

In my last column, I provided a behind - the - scenes view of the "Violins of Hope" programs, which took place in early September, and acknowledged the many community members who helped in the planning. I add my thanks to those offered by Federation President Karen Westbrook to all who performed and who volunteered and helped in various capacities and to all who attended. An undertaking of such significance has lots of moving parts, each dependent on one another. However, at the core of our efforts were Karen and Merle Shiffman, the quintessential planners, and Yona Stamatis, who selflessly contributed her talent and her brilliance, resulting in memorable programs filled with beautiful music.

I am looking forward to our annual fall Federation campaign, which we are now in the midst of planning. Each year, the Campaign Committee tries to find a speaker who can capture the community's attention by describing in very personal terms the impact of your generosity and highlighting the strength we achieve through our collective effort. Our campaign recognizes that we are all connected; it strives to give us the tools to build on and expand those connections and to strengthen our sense of community. This year's speaker, Jeffrey Schoenfeld, is superbly qualified to deliver that message and to share with us aspects of Federation's mission and work that might otherwise be unknown or overlooked.

From the time that I served as Campaign chair through today, a quote that keeps coming to mind is that "Campaign is the lifeblood of Federation." This has been true for the entire eighty plus years of our existence. It is Campaign that gives us the means to carry out our work – whether it's building community relations here in Springfield, delivering holiday packages to seniors, hosting a film series, or recognizing a unique opportunity offered by JCC Chicago to bring the Violins of Hope to Springfield, and running with it.

Through Campaign, you support our overseas core partners and enable them to save and change lives every day, year-round, as well as in times of emergency. JDC (Joint Distribution Committee, JAFI (Jewish Agency for Israel), and ORT reach 70 countries. These organizations are safety nets and lifelines. They deliver food and medicine to the elderly amidst challenging conditions - war, famine, and natural disaster - in countries where such humanitarian assistance would not otherwise be available. Our core partners operate in areas at risk from Ukraine to Argentina. They help to preserve and enhance Jewish life and maintain an on the ground presence for Federations, so that when, for example, an earthquake hit Morocco, JDC was one of the few organizations that could act immediately.

Little did we know how small and connected the Federation world can be. Barry Seidman, who is once again our Campaign Chair, came up with the idea of inviting Jeffrey Schoenfeld to be our Campaign 2023 speaker. Barry served with Jeff on JFNA (Jewish Federations of North America) Israel and Overseas Committee, of which Jeff is now the chair. I had the honor of traveling with Jeff when he led the mission to Ethiopia and saw him in



action. Very simply, Jeff is a philanthropist who not only gives but also does. At the center connecting this small, small world is Rita Victor, Campaign Event Chair. Rita, pre-Covid, met Jeff when they were both away from home. Jeff is from New York City and, of course, Rita is from here. One of the things they had in common was Federation. Jeff had served as President of what has been termed the "largest philanthropic organization in the world," New York City's Jewish Federation, UJA New York. And Rita, of course, is a past President of the Jewish Federation of Springfield (one of the ten smallest Federations in the country) and a past Campaign chair, who has made each of the Campaign events in which she has been involved special.

I hope you will join us on November 7th to welcome Jeff Schoenfeld, to experience the uniqueness of Jewish Federation of Springfield, and to hear how your support for Federation saves and changes lives.

Thirty-seven Years in the Making!

Another year has quickly gone by and it is once again time for our annual Thanksgiving Basket program. This is the thirty-seventh year that our congregations will combine resources, funds, and people power to provide food to approximately 1500 individuals who live in Springfield and the surrounding areas. Food insecurity continues to grow and social service programs have faced increased demand, making this project even more important to our communities.

We will be assembling baskets that allow our social service agency partners to deliver to each family. This process will provide food to additional families. We are planning to assist 280 families this year! We will need a group of volunteers early Tuesday morning, November 21st to assist loading agency vehicles. This process will begin at 7 am. There may also be occasional volunteer opportunities after mid-October to carry food into our staging area on the first floor of the Chabad building at 1045 Outer Park Drive.

Your generosity comes through each year despite uncertain economic times and we are truly grateful for your generosity. Increasing costs have led to an increase in the suggested donation to \$50 per basket, and we are thankful that many of you donate baskets for several families. We also welcome donations for half baskets (\$25.00). The entire amount of your donation goes to food and supplies. We have no overhead costs. If you would like to support this project, please send your check as soon as possible so that we may plan accordingly.

Please make checks payable to Temple B'rith Sholom, First Congregational Church, or Temple Israel, mark Thanksgiving Baskets on the memo line, and return your check with the bottom of this letter. Each congregation administrative office will collect the checks. 100% of your donation is deductible.
