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day)

Typically April or May
A day set aside by the Jewish people to commemorate the Holocaust of the six million Jews who died at the hands of the Nazis, before and during World War II.

Yom Ha'atzmaut (Israel's Independence Day)

Typically April or May
The Declaration of the State of Israel is celebrated each year as Israel Independence Day.

Tisha B'Av

Typically July or August
This fast day commemorates the destruction of the Temple of Jerusalem.
