

Our Friends in the Western Galilee

Note: This column was written in mid-October. Events may have changed by the time you read it.

The Jewish Federation of Springfield is one of 17 midwestern Jewish communities in a partnership with the Western Galilee region of Israel and Budapest, Hungary. Because of our involvement with the Partnership and our participation in activities such as the Book Club, the Sliding Dors Second Generation Holocaust Families, the Global Days of Learning, the delegation to Budapest and Israel, and the Women Leading Dialogue program, we have developed friendships with the Israeli staff and volunteers who manage the Partnership2Gether from day to day.

Somehow these friendships make our anxiety about the situation in Israel even more real, more particular, more tangible even than the pain and revulsion we experience from watching the horrific videos, listening to the news stories, and learning about the daily tabulation of deaths and casualties.


Fortunately, at this time the fighting has not spread to the Western Galilee area, although the danger that it will is very real. Nonetheless, everyone in the region is affected in one way or another by the war. Some of our Partnership friends including the Israel Partnership Co-Chair, Moti Yeger, have been called up to active duty. Others have sent their children off to serve in the IDF. One young man who has been living in the US and active in a US Partnership community had served in the IDF, following which he had been in the Reserves. He is now back in Israel serving with his unit. We fervently hope that all these members of our extended family will be safe in the weeks to come.

Playing with a Purpose

About a year ago, the Jewish Federation initiated monthly PJ Play Date, to enhance our PJ Library Program*. The gatherings for families with preschoolers have been well received. So far, we have had 16 kids from 10 families participate in one or more play dates.

Once a month, on a Sunday morning, the pre-school kids, with one or more parent (and yes, we have lots of "Dad" participation) meet at a Springfield Park, or when the weather does not permit, at the Federation office, for play, crafts, stories, songs and snacks.



With the help of Supermoms Kayla Morrison and Regan Marks, we have planned age-appropriate activities that bring PJ Library stories to life and explore Jewish themes. Sometimes, we explore a Jewish holiday, other times we focus on a Jewish value, but always we emphasize fun. For example, when we talked about Shabbat, the kids decorated their own "Kiddush Cups" and then said blessings (over a wooden toy challah, candles and Kiddush cup). After everyone had a chance to "slice" the toy challah, we enjoyed a snack of real Challah and grape juice in our very personal Kiddush cups. During the summer, one play date explored the concept of caring for the sick and injured. We read the story "How to Heal a Broken Wing" and then the kids painted birdhouses as they learned about the importance of empathy. Recently, the kids made artwork to send with love and good wishes to PJ kids in Israel. They made Stars of David and colored Israeli flags with lots of rainbows, hearts and butterflies. And, of course, each play date, includes time for games and, weather permitting, climbing structures.

With craft supplies, stories, songs, snacks and love, the children and their families are building friendships that we hope will last a lifetime. And the common thread is that the families are all connected through the Jewish Federation.



*The PJ Library Program, which is generously underwritten by the Jewish Federation and Neal J. Feldman Legacy Fund, provides families of young children Jewish books at no cost to the families. Currently, 30 children, ages 6 months through 8 years, receive a new book delivered to their home each month (siblings receive different books). THE JEWISH COMMUNITY REJECTS BIGOTRY AND HATE



Since Hamas' terror attacks in Israel on October 7th, we've seen bigots and extremists exploit the crisis to spread hate, disinformation, and extremism.

This is a moment of deep Jewish pain, mourning the lives taken and praying for the safe release of the hostages in Gaza – and this pain and fear is compounded by a horrific rise in antisemitism here in the United States and around the globe.

We also know that we are not the only ones being targeted in this moment. Our Muslim, Arab, and Palestinian American neighbors are facing bigotry, threats, and violence – including the despicable murder of a six-year-old child this weekend outside Chicago, by a man who reportedly espoused anti-Muslim hate.

Let us be unequivocally clear: The Jewish community rejects Islamophobia, anti-Arab hate, antisemitism, and all forms of bigotry. Particularly as extremists continue to exploit this moment, we are reminded that all of our communities' safety and futures are inextricably linked — and recommit ourselves to fighting hate in all its forms.

We stand in solidarity with all our neighbors under threat, and urge our elected and civic leaders, law enforcement, schools and universities, and employers to make clear there will be zero tolerance for any act of hate.

Since we are kicking off our annual Federation campaign in November, I had intended to use this column to "tell our story", to talk about what Federation does here in our community, in Israel, and around the world, and that all we accomplish is because of your support, care, and concerns. Now, however, the "story" is the horrific events that occurred on the Shabbat and holiday morning of October 7th – the attack by Hamas on Israeli communities bordering Gaza, the barbaric, cruel and sadistic murder of 1,400 Israelis, and the abduction of more than 200

hostages. Our attention is now focused on the ensuing war between Israel and the Hamas rulers of Gaza. Because events develop over the course of time and the situation in Gaza and in Israel is constantly changing, anything I write about the war would no longer be timely when it arrives in your mailbox. The current situation is a dire one that has left Israel mourning its losses, anxious about the fate of those held captive, pondering its alternative courses of action, and feeling threatened and vulnerable. All I can do is hope for the best – a victory for Israel, a safe return of the hostages, the delivery of a strong blow to Hamas that will deter it from future attacks on Israel, and the end of hostilities.

I do know that the attack and the war have brought Israelis together, and I have been pleased to see the same spirit of community prevail here in Springfield. Federation will continue to keep our community informed, to respond to requests for comments from the media, and to advocate for Israel. We will also be holding an Emergency Campaign to address the needs in Israel and to give expression to our support.

I have loved Israel since my first trip there with my mother and with Nancy Chesley and her mother. That love has only increased during the almost nine years of my service at Federation. I have had the opportunity to visit Israel several times and to witness first-hand the humanitarian work that your Federation contributions make possible. I mourn for the horrors that were inflicted on Israel on October 7th and pray that Israel will emerge from this ordeal safe, secure and at peace.

Another year has quickly gone by and it is once again time for our annual Thanksgiving Basket program. This is the thirty-seventh year that our congregations will combine resources, funds, and people power to provide food to approximately 1500 individuals who live in Springfield and the surrounding areas. Food insecurity continues to grow and social service programs have faced increased demand, making this project even more important to our communities.

We will be assembling baskets that allow our social service agency partners to deliver to each family. This process will provide food to additional families. We are planning to assist 280 families this year! We will need a group of volunteers early Tuesday morning, November 21st to assist loading agency vehicles. This process will begin at 7 am. There may also be occasional volunteer opportunities after mid-October to carry food into our staging area on the first floor of the Chabad building at 1045 Outer Park Drive.

Your generosity comes through each year despite uncertain economic times and we are truly grateful for your generosity. Increasing costs have led to an increase in the suggested donation to \$50 per basket, and we are thankful that many of you donate baskets for several families. We also welcome donations for half baskets (\$25.00). The entire amount of your donation goes to food and supplies. We have no overhead costs. If you would like to support this project, please send your check as soon as possible so that we may plan accordingly.
