Two Kids, Some Oil, a Potato, and a Deadline

"Chanukah oh Chanukah, come light the menorah. Let's celebrate how the Maccabees didn't snore-a. Gather round the table and eat delicious latkes; sour cream for grownups and don't forget the apple sauce." Queue my son declaring loudly that he just wants tacos.

If you can't tell, my kids are helping to write this article. Actual conversation that happened at my dinner table: "What's the meaning of Chanukah? What do you mean it's not just about the presents? Okay, okay. To celebrate the Brave Maccabees from the Torah. Huh? They're not in the Torah? But. Okay then, to celebrate the brave Maccabees who freed us from - wait - they didn't free us, did they? Were we slaves at that point? Did they build the temple? What does it mean to rededicate? Wait - like cleaning my room? I DON'T WANT TO CLEAN MY ROOM!"

This is going well. But also, there's a solid 75% chance I'd find a small jar of oil in my daughter's room if we cleaned. I don't know why. Have you seen her room? And yes, that's a potato under my son's pillow.

"Why did the latkes cross the road? To get to the other potato." (I would have said to escape the frying pan, but hey – my joketelling isn't as sophisticated as first graders.) Now the kids are offering to co-write ALL my articles. You've been warned.

How do we as a family get ready for Chanukah? I'd love to say it's something spiritual like the High Holidays, or very family oriented like Passover – but honestly, Chanukah at the Berches tends to be more low-key. We light the candles each night with prayers and a few songs. We make latkes at least once (and smell them for another two months). Each child chooses a charity for us to donate to. There are the obligatory sibling fights over who gets to light the candles (despite having a menorah per person). Both

What Does Tzedakah Mean?

Tzedakah is the Hebrew word for philanthropy and charity, but it is so much more than a financial transaction. Judaism teaches us to believe that tzedakah has two aspects: one with the hand, and one with the heart. This belief has remained a common denominator in Jewish traditions for centuries, and tzedakah builds trusting relationships, with contributions of time, effort, and insight.

You may ask why I am writing about tzedakah. Well, last month, my campaign co-chair Ken Litvack wrote about "faith, hope, and giving" — and I would like to add to his thoughts, since the campaign this year has begun after Thanksgiving, as opposed to after the High Holy days. The war in Israel changed our priorities this year with most of us receiving phone calls, letters, texts, and emails, each asking to donate to so many different causes. We wanted each one of you to be able to give what you felt you needed to do for Israel first.

To each of us, a mitzvah is any of the 613 Commandments that we, as Jews, are obligated to observe, and generally refer to as good deeds, but the mitzvah of tzedakah is one of the most important. It is a form of social justice in which the donors benefit from giving as much or more than the recipients.

Many Jewish families throughout the world have a tzedakah box or pushke in their homes in which they deposit coins for charity. But there are countless ways of giving tzedakah and it has become more complex throughout the years. I personally give tzedakah to enhance Jewish life, and strengthen our Jewish community

and federation, today and for the future.

"The word federation is used in the Jewish community to denote a central Jewish communal organization, which carries out the functions of recruiting and maintaining volunteers, collecting tzedakah dollars, coordinating budgets, setting priorities, allocating and interacting with other communal institutions." (Raphael 1979, xiii)

The New Hampshire Jewish Museum Spotlights NH Jewish Contributions to Healthcare

On Thursday, February 22, 2024 at 6 PM, the New Hampshire Jewish Museum (NHJM) located in the Jewish Federation of NH in Bedford, will open an exhibit entitled "NH Jewish Contributions to Healthcare, Past and Present."

One of the great past physicians to be featured will be Dr. Selma (Deitch) Sigel. A recollection from Dr. Sol Rockenmacher of Dr. Deitch; "A legacy to remember, I first met Selma in the 1970's, when I was in primary care pediatric practice in Dover ... for her fellow pediatricians, she was our Jiminy Cricket, our conscience in thinking about what was best for children. One of Selma's most outstanding contributions was being one of the dynamic duo—with benefactor May Gruber, aka Pandora's Pride—who

founded Manchester's Child Health Services, a model of healthcare that enfolded children in a wonderful safety net of services and human compassion. The program began in 1979, providing pri-


mary care and related health services to low-income children and families in the Greater Manchester area. It was quite possibly the first functioning family-centered, comprehensive, and coordinated Medical Home in the entire USA. At the time of her death in 2004, Child Health Services was seeing more than 2,000 children from the Manchester area. She also helped found the Derryfield School in 1964. In 1987, she was the Manchester Union Leader's Woman of the Year for New Hampshire, and in 1988 she was the Greater Manchester Chamber of Commerce's Citizen of the Year. She was, indeed, a special person."

The program on February 22 has two components. The first will be to chronicle and honor the amazing NH Jews

who made advances in healthcare, including the development of the measles vaccine and the creation of a child health program by Dr. Deitch. The second part will feature contemporary NH Jewish healthcare practitioners, teachers, administrators, and workers, speaking about their current innovations, procedures, and programs.

From Darkness to Light

In this month of Kislev, as we approach the festival of Chanukah amid a war for the future of Israel, we are struck by the echoes of history. Chanukah celebrates the spiritual victory of light over darkness and a military victory over a regime that sought to destroy our future as Jews. These days, as we turn to our sacred texts, our prayerbooks and our history, overlapping waves of meaning wash over us. As time itself seems to collapse, many of us are experiencing a profound disorientation along with the pain, fear, and grief of this moment.

Our history and the wisdom of our sages have much to teach us about reclaiming spiritual strength amid the ruins. We are survivors. Our people have not only survived, but flourished, despite the worst and most evil of human inventions across time.

There is a teaching in our Talmud (Makkot 24b) in which Rabbi Akiva and

his colleagues are walking amid the ruins of Jerusalem:

"When they reached Mount Scopus [from which it is possible to see the Temple Mount], they tore their clothing. When they arrived at the Temple Mount, they saw a fox running out of the area where the Holy of Holies had been. They began to cry, while R. Akiva laughed. They said to him (R. Akiva), "Why are you laughing?".... He replied, "Isaiah the Prophet said, 'I will bring two reliable witnesses regarding my people, Uriah the Priest and Zecharia ben Yeverchyahu." (Isaiah 8:2)... the verse in Isaiah makes Zecharia's prophecy dependent on Uriah's. In Uriah's case, it is written, "Therefore, because of you, Zion will be plowed under like a field." (Michah 3:12) In the case of Zecharia, we find, "Yet again, elderly men and elderly women will sit in the streets of Jerusalem.... Now that I have seen Uriah's prophecy fulfilled in full detail, I know that Zecharia's prophecy will also be fulfilled." Hearing that, R. Akiva's colleagues said to him, "Akiva, you have comforted us. Akiva, you have comforted us."

In view of the destruction of the holiest place on earth, the abode of God, Rabbi Akiva adjusts his vision to see beyond the present moment. He sees the past, acknowledges the destruction, hears the echo of the Prophets, and he sees a new future of restoration, of healing and peace.

In the tradition of Jewish mysticism, each month conveys a particular essence, a unique quality that is accessible to us at that time of year. This month of Kislev is associated with the quality of **vision**. As we light our *chanukiot*, we are invited to orient ourselves toward the growing light amid the darkness. We are invited to move out of despair, and like Rabbi Akiva, deepen our capacity to envision a future of restoration, healing, and peace.

Kislev is also considered the month of miracles; a time in which the light we kindle and the visions we dream can transform the present reality. It is a time when we read the story of Joseph the dreamer. Through his capacity for vision and his ability to see beyond limitations, Joseph transforms a regional disaster into a manageable new structure that sustains all the people of the region. Ultimately, Joseph's actions bring about a true healing and long-needed redemption between himself and his brothers.

We have learned through our long history that miracles and transformation are possible, but that they occur through the agents of humankind. This month, let us expand our vision, if only a bit, from despair to hope, from the limitations of fear to the open field of possibilities, from darkness to light.



Temple Israel Portsmouth: Siyyum – Life Cycle of Sacred Texts

On October 25th at Temple Israel Portsmouth, the Hebrew School and congregation held a siyyum ceremony to celebrate the successful repair and return of Holocaust Torah Scroll MST #486 (an orphan scroll). The event was very successful, poignant, and meaningful.

Since March 25, 2015, Temple Israel has housed one of the Memorial Scrolls Trust's Torah scrolls on permanent loan. This special Torah has been used for the celebration of all life-cycle events, events that affirm the continuity of the Jewish people. These events include the High Holidays, baby namings, b'nei mitzvah, and aufrufs (the calling of a bride and groom for an aliyah prior to their wedding).

The Czech scrolls, including MST #486, are survivors and silent witnesses. They represent not only the lost communities of Bohemia and Moravia where they originated, but all the communities who perished in the Shoah. Recently, our scroll needed some restorative repairs, which were completed over the summer by Rabbi Kevin Hale, Sofer STaM, a traditionally trained Torah scribe.

Over 40 Hebrew School students and their teachers attended the two educational sessions held by Rabbi Hale, after which about 45 congregants participated in the siyyum ceremony. Rabbi Hale tailored his presentations, engaging the students by demonstrating the materials and methods used by scribes to write a

Torah and providing other detail to the adults. He was clearly effective, evoking much inquisitiveness among the Hebrew School students, and spirit and interest among all the adults. Greetings were read from Jeffey Ohrenstein, Trustee/ Chairman of the Memorial Scrolls Trust in London. Everyone present contributed, either by coming up and reciting a kavanah (intention) to empower Rabbi Hale to fill in a letter on their behalf, or by participating in a group aliyah. Rabba Kaya was given the honor of filling in the final letter herself. After the ink on all the completed letters dried, the Torah was declared kosher by Rabba Kaya. After the group aliyah, the Torah was carried from the Social Hall to the Aron (Ark) in the sanctuary, with a procession of joyful followers. The event was a moving experience for all who came. Thanks are due to the organizing committee and all those involved in arranging and funding the repairs that provided the cause for the celebration.

The Memorial Scrolls Trust has recently published a book detailing how the collection of scrolls came to London and were distributed from there to Jewish congregations throughout the world, who make a commitment to honor the scrolls' communities of origin. Copies of the book, 1564 Scrolls: A Legacy of Jewish Life in Bohemia and Moravia, are available for purchase, \$36.00 each. Please contact the Temple Israel office to order. Third, four members of the Derry delegation to the New Hampshire House

They presented and read to the congregation a letter from the Derry Delegation, Rockingham District 13 on the State of New Hampshire, House of Representatives Concord stationery dated October 27, 2023. Representative Katherine Prudhomme-O'Brien read the letter: "The New Hampshire House of Representatives adamantly rejects antisemitism, hate, and terrorism. 
Etz Hayim Synagogue Hosts Chanukah Events



Temple B'nai Israel of Laconia Remembers Kristallnacht

Laconia, NH – On Thursday, November 9, 2023, the Lakes Region community gathered on the steps outside of Temple B'nai Israel to commemorate Kristallnacht, "The night of Broken Glass." This is the third consecutive year that this event has been held and the first snowfall of the season did not deter people to remember the victims, denounce hatred, and stand in witness to the atrocities of the Nazi regime. NHPR reporter Olivia Richardson referred to the event as "an evening of warmth, support, and remembrance."

TBI member Lois Kessin planned the event inviting local dignitaries and clergy to speak. Most notably, Congressman Chris Pappas and Rabbi Robin Nafshi of Temple Beth Jacob in Concord. Local dignitaries included Brian Beihl, host and producer of the American Democracy Minute Radio Report, Retired Judge Jim Carroll, Rev. Judith Wright of the Unitarian Universalist Society of Laconia, Pastor Campbell Lovett of the Congregational Church of Laconia, Steve Tucker, Superintendent of the Laconia School District, David Stamps, Chair of the Laconia Human Relations Committee, and Ira Keltz, President of Temple B'nai Israel,

standing in for Rabbi Jan Katz who could not be in attendance. TBI Member John McArthur led the attendees in singing Hine Ma Tov and Oseh Shalom.

Kristallnacht was described as "Germany's most bloody assault on Jews since the Middle Ages," according to Rabbi Jan Katz. This year marks the 85th anniversary of this tragedy that was the beginning of the Nazi's all-out persecution and slaughter of the Jews of Europe. The State of Israel was born of the tragedy of the Holocaust. Today we are faced with an unimagined attack on Israel by Hamas which has spurred global antisemitism to heights not seen since World War II. It was hard not to connect the two events and the global reaction. "Jewish communities everywhere are hurting deeply because of the lingering trauma of the Holocaust, because of the rise of antisemitism, because of the unimaginable suffering of our brothers and sisters in Israel, and because of the suffering of the Palestinian people. Yet, here in Laconia and the Lakes Region, we know we are not alone. You are with us, and you show us the power of empathy," as stated by Rabbi Katz.


Brian Biehl offered his personal recol-



lection of visiting Nuremburg in 2015. "As we walked through the streets, we began to see small brass squares embedded as small cobblestones into the pavement. Each of them is inscribed with, "Here Lived," followed by names, the address, and a short phrase in German which described the fate of those people: Internment, suicide, exile or, in most



cases, deportation and murder." He continued, "They're called Stolpersteine, or "Stumbling Stones," and are now installed in 1,200 cities and towns across Europe and Russia. This project began in 1992, and as of June 2023, 100,000 Stumbling Stones have been installed. It's the largest decentralized memorial in the world." Upon conclusion Biehl offered this important message, "We must SHATTER silence by speaking out. We must SHATTER complacency with action. We must SHATTER authoritarianism by voting. We must SHATTER violence with peace. We must SHATTER hate with Love."






Bring Back the Babka and The Jake Show

The holidays are here once again, and it is a great time to gift your family and friends with books to read through the cold snowy winter months. Here are some of the new books I think would be perfect this holiday season.

Bring Back the Babka, words by Marilyn Wolpin and art by Madison Safer, is a sweet picture book about a missing babka. As two young boys go through the neighborhood asking if anyone has seen the babka their mother baked for dessert, they gather other delicious foods for a Shabbat dinner and bring home these friends to share the meal. At the end there is a babka recipe written by New Hampshire baker Cheryl Holbert, who owns Nomad Bakery in Derry. It is an added treat that will warm your kitchen with the warm scent of cinnamon on a cold day.

The Jake Show, written by Joshua S. Levy, is a great middle school book that kids can relate to if they feel they are different in any way. Fitting in with your family and friends can be complicated: starting at a new school is always difficult, and switching to a new school midyear is even harder. In the book, Jake knows because he has changed schools five times since his parent's divorce. Jake imagines he is living in a television sitcom and enjoying the current episode until the show is canceled. Indeed, Jake explains his entire life this way, saying how in the "original series," he and his parents celebrated Jewish holidays and enjoyed Shabbat dinners, but also watched TV together after dinner. Then his parents divorced, and now life is like





a TV spin-off rather than the original program everybody loved.

When his new friends, Caleb and Tehilla, invite him to join them for the summer at Camp Gershoni, they help him create a series of lies that will convince both sets of parents to sign him up for camp. The web of lies keeps growing, and finally will catch up with him—like a television car chase. The book offers a lesson in telling the truth and being true

Joshua S. Levy is the author of several middle grade novels, including The Jake Show and Finn and Ezra's Bar Mitzvah Time Loop. Born and raised in Florida, Josh now lives with his family in New Jersey, where he also practices as a lawyer.

And for the adults, here is a suggestion: One for Each Night: The Greatest Chanukah Stories of All Time, is a collection of stories by some of the greatest Jewish authors of our time. Sholom Aleichem, Elie Wiesel, S. Y. Agnon, I. L. Peretz, Theodor Herzl, Emma Lazar, Chaim Potok, and Rebecca Newberger Goldstein, are just some of the fabulous authors who have contributed stories to this collection. This anthology brings the reader both thoughtful and humorous stories that share the way Chanukah is celebrated around the world. The book looks at the meaning of Chanukah and how it fits into a world that is not always welcoming to the Jewish people.



2023's 'Golda' and other films about Israeli Prime Ministers


There there will be a Zoom discussion about the 2023 film Golda on Sunday, January 21 at 3 PM. Ironically, it is a timely piece not only because its release surrounds the 50th Anniversary of the Yom Kippur War, but also because of the current war in Israel. Now available to stream on Amazon Prime, Apple, and several other platforms, the film has gained much attention over the last several months.

I am as big a fan of Helen Mirren as any. For decades, she has delighted audiences in so many memorable roles, and is quite the legend of the stage and screen. Her portrayal of Golda Meir, Prime Minister of Israel from 1969 to 1974, has added another feather to her cap in the areas of range and versatility. She is absolutely spectacular as Meir, a pivotal force in Israeli politics and a deeply layered human.

Focusing on the end of her tenure as Prime Minister, Israel's fourth in its quarter-century of independence, the film does both a service and disservice to Meir in my opinion. The fact that it was made at all, especially at such a challenging time for Israel and the Middle East, is a service to Meir's legacy. Additionally, the way in which it paints Meir's challenges surrounding the Yom Kippur War in 1973 is seemingly realistic and very focused. That said, the choppy script and lack of focus on other aspects of Meir leave a lot to be desired. Sure, the film is only one hour and 40 minutes, and you can only do so much, but for those unfamiliar with Meir as a leader or the events depicted, the plot leaves much to be desired at times. It fails to examine how Meir rose to power and the complicated parts of her leadership, as well as others' views of her.

Met with her own share of controversy for wearing prosthetic make-up and not being Jewish herself, Helen Mirren does not have an easy job but does indeed rise to the occasion. Throughout, she shines in her ability to transform into the role—capturing the deep emotional toll, the reliance on her government amidst turmoil, and endless chain smoking which define Golda Meir as a deeply fascinating character. As I alluded to, I wish that we were able to see a bit of the backstory as to how Meir rose to power and shattered the glass ceiling as a woman in Israeli politics, but perhaps that is a story for another film.

Despite the plot issues and lack of depth that come with parts of the movie, it is quite interesting and well done. Mirren is supported by a solid cast, among which American actor Liev Schreiber and legendary Israeli actor Lior Ashkenazi are the standouts. Schreiber's portrayal of Henry Kissinger is fascinating, leaving the audience with an intriguing interpretation of the special bond between the US and Israel. Ashkenazi's

Dado Elazar, Chief of Staff for the Israel Defense Force, is a character with much depth in a film that frankly lacks it at times. I encourage everyone to see this film, especially if you are looking to educate yourself on Israeli history in any way. It will certainly leave you thinking, but for many of us who always seek to know more, it is not enough.

On that note, I highly recommend the 2019 documentary, also called Golda, which screened at the 2021 NH Jewish Film Festival. Available on Chai Flicks, a streaming service devoted to Jewish content, it is a remarkable piece about the dramatic career of Golda Meir. Interviewed for Israeli TV not long before her death, the film focuses intently on her surprising rise to power, her downfalls as a leader, and how many viewed her final year in office so negatively as she pleaded for the positives of her premiership. It helps a lot in picking up some of the loose pieces with the dramatized film version with Mirren.

You can also catch several other great documentaries on Chai Flicks about other prime ministers, many of which also have Q&A videos with directors and filmmakers available. Finally, I must highly recommend the film Upheaval: The Journey of Menachem Begin, which you can rent on Amazon Prime. Screened at our 2022 Festival, it follows Meir's successor Menachem Begin, who was instrumental in the signing of the Camp David Accords alongside US President Jimmy Carter and Egyptian President Anwar Sadat. Powerful, detailed, and informative, it is a good companion to the two Meir films as it examines the immediate years following her tenure.

All of these films remind audiences that Israel remains a young nation that has endured much hardship while persevering in spite of it. As "Hatikvah," the state's National Anthem, reminds us, there is always hope.





However, the highlight of Jerusalem was seeing the protests against Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, based on his bill to change the judicial system of Israel. I saw thousands of people in the streets peacefully protesting for democracy. You could sense the passion people have for Israel.

I had been to Israel the year before with my family, which was incredible. It made me want to go back. But getting to play basketball and traveling with so many amazing kids was something I'll never forget. I am hoping to go back to do nine weeks in Israel for high school this Spring! Where We Stand as Jews

In 2023, we can all deeply understand, all-too viscerally, what it meant for our ancestors to experience and endure the horrors of antisemitism. As a survivor's son, whose father survived Auschwitz, Bergen Beslen, and Melk, I can attest that I had always thought I had somewhat of an appreciation of what my father and family went through—I absorbed so much of my father's words—but I truly cannot even begin to fathom the utter horror and isolation of what it must have been like to be targeted for a Nazi camp of hell, where death was the final escape.

We've been lucky for the past 80 years. Crazy Jew hating has been on vacation. While antisemitism still manifested itself into world society, it lay dormant like the Ebola virus, only to rise again in a special virulent strain. The hatred of Jews is now on full display. This time, calls for Jewish genocide, calls for "from the river to the sea," are no longer just catcalls from white supremacy groups. These death chants are from your neighbors, your friends (you thought they were different?). The utter silence after 1,400 innocents were slaughtered, 240 taken hostage - it is a wakeup call after 80 years of antisemitic slumber. We've seen this before, from the Greeks and Romans to the Turks and Assyrians. But this time it is the 2023 social media version, where facts are as supercilious as flat earth conspiracists. The murder of 1,400 people blamed on the victims? Even Hitler could not have imagined

such a sinister plot.

What to Do

If Jewish history tells us anything, it's that it is time to embrace your Jewishness and summon the strength of our history, and of our ancestors. It is a time to be vigilant and aware. It's also a time to check in on your Jewish friends and family. The power of words, the outright concern for your people, goes a long way now. So, will we get through this? What can we do? What can Israel do? What can the United States do?

An Idea for Israel

First, Israel does have a unique opportunity to help the people of Gaza and change international opinion in a way that the world has not seen since the 1940s. Back then, after Germany had lost the war, the United States was fearful that the Germans would revert back to their old ways. With the country decimated after the Allied bombings, their economy in ruins, George Marshall (the general and secretary of state) came up with a plan: rebuild Germany with Allied money. A rebuilt, robust Germany certainly would not revert to their old ways.

And you know what? George Marshall was right. Now is the time for Israel to announce their own Marshall plan (with the US and other Israel-supporting na-

tions). Now is the time for Israel to make the boldest of statements. It should plan to rebuild Gaza and reshape the Middle East's future. And the United States?



Hadassah Responds to the Crisis in Israel

Members of the Manchester Chapter of Hadassah participated in Hadassah's Walk for Israel and Women's Health at Brandeis University's indoor track, raising funds for Hadassah's Heal Israel Now Campaign. Everyone enjoyed being together in person, as a Hadassah community. Over 200 people registered for the walk and almost \$80,000 was raised. Two choirs, children and adults from Temple Emanuel in Newton performed. After a short stretching exercise, a shofar was blown and the walk began. Snacks and water were distributed. There were tables set up for facepainting and temporary tattoos, and fresh cotton candy was enjoyed. A fun time was had by all.

This has been the most difficult period in Israel's history. The war is felt by all of us. We are all so heartbroken and very upset over the unprecedented situation in Israel. Hadassah is here for Israel, helping Israel heal. In terms of personnel, Hadassah has pulled together full teams in all critical areas. More than 70 medical staff members were called into reserve duty, but unfortunately, while Israel is used to terror attacks, nothing on par with what is occurring now. Hadassah knows how to operate under challenging conditions both literally and psychologically.

Thanks to incoming donations for the Heal Israel Now Campaign, Hadassah built two state-of-the-art secure underground emergency facilities in five days and increased emergency and ICU treatment capacity by 250 beds. There was no disruption in patient care, despite over 300 Hadassah Medical Organization (HMO) employees being called into IDF reserve duty. Every HMO facility is open and 65 of HMO's department heads are on site. Every ward is currently fully staffed.

Both Hadassah hospitals are located a short helicopter ride away from the Gaza border and they are equipped with helipads for emergency transport.

As a major Level-1 trauma center and the only one in Jerusalem, Hadassah is receiving some of the most seriously wounded patients, civilians, and soldiers. These include people with traumatic brain injuries, horrible shrapnel damage, and patients with severed limbs. They have been receiving patients from hospitals and triage centers from places across the country.

Hadassah is a global leader in treating psychological stress and trauma. They set up both pediatric and adult psychiatric ER services for traumatized patients and are supporting hundreds of evacuated family members. Many citizens are suffering from anxiety attacks.


Hadassah Youth Aliyah Villages are a safe and welcoming environment. They receive evacuees and provide them with shelter and medical care. Additional bomb shelters have been put in place for the students' protection. Social workers and staff trained in trauma care are helping them cope with the devastation that people in crisis can experience. This care is provided to students, staff, and their families.

Your help is needed. Speak out for the hostages. Hamas kidnapped nearly 200 women, children, elderly and disabled individuals, Israelis, and American citizens and others. Ask your lawmakers to stand with Israel and publicly call on Hamas to release all hostages immediately.

Also, thank President Biden for prohibiting antisemitism in federally funded programs and ask him to fully implement the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance (IHRA) definition of antisemitism.

Let us all pray for peace for the land of Israel. Am Yisrael Chai!



Israel's Ongoing Support for the Developing Countries of Africa

For over 65 years, Israel has provided agricultural and technical aid to developing countries, especially in the continent of Africa. This often behind-the-scenes work is an act of *tikkun olam* that rarely gets the publicity it deserves. However, it has helped to make friends for Israel in many of these nations.

An article earlier this year in Israel 21c presented some of the following information: "Fatima Tirap, adviser to the president of Chad, came to Israel for the first time in March 2023 as part of an 11-coun-



try African delegation learning about agricultural technologies and especially precision irrigation. She was quoted as saying, 'Israel is very good in this sector. Chad is huge, but we have zero technology. Israeli agritech will completely change the game and the economy. We had an incredible time seeing how agriculture is done in the Negev. For a young Sahelian Chadian woman, it was an eye-opener.' Chad recently opened an embassy in Tel Aviv. 'We are proud of our good relationship with Israel. I kept telling the team that the project [in agritech] will be the first baby of the marriage of Israel and Chad."'


Indeed, Israel's Agency for International Development Cooperation shares Israeli inventions, techniques, and best practices with 43 African countries and sends emergency aid to others that don't yet have diplomatic relations with Israel. Tirap's experience was made possible by the Beer Sheva-based DeserTech Climate Technologies Community.

Gohar Barak, international ecosystem development manager of DeserTech, said, "The Israeli ecosystem has a lot of solutions and operates globally but not necessarily in Africa because until now we didn't understand all their needs and problems. For example, a life-or-death issue in rural agriculture in the Great Green Wall corridor is post-harvest loss, which reaches 70-to-80% in some parts of northern Nigeria. We matched them with Natural Offset Farming, an Israeli company that develops a cooling system to cool

down produce until it's taken to market. Some of the countries that have participated do not have relations with Israel."

From my teaching brit milah, I learned that a very different area of assistance has been in helping African countries dealing with AIDS. A decade ago, Israel had a major part in developing the WHO program "Operation Abraham" to circumcise 20 million African men. The Jerusalem Post reported that 14 targeted countries in Africa have adopted the WHO program. The program was estimated to save more than 3.4 million people from being infected as well as \$16.5 billion that would have been needed to cope with disease. And in 2016, Israel developed a low-tech, low-cost device called 'Prepex,' described as "the first and so far only non-surgical male circumcision device; requiring no injected anesthesia, no surgery, no sterile settings." At that time there were nearly 30 million people suffering from HIV, and research has determined that circumcision reduces the risk of heterosexually acquired HIV infection by men by approximately 60%.

How many lives have been saved in Africa by Israel's sharing of its knowledge!
