Year in Review

For the Jewish Federation of New Hampshire, the past year was busy and productive. Our federation in New Hampshire is one of 148 member federations and 300 independent communities that make up the Jewish Federations of North America (JFNA). Jewish federations are charitable organizations designed to bring together in one place the organizational resources and volunteers needed to provide and support a variety of programs and initiatives of interest to the Jewish community.

Among the North American federations, JFNH is unique in that it aims to serve a Jewish population living throughout the entire state. Aside from our synagogues, temples, and chavurot, New Hampshire has virtually no Jewish institutions save for JFNH. There is no Jewish Community Center (JCC), no Jewish senior center, no Jewish family services, and, except for the Jewish preschool operated by JFNH in Manchester, no Jewish day schools. JFNH therefore bears an enormous responsibility to create opportunities for New Hampshire's Jews to connect with Jewish life in New Hampshire.

I am especially proud to report that for the first time in over six years, JFNH's annual fundraising campaign was a tremendous success. The campaign raised more than \$40,000 over and above what was raised the previous year. This is a major accomplishment that helps JFNH to deliver programs and services to our statewide Jewish population. We interpret our successful campaign as a strong vote of confidence for our mission and achievements during the year, revitalizing this organization and serving our communities in a meaningful and impactful way. Special thanks go to our campaign chairs, Sarit Itenberg and Julia Preis.

During the past year, JFNH's statewide activities included the following:

 We brought back our Israeli Emissary (Shlicha) program, featuring Noam Wolf,

- which was enthusiastically received throughout the state.
- We produced The New Hampshire Jewish Film Festival, our most popular and ambitious event, which completed its tenth anniversary year with its greatest success to date.
- We funded and administered, thanks to Allyson Guertin, our incredibly successful and impactful PJ Library program, which provides free Jewish books and music to children six months to eleven years of age and offers family programming throughout the year.
- Thanks to the hard work and dedication of our Shlicha, Noam Wolf, and community volunteers, we conducted and sponsored a series of events throughout the state to celebrate Israel at 70 that included a familv fair in Nashua, a farewell dinner with the Israeli Consulate General in Concord, an Israeli dance party in Portsmouth, a wonderful presentation in Manchester about Israel's Hula Valley and its avian journeys, and a superb and extraordinary concert performance by world-renowned mandolinist Jacob Reuven and The Be'er Sheva Mandolin Soloists in Keene, thanks to the generosity of Michael and Evelyn Miller and August Watters.
- We provided social service assistance and support for individuals and families in need of food and housing throughout New Hampshire.
- We continued to operate our Jewish community preschool in Manchester, where children from two to five years of age can receive a quality education in a Jewish atmosphere.
- We awarded grants to New Hampshire Jewish communities for programming.
- We proudly cosponsored a Chanukah concert in Manchester.
- We awarded grants that subsidized the cost to send New Hampshire children to Jewish camp, and to help send New Hampshire teens and young adults on structured trips to Israel.

 We provided financial support to our state's synagogues to help operate their religious schools.

Our commitment to reach out to the entirety of New Hampshire's Jewish population in a variety of ways is stronger than ever. Contemplating the year ahead, I am excited about the special promise it holds in store. Our Israeli emissary, Noam Wolf, spent the past year bringing her extraordinary knowledge of Israeli life and musical talents to our communities throughout the state, and we are thrilled that she will be with us for another incredible year, engaging the members of our Jewish communities in every region of our state with a special focus on our children, teens, and young adults in a range of Jewish cultural, educational, and social activities.

The restoration and continuation of the Shlicha program represents a significant milestone for JFNH and the New Hampshire Jewish community. However, in order to maintain this program beyond the 2018-2019 fiscal year, we will need your help. The Shlicha program costs approximately \$70,000 per year. We dipped into our cash reserves to make this program possible last year and this year. We cannot cover the entire cost again from cash reserves. We will have to raise money from our members in order to keep it going.

We look forward to the eleventh year of the New Hampshire Jewish Film Festival, a significant and wonderful event that brings our state's Jewish population together to enjoy Jewish-themed films in multiple venues.

We will continue our efforts to have a positive impact in our local communities as convener, funder, supporter, and sponsor of local Jewish events and programs tailored for specific communities' needs and designed to increase Jewish awareness, knowledge, and pride. We will continue to review and expand our existing grant program to increase its effectiveness and impact. We will seek out opportunities to pro-

duce and support more educational and cultural programming for our Jewish population throughout the Granite State. We will continue to strengthen our ties with synagogues and temples around the state. We also will continue to increase opportunities for social, educational and cultural engagement of unaffiliated and non-religious Jews in our New Hampshire Jewish community.

Federation's International Impact

Jewish federations also remain an effective means of mobilizing and enabling state and local Jewish communities to respond effectively to international crises and natural disasters. Through JFNA and its partners, charitable support from Jewish federations throughout the country, including our own JFNH fund, support programs in 70 countries, including disaster relief aid, security to protect Jewish sites in Europe against anti-Semitic attacks, and programs to restore and rebuild vibrant Jewish life in former Iron Curtain countries, Cuba, Latin America, Northern Africa, and Asia. In Israel, our support also contributes to antipoverty programs that reach over 800,000 young children and at-risk youth.

We cannot rest on last year's accomplishments. JFNH needs your support now more than ever in order to fulfill its mission and meet its commitment to promote Jewish continuity and life for all Jews in New Hampshire by serving and supporting a vibrant Jewish community, and fostering connections to Israel and world Jewry. Our mission is ambitious and important, and it cannot be accomplished by relying upon the income earned on our investments alone.

We can only do these things with your continuing support, for which we are grateful. Thank you to our wonderful supporters, staff, board, committee members, volunteers, and donors. We are inspired to move forward in the year ahead focused on our goals, and we are prepared to continue building a statewide Jewish community of engagement, bound together by common history, culture, ethnicity, and purpose.

The Shem Tov (good name) awards were created by the Jewish Federation of New Hampshire to recognize volunteers from organizations across New Hampshire who have provided outstanding service to the Jewish community. The recipients below were nominated by their respective organizations.

Rebecca Abrams – Temple Israel Manchester

Rebecca Abrams is a Nashua native, living in Londonderry for the past 12 years. She grew up as part of the Congregation Shalom community in Chelmsford, MA. There she was active in the local youth group, and later was a youth group advisor while attending Suffolk University. After having children who attended Jewish Federation Preschool for a total of six years, Rebecca joined the Temple Israel family to create a community that was close to home and where her children could have similar experiences to those she had growing up.



Cate Tanzer – Temple Adath Yeshurun


