Empowering Our Children with Books and Values for a Great School Year

Do any other parents feel that the kids going back to school is a reprieve from the craziness of the summer? A return to order, to routine, to the known. No, just me then?

This summer has been a doozy – I say writing from the first week of July. I have color-coded calendars telling me which child needs to be in which city for which camp from which hours with what in their backpacks. Child #2 will have lost most of his belongings by the end of the day.

But school – school means dropping both kids off in the same location every day. I don't need to worry about packing lunches or sunscreen or bathing suits. I suppose I still need to pay attention to whether child #2 was wearing shoes when he left the house. And he's still going to lose everything by the end of the day. C'est la vie.

Scar from Disney's *Lion King* starts hauntingly singing "Be Prepared" in the back of my mind. Fortunately, PJ Library's ready with "Be Prepared: A Back-

to-School Guide" (see QR code). I re-read this guide every year for great tips about talking to kids about back-to-school anxieties,



getting organized, prepping a homework station, and lunch and snack ideas. For example, sandwich kabobs: who wouldn't like a skewer of bread, cheese, and cherry tomatoes?

If you're sending your littles off to school for the first time, I highly recommend PJ Library books Sammy Spider's First Day of School by Sylvia Rouss or Avi the Ambulance Goes to School by Claudia Carlson. For kids aged 5-8 check out A Sack Full of Feathers by Debby Waldman, The Adventures of Rabbi Harvey by Steve Sheinkin, or The Art Lesson: A Shavuot Story by Allison

and Wayne Marks – all books that feature interesting role models, unexpected lessons, and interesting and wonderful teachers. And of course, there's *No Rules for Michael* by Sylvia Rouss (recommended for kids aged 3-4) featuring a preschool classroom that offers "a day without rules".

For PJ Our Way kids [9-13 - Not signed up? Go to PJOurWay.org or email me!], try How to Survive Middle School by Donna Gephart. PJ Our Way also has wonderful books about starting a new school (Mister Lister by Judith Pransky or Too Far From Home by Naomi Shmuel) and about fitting in (The Kindness Club: Chloe on the Bright Side by Courtney Sheinmel or Understanding Buddy by Marc Kornblatt). More of a podcast person? If you're listening to PJ Library's "Have I Got a Story For You" (and you really should be), look for episode 026: The Donkey and the Garden - all about how Rabbi Akiva's clever wife Rachel teaches him not to let anything stand in the way of learning.

Learning from everyone – *lomed mikol adam* – is one of the Jewish values that's been on my mind. I grew up knowing that Judaism values education and that my family encouraged discussion and debate. It's difficult as a parent when your kids start to have their own thoughts and beliefs that aren't in keeping with your own. But it's also very exciting.

The school year is a journey and I know my children will be different people

in the spring. We send them off with the values of *ometz* (courage), *sakranut* (curiosity), *chidush* (innovation), *da'at* (knowledge) and *ga'avah* (pride), and

hopefully a little *achrayut* (responsibility). I know they'll face challenges, and I hope we've equipped them well. Here's to a wonderful school year!

Your Federation at Work

Seeking Out Community in the Granite State: Spotlight on the Jewish Federation of New Hampshire

New Hampshire's stark granite mountains and quaint towns are some of the most picturesque parts of New England. For those who live nestled amidst this stunning natural beauty, connecting to their Jewish identity is an active choice they must make.

"Being Jewish in New Hampshire means you have to work hard to be Jewish because it really takes effort," explained Allyson Guertin, the executive director of the Jewish Federation of New Hampshire. Allyson grew up and is raising her family in New Hampshire, so she knows the challenges firsthand. "Nothing is handed to you — you really need to seek out opportunities to find a Jewish community," she said.

That's why when Jewish Federation of New Hampshire board member Tracy Richmond brought up the idea of the Federation becoming a Momentum Partner Organization, the board jumped on it right away.

"Momentum offered the opportunity to enhance and encourage relationships within the Jewish community, and with Israel at the same time," explained Allyson. "We're really focused on programming for parents because being a parent can be a lonely and isolating experience as it is, and trying to be a Jewish parent in a place like New Hampshire can be even more alienating." There are about 10,000 Jewish people in the state of 1.3 million people, with 15 synagogues scattered across the state.

No matter the distance

Tracy and Allyson were the Community Leaders for the first Momentum cohort from New Hampshire in 2022, and another cohort recently returned. "We've just hit our 12-month mark with the first group of women, and I have seen firsthand how committed these moms are to each other, to a deeper Jewish family life, and to the local Jewish community," she said.

Four moms from the trip now serve as board members for the Federation, and many have started new family traditions like lighting Shabbat candles or encouraging their daughters to celebrate their Bat Mitzvahs.

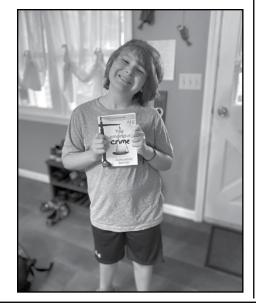

meetings after the trip sometimes drive over an hour each way to participate.

"I think this speaks to how important the Momentum experience is in New Hampshire, and how much they're looking for this type of connection."

A life-changing trip for moms – and soon, dads

Momentum has inspired so much interest across the state that it's been a useful tool to spread the word about other Federation programs, Allyson added. A local dad reached out about organizing a MoMENtum Men's Trip, but Allyson wasn't sure it would garner enough interest – until more fathers shared that they, too, would love to go. With buy-in from eight dads and growing, Allyson and her team are now planning a MoMENtum Men's Trip for 2024.

That first trip was life-changing for Allyson, who had never been to Israel before. "I remember the first night when all the moms were dancing and embracing each other," she recalled. "It was this moment where people decided to take down their walls, leave their insecurities behind, and wrap their arms around one another."

"Watching these women walk into the Old City and see the Western Wall, or receive Jewish names for the first time, and build this connection to Israel was incredible," Allyson said. "But at the same time, they were building this even greater connection to Jewish life. One of the biggest things to come out of this trip is that we've created an opportunity for seven lifelong Jewish mom friends. And in a state like New Hampshire, to be able to say you have seven Jewish mom friends is such an accomplishment."

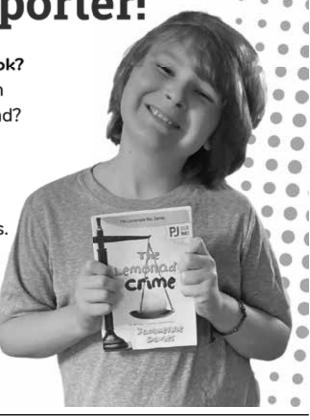

You can join us in person at the Jewish Federation Program Room on Tuesday, August 22 at 2:00 PM for a screening of the film, followed by a post-film discussion at 4:30. Popcorn and drinks will be provided. Registration is \$5 per person.

For folks who cannot make the screening, you are able to join the

discussion free of charge through Zoom on August 22. The film can be viewed on your own time at home in advance of August 22. It is currently free to stream on Max and available to rent on Hulu, Amazon Prime, and Apple TV.

This program will be a "soft launch" for what we envision to be a year-round movie club beginning in 2024. Once a season, we hope to show a Jewish-themed film either in person at locations throughout the state, in a hybrid format much like the Yentl program, or virtually and from the

For those not familiar with Yentl, it tells the story of a single father

who teaches the Talmud to boys in his small Polish town while also instructing his daughter, Yentl, despite the fact that girls are not allowed to study scripture. After her father's death, Yentl assumes a male identity, enrolls in a yeshiva, and falls in love along the way.

A musical, drama, and romance all wrapped into one, the movie was an enormous success in 1983, winning two Golden Globes, an Academy Award, and major praise for Streisand, who also co-wrote the screenplay and directed the film. Streisand became the first female director to win a Golden Globe, which has since happened on only two occasions. Co-starring Mandy Patinkin, Amy Irving, and the legendary Nehemiah Persoff, this is sure to be a delightful walk down memory lane for everyone.

Kadimah – Moving forward in Jewish learning!

Temple Beth Jacob is an old but beautiful building that houses a Reform Jewish community. The synagogue has an engaging Religious School that offers active learning to children in kindergarten through 7th grade, the B-Mitzvah year. Our students are taught by highly skilled teachers who are assisted by our teens in the role of *madrichimlmadrichot*.

There is so much energy in the school! Our students learn Hebrew beginning with the letters of the Alef Bet in K/1 and then learning to read in 2nd grade. From there, they apply their Hebrew skills to mastering *tefillot* (prayers). The other major part of our curriculum is Judaica where our students learn about Jewish holidays, how to Be a Mensch, and Torah stories; in the 7th grade, they learn about the Holocaust, Israel and Jews in History. Our school's foundation rests on Jewish values such as *rachamim* (compassion), *chesed* (loving kindness), and *tikkun olam*

(repairing the world). These are just three of fifteen values that are addressed in every class, including Hebrew.

Along with all they learn, our students enjoy singing with Cantor Shira, leading Shabbat services, Chanukah and Purim festivals, and ending the year with a sundae Sunday!

If your child is not yet old enough for Kadimah or is past the B-Mitzvah age, we offer a monthly pre-k program and a twice-monthly 8th – 12th grade program called Gesher. Gesher meets at noon two Sundays a month. Past topics have included: Comparative Religion, Comparative Judaism (the different denominations/expressions of Judaism), Holocaust Studies, Judaism in Art, Judaism on Death and Dying and Judaism and Sexuality.

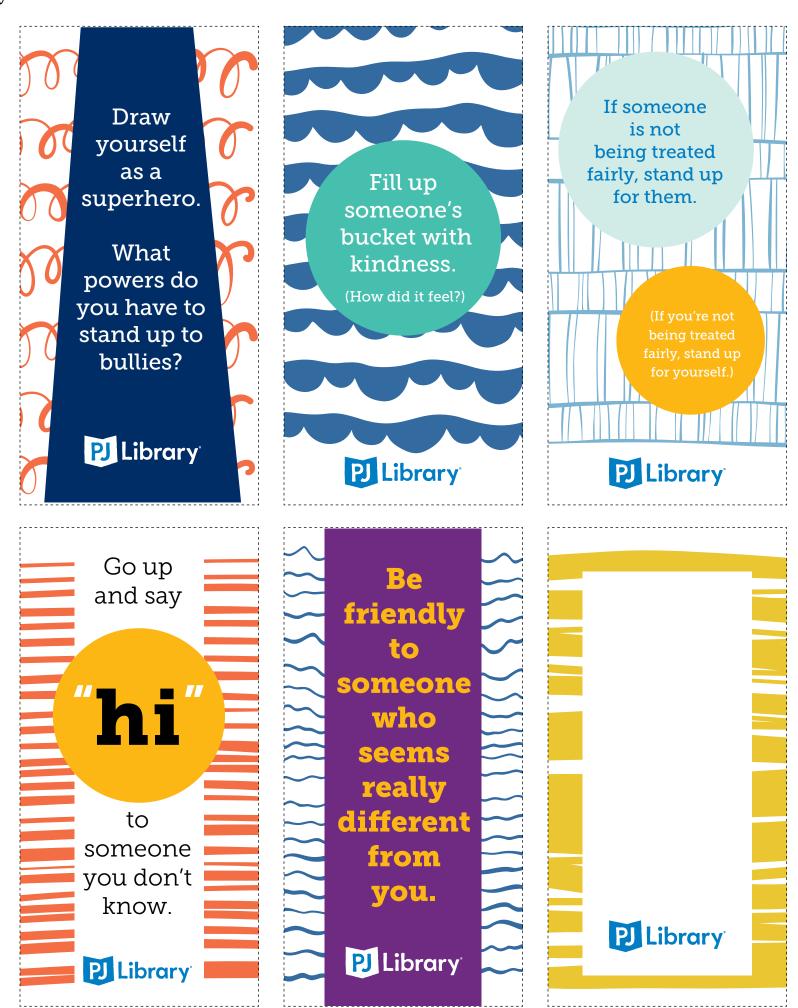

Temple Beth Abraham Celebrates Pride

On June 9th and 10th, Temple Beth Abraham in Nashua celebrated their third annual Pride Shabbat to celebrate the lives and contributions of Queer Jews. Members of the Tzedek Committee led a Kabbalat Shabbat service with prayers, songs, and reflections written by LGBTQ+ Jews. The committee also hosted a panel discussion on Shabbat afternoon about the intersection of Trans and Jewish identities. "I *love* being Jewish and I *love* being Trans," said panelist Ozzy Gold-Shapiro, to a round of snaps and claps from the crowd.

Panelists discussed their lived experience and how they see themselves reflected in Jewish history and in sacred texts, referring to the teaching of *b'tzelem Elohim*, "in the divine image" and the 8 genders recognized in Talmud, 6 of which describe genders which we might today call trans and non-binary. Audience members were able to ask questions which sparked an excellent discussion about binaries and the places they show up in our world in ways that are helpful and in ways that are limiting. In other words, while we read in Torah that Hashem created 'day' and 'night', we also know that twilight exists.

TBA consulted with Keshet, a national

non-profit organization that works for the full equality of all LGBTQ+ Jews in Jewish life, to plan the month-long celebration. In addition to Pride Shabbat, the Tzedek Committee at TBA sponsored the Nashua Pride Festival, marched in the Pride Parade, and held a community-wide training on LGBTQ+ belonging and how to create inclusive Jewish spaces. The training was developed and led by Keshet's team of educators and trainers.

Rabbi Jon Spira-Savett reflects, "I'm so proud that community members have taken the initiative to make our Pride Shabbat into a Jewish month of Pride. For me, having queer voices in our Jewish community and in prayer doesn't stop with welcoming and inclusion. The panelists told us stories about what it means to be committed to Jewish community that has new layers. Even the words I have been singing for years in prayers have new layers of meaning when I listen to LGBTQ+ composers and teachers explore them and unlock them."

The TBA Tzedek Committee's mission is to provide opportunities for learning, dialogue, and action on social justice issues, through a Jewish lens, in order to fulfill the *mitzvah* of *tikkun olam* - "repairing the world." In the Community The 26th Annual NH Jewish Food Festival Sets Yet Another Record!

The 2023 Temple B'nai Israel (TBI) New Hampshire Jewish Food Festival exceeded expectations yet again with an 8% increase in orders over last year. At the conclusion of last year's NH Jewish Food Festival, Stu Needleman, Food Festival Committee Chair, wrote, "The 2022 Food Festival went into the record books, at least until 2023, when we will try to beat our 2022 numbers. I think we will need a few more freezers and to start the cooking tomorrow to achieve that goal." Little did he know how prophetic those words would be. This year, Stu Needleman credited the addition of new cooling and freezing equipment- paid for by generous donations from the congregation - and changes to the food storage area that "improved efficiency of the cooking and baking and allowed for increased

productivity to achieve the tall task of producing hundreds of pounds of handmade product with a small group of volunteers." According to Susan Needleman, co-chair of the volunteer cooking teams, "It was great not having to schlep up and down the stairs carrying trays of food," with

the implementation of the new refrigeration room that is adjacent to the kitchen.

The continued achievement of the NH Jewish Food Festival does not come about without a great deal of hard work and long hours by the entire Food Festival team which is made up of volunteers; the men and women who are members of Temple B'nai Israel. The cooking operations are co-chaired by



Susan Needleman and Rhoda Goodman who credit the "tireless Cooking Team Leaders and cooking volunteers...we couldn't make it up the hill to another successful food festival without you!"

While the cooking teams were hard at work, the

operations team was busy improving the online menu presentation so that customers would find it easier to order, a new appointment scheduling system was implemented for order pickup, and a new picking system was developed to ease the labor required to retrieve products from their storage locations on pickup days. Initial reports indicate that customers were pleased with the newest innovations.

The entire team made a unanimous

decision, before items were priced on the website, to hold prices to 2022 levels, despite the increased cost of ingredients and supplies. The team felt it was the right thing to do given the current difficult economic times. They wanted as many people as possible to enjoy the home-made foods even if the Temple made less money.

Kunstlers in Paradise by Cathleen Schine

Cathleen Schine takes the Covid pandemic head on in her new book, *Kunstlers in Paradise*. A trip down memory lane for many of us who during the early days of the Covid pandemic either spent time with family we don't usually get to live with or possibly ended up spending time somewhere we had not expected to be for longer than was the original plan.

That is how Julian Kunstler, the twentysomething grandson, ends up living with his grandmother, Salomea Kunstler, known to family as Mamie. Julian has suffered a severe blow when his girlfriend breaks up with him, his best friend and roommate decides to go to law school and leaves their shared apartment and the bookstore he has been working in closes its doors.

He is lost. His parents do not want him moving back in with them. He has no career ambition or direction.

When his grandmother Mamie breaks her wrist and needs a little assistance, Julian travels from New York City to Los Angeles to help. He moves into Mamie's guest house at her Venice beach bungalow. Thinking this is a stopover while he tries to find himself, Covid changes everything. Now he is stuck living with his 93-year-old grandmother and Agatha, her live-in assistant. Though it is a wonderful way to be isolated during the pandemic, Julian feels guilty that he is not suffering as much as his parents and friends in New York.

To pass the time Mamie starts to share stories of her life. She reminisces about leaving what the Kunstler family remembers as paradise, their home in Vienna. In 1939, Hitler marched into the city. The family came to America and settled in Los Angeles. Mamie was a youngster and traveled with her mother, father and grandfather.

The book tries to compare the horrific trauma of Mamie and her family leaving Europe and settling in America, of being exiled to being unmoored during Covid. Leaving your home and not being able to return. Feeling guilty when you survive, and others do not. Mamie quotes Christopher Isherwood: "I am bitterly ashamed that I am here in safety."

Later Julian will also quote Isherwood when he meets Sophie, a fellow dog walker who lives across the street, as he walks his grandmother's dog. They meet daily to walk the dogs on opposite sides of the street, shouting to each other to converse. As they become friendlier, they meet on Sophie's lawn with masks and Julian shares the stories his grandmother is telling him.

As the story develops, we hear how Mamie and her family escaped Vienna and came to Venice, CA. How her mother found work in Hollywood. Mamie's father, a composer, was not as successful and found this new country difficult to navigate. Her grandfather was her closest friend when Mamie was a child; they strolled the beach together and talked to people they met. She talks about the movie stars they knew. Julian writes it all down and thinks he may write a play based on Mamie's story. He starts to enjoy hearing her remembrances about famous people like Greta Garbo, and the famous composer Arnold Schoenberg. Mamie went on to become a violinist.

In this crazy tapestry of family life, we see how a family left a life they thought was paradise until it was no longer a place of beauty, to go to a place that tries hard to be paradise. We see how people can make a place a paradise when they need to find happiness during a difficult time, finding themselves and creating a happy life during hardship.

Cookbook Review: Adenna Sussman's Shabbat: Recipes and Rituals From My Table to Yours

Adenna Sussman has written her second solo cookbook, *Shabbat: Recipes and Rituals From My Table to Yours.* Her first cookbook, *Sababa: Fresh, Sunny Flavors From My Israeli Kitchen,* is already a favorite with so many home cooks.

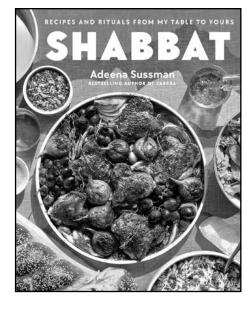
I have been cooking recipes for my guests from Adeena's first super successful cookbook, *Sababa*, for several years now. During the Covid lockdown I watched Adeena as she offered cooking demonstrations with a variety of outlets. Everything looks so simple when she is cooking and talking at the same time. Offering her experienced how-tos and suggestions on how to find the right ingredients, prepare the vegetables and how to spice each dish to taste.

Now Adeena is offering her followers recipes perfect for the Shabbat table. Shabbat is the day of rest and the perfect time for gathering with family and friends. Most Jewish holidays involve food. Shabbat is no exception. Sussman explains in her introduction to the book

that Shabbat or the weekend food in Israel is a special time, "special yet unbuttoned, lavish yet relaxed, and perfect for entertaining a crowd, no matter the size. Most of all, it's food with meaning, centered around a tradition with ancient roots and conceptualized around the ideas of rest, relaxation, and reflection, a focus that feels decidedly modern right now."

Though at one time in her life Sussman was not attached to celebrating Shabbat, she has come to realize the importance of the role of Shabbat in her current life. "It isn't lost on me that Shabbat is the north star of my kitchen identity; after all, it's been a central part of my whole life. But it took almost leaving Shabbat cooking behind to realize how much I actually needed this respite. Shabbat is a weekly opportunity to slow down, chill out, and feast along the way."

The recipes in this book are presented on beautiful plates that complement the colors and beauty of the food. The book is divided into chapters that lead the hostess from preparing the challah for



Shabbat along with other types of bread and crackers to appetizers, salads, kugels and main courses, including fish, meat and chicken along with stews or cholents and onto to the finale of drinks, cocktails and desserts.

Each recipe is lovingly displayed on the page so the cook can see what the



final product will look like. There is a description of how to achieve success when cooking the dish and some of the dishes have been shared by a friend or fellow chef. Some of the dishes are

Recipe: Feta, Artichoke & Pea Dip with Sumac Pita Chips

Makes 2 cups dip and 32 pita chips Active time: 20 minutes Total time: 35 minutes

More than almost anything else I've created lately, this dip/spread sits right in the Venn-diagram overlap of easy and delicious; I'm almost embarrassed to report just how easy. Drain a jar of marinated artichoke hearts, defrost some peas (yes, the sweet and delicious frozen kind), throw in some feta and garlic, and blend. Then, take any chopped herbs you have (though chives and mint really pop here) and use the tangy, sumac-y pita chips to scoop it up. Reimagine any leftovers as a sandwich spread or fold them into leftover pasta for an impromptu lunch.

FOR THE PITA CHIPS:

1/3 cup olive oil

1 tablespoon ground sumac

1 1/2 teaspoons ground cumin

1/2 teaspoon kosher salt

4 pitas, each cut into 8 triangles

FOR THE DIP:

One 12-ounce jar marinated artichokes, drained, or canned and drained or frozen and defrosted*

1 cup frozen peas, defrosted and drained (3/4 cup defrosted)

One 4-ounce block (or 1 cup crumbled) feta cheese

1/4 cup olive oil

1 small garlic clove

3 tablespoons minced fresh chives, plus more for garnish

2 tablespoons finely chopped fresh mint

1 tablespoon finely minced seeded hot green chili pepper

Directions:

1. Make the pita chips: Arrange two racks in the top and bottom thirds of the oven. Preheat the oven to 375°F. In



a large bowl, combine the oil, sumac, cumin, and salt. Add the pita triangles to the bowl and toss to coat in the sumac oil. Arrange in single layers on two large rimmed baking sheets and bake until golden and crisp, switching them midway through, 13 to 14 minutes. Cool on the baking sheets.

2. While the chips are baking, make the dip: Combine the artichokes, peas, feta, olive oil, and garlic in a food processor and process until grainy-smooth, 25 to 30 seconds. Scrape down the bowl and process until almost smooth, 30 to 45 more seconds. Stir in the chives, mint, and chili. Transfer to a serving bowl and garnish with more chives. Serve the chips with the dip. The dip can be refrigerated in an airtight container for up to 5 days.

*If you're using canned or defrosted frozen artichokes, add 1 tablespoon of your favorite Italian-style vinaigrette when blending.

Recipe: Seared Broccoli with Caper Vinaigrette

Serves 4 to 6

Active Time: 20 minutes Total Time: 20 minutes

Ah, broccoli, we almost ate you every Friday night. Let me set the scene: In the minutes just before Shabbat came in, my mother would steam some broccoli, so we'd have an extra fresh vegetable to enjoy over Shabbat. We would sit schmoozing in the "living room" (where we never lived, except during this precious single hour and a half every Friday). Almost like clockwork, my mom would slap her forehead and say, "I forgot about the broccoli!" Since we didn't turn lights on and off on Shabbat and the microwave had a bulb that activated when its door was opened, the broccoli would sit in isolation until Shabbat ended. And so, no microwave broccoli in my house. Instead, grilled planks of broccoli, where the stem is as much of a treat as the florets. Steam-charring in the skillet turns the vegetable a gorgeous shade of bright green, contributing a wisp of smokiness to the proceedings. The longer I live in Israel, the more I crave salt, spice, and acid, and this zippy caper, shallot, and lemon vinaigrette checks all the boxes. The vinaigrette also works supremely well stirred into pasta or potato salad, and-of coursedolloped on steak, fish, or chicken.

Ingredients:

- 7 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons jarred capers (2 1/2 tablespoons if salt-packed), drained, lightly rinsed, and coarsely chopped
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley 1 tablespoon finely minced shallots
- 1/2 teaspoon finely minced hot chili pepper (seeds optional)
- 1/4 teaspoon kosher salt, plus more for seasoning

1/8 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper



1 large head broccoli (11/2 to 13/4 pounds)6 tablespoons vegetable broth, chicken broth, or water

Directions:

- 1. In a medium bowl, combine 4 tablespoons of the olive oil with the lemon juice, capers, parsley, shallots, chili, salt, and black pepper.
- 2. Use a sharp vegetable peeler to peel the tough outer layer of the broccoli stem to reveal the paler green interior. Cut broccoli through the stem into four 1-inch "steaks," some larger than others. You'll have some stray florets; use them, too.
- 3. Heat a 9- or 10-inch skillet over medium high heat. Just before adding the broccoli, add 1 ½ tablespoons oil to the skillet. Add 2 steaks, season with salt, and sear until the underside is charred on the edges, 3 minutes. Flip, add 3 tablespoons of the broth, cover, and continue cooking until the underside is charred and the broccoli is bright green, 3 to 5 minutes.
- 4. Remove to a plate; cover with foil to keep warm. Repeat with the remaining oil, steaks, and broth. Transfer to a serving platter and spoon the vinaigrette on top.

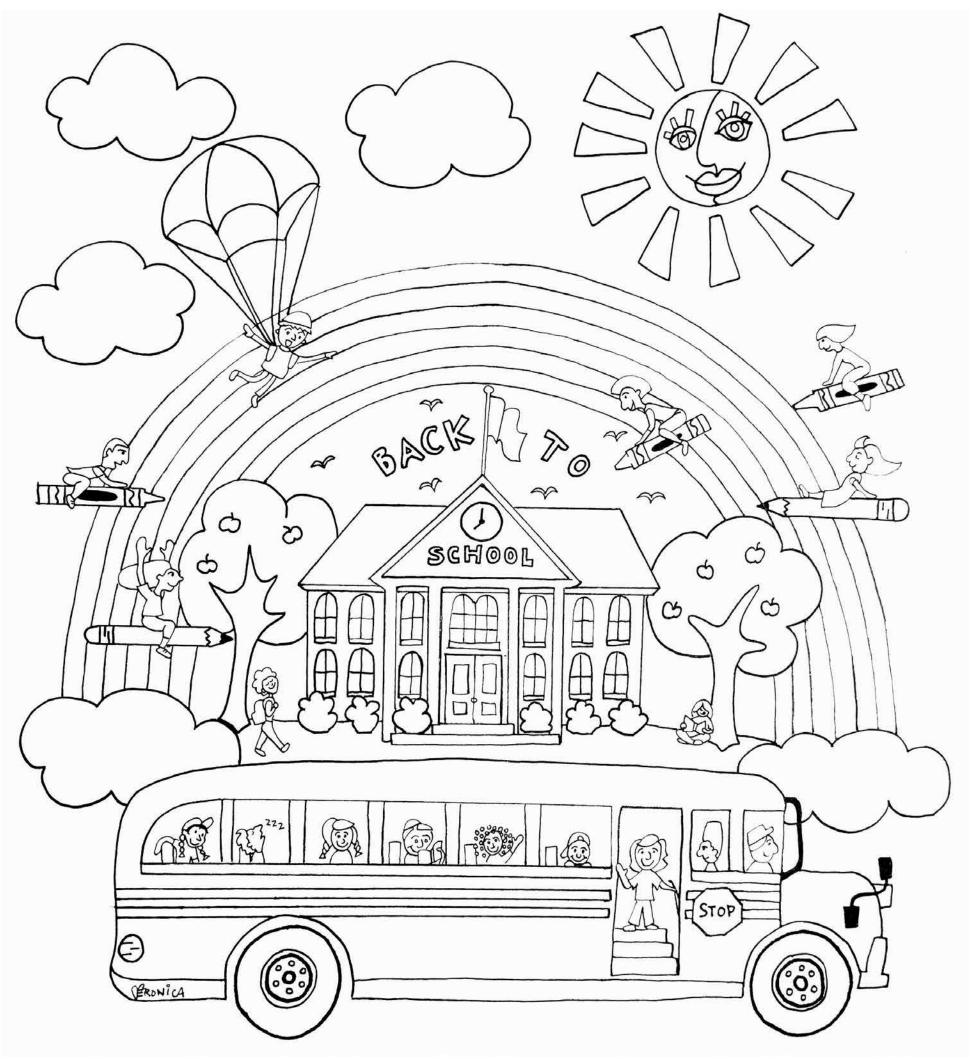

Hadassah on Health, Antisemitism and Cancer-related Skin Treatments

The community is welcome to join the Manchester Chapter of Hadassah members at the second annual walkathon for women's health. It will be held on Sunday, October 22, 2023, at 1 PM at the Chestnut Hill Reservoir in Brookline, MA. Donations toward this fundraiser are welcome. Volunteers are also needed

to help at the walk.

In national news, Shelley Greenspan, White House Liaison to the American Jewish Community, joined Hadassah-Young Judea in a discussion on Jewish Advocacy. Attendees included Young Judea board members and alumni, the Hadassah National Secretary as well as Hadassah members.

Ms. Greenspan spoke about her experiences as White House liaison to the American Jewish Community over the last year, particularly the recently released National Strategy to Counter Antisemitism and the process from its inception to release.

"We decided to host a roundtable at the White House and had a handful of Jewish professional leaders, who spoke with one voice — and it was really clear they wanted a national strategy to tackle antisemitism," she said. "This is the most ambitious and comprehensive plan to counter antisemitism.... This is really a whole of society effort, and I'm so grateful for partners like Hadassah when they come to me with ideas and suggestions."

As the largest Jewish women's organization in the US, Hadassah advocates to strengthen the US-Israel relationship, combat antisemitism and champion women's and public health to enhance the lives of people in Israel, the United States and worldwide. Right now, the Senate has an opportunity to take up a critical bill that recently passed the House and would establish a Special Envoy for the Abraham Accords, the landmark normalization agreements between Israel and Arab countries.

Please join Hadassah and urge your Senators to take up H.R. 3099 to continue American leadership for peace in the Middle East.

As reported in the Jerusalem Post, Researchers at the Hebrew University and Hadassah-University Medical Center in Jerusalem developed a cream to treat chemo side effects: skin toxicity with severe facial rashes.

While today's cancer treatments are highly effective in prolonging the lives of patients, more attention must be paid to their quality of life and emotional state throughout their treatment. A new study reported on the new development that will relieve skin toxicity and improve patients' feeling during the challenging period of fighting the disease. Current oncology treatments use on-target strategies that are meant to block a specific receptor on the tumor, leading to a delay in the cancer cells' growth and a regression of the disease. Since this specific receptor is also found in healthy skin cells, skin toxicity is a known side effect of targeted cancer treatment.

Dewish Dourneys Dartmouth students embark on a life-changing mission to restore forgotten Jewish cemeteries in Poland as part of Hillel at Dartmouth's Project Preservation

Project Preservation is Hillel at Dartmouth's premier experiential learning program whose mission is to recover Jewish history and reclaim Jewish culture by restoring neglected Jewish cemeteries, primarily in Eastern Europe. The program, now in its 20th year, is led by Hillel at Dartmouth's Executive Director and Michael Steinberg '61 Rabbi, Seth Linfield. As explained by Rabbi Seth, "Europe's vanished Jewish communities cannot care for these orphaned cemeteries. Centuries of tombstones are not maintained. Through **Project** Preservation, our Hillel at Dartmouth family responds to evil by keeping a generational trust to preserve cemeteries."

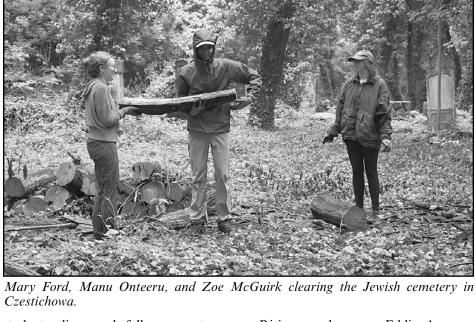
Prior to the trip, students meet weekly

to study and learn with teachers like Holocaust survivor Betty Lauer of White River Junction, Vermont, Dartmouth Professors Phyllis Deutsch and Benjamin Valentino. In June, 21 Jewish and non-Jewish students, joined by Rabbi Seth, Dartmouth faculty member Melissa Herman and Hillel Springboard Innovation Fellow Samantha Cohen, traveled to Poland.

After bearing witness to the history of the Polish Jewish community in Krakow and an intensive day at Auschwitz and Birkenau, the group began cemetery restoration in Czestichowa, a city in southern Poland. In the neglected Jewish Cemetery, the students devoted two days to removing vines and weeds, dragging logs, and cleaning gravestones. The

students discovered fallen gravestones that had been hidden by decades of dirt, debris, and overgrowth and documented the names and other information on the inscriptions. The students were joined in their work by Polish high school students. The students also took part in a regional ceremony at the cemetery recognizing the recent discovery of mass graves of Nazi victims. Speakers included dignitaries from Israel and Poland.

Following Shabbat in Warsaw with Poland Hillel, the group got to work in the Łódz cemetery, the biggest Jewish cemetery in Europe. The students cleared three rows of grass, ivy, and moss. At the conclusion, the participants conducted a memorial service including the Mourner's Kaddish.

Rising sophomore Eddi Aronson reflected that she found the work in the cemetery "to be the biggest surprise of our trip. While it mainly seemed physical from a distance, it ended up having a complex emotional component that will stay with me. This mission granted me further understanding consequences of acting beyond humanity. I have tried for many years to understand the Holocaust. It is more important to remember and prevent it. This project prompted me to take greater responsibility for the potential I have to protect those who are unjustly persecuted. In particular, it has increased my awareness of my agency as a Jew to both educate others and learn more from my own culture."

In certain cancers such as colon cancer and head-and-neck cancer, the treatment protocol focuses on blocking a specific receptor for the EGFR pathway, which is critical for the growth and function of those cancerous cells. However, it is also important for preserving healthy skin cells. The result is that while the targeted therapy can be effective in treating the cancer, 90% of the patients will develop skin toxicity with severe facial rashes. Besides suffering from the disease and the discomfort caused by the rash, it can influence the patients' emotional well-being and may even impact their willingness to continue treatment.

The rashes caused by skin toxicity vary in location and appearance, but one of the most prominent features is severe facial rashes that significantly damage the patients' quality of life - not only from the aesthetic point of view, but also emotionally. The location of the rashes on the face is like "coming out" to the entire world with an announcement that the person has cancer. Until now, no efficient treatment has been available for these se-

The new study was based on human skin in the lab and on mice. It succeeded in finding a way to help patients and prevent the rashes: a new cream whose active component is a drug that blocks the pathway of the cancer treatment drug to the EGFR receptor, thus preventing damage to the healthy skin cells but not impeding the cancer treatment.

The novel approach they developed will enable treatment of the cancer while neutralizing damage to the skin, thus preventing skin toxicity and the ensuing rashes, the team said.

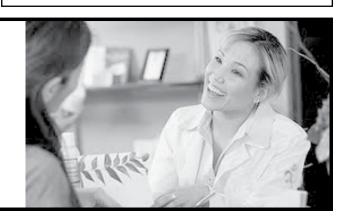
