# Patricia came to Jewish Family Services (JFS) for food, but she left with a new family.

On a day in November 2021, the JFS Brookside food pantry was bustling. Volunteers and staff stocked the shelves and assisted clients with their appointments.

When Patricia arrived, she quietly told JFS staff this would be her last time coming to the pantry for her 92-year-old mother, Evelina. Tomorrow, there would be a memorial "homegoing celebration" for Evelina to honor her life. The strong, proud family matriarch who worked most of her life as a seamstress at a bag factory had passed away. "She was tired," Patricia said. "She told me she was ready to go home."

Patricia was left with a house full of memories of her mother. The 75-year-old daughter had given up her home in Florida two years ago to come live with her mother and care for her during the last two years of her life. Patricia treasured every moment they had together.

On that day, Patricia told the KesherKC team she needed food from the pantry to help feed the family members who had come in town for the memorial. The JFS staff and volunteers thoughtfully offered their condolences to Patricia and sprang into action. They helped gather food, fresh flowers and baked treats. But more importantly, they gave Patricia an invitation to return to the pantry for help when she needed it.

Every day JFS connects older adults like Evelina and Patricia to resources and support to help them live independently. More than just providing food and services, JFS programs offer a holistic approach where every person is treated with respect and dignity. Every person is treated like they are part of the JFS family, regardless of faith, age, culture or lifestyle.

### JFS is different than other agencies, Patricia said.

"A lot of places don't make you feel welcome," she said. "You get the feeling that they don't want to be there, and so you don't feel like you want to be there either."

"They know me, they care about me," Patricia said of the JFS staff. "The camaraderie and fellowship is really wonderful because I don't have a lot of friends here. I feel like they are my family."
