On behalf of the Board of Directors of the Federation & Foundation of Rockland County, we are pleased to present our annual report.

As you can see from the details of the report, we continued to pivot to meet the needs of our community based on current events. Israel was a top priority, and we were proud to exceed our fundraising goals. We were also proud to begin our work with the Israel Trauma Coalition and sponsor a respite program in partnership with some generous local donors. We attempted twice to bring our feet where our hearts are by leading a mission to Israel, but both times flights were canceled due to events with Iran. We hope you will join us on a community mission in November (details to follow).

Locally, the Rockland Security Initiative was, once again, front and center, as well as all of our efforts to continue to fight antisemitism online and in a variety of forums. Advocacy on every level continues to be a core part of our activities, and we look forward to bringing the Community to Washington DC for a day of advocacy in the coming months.

We were grateful to partner with some small non-profits in our community who do incredible work supporting the vulnerable and celebrating the diversity of Jewish Rockland. Through our small grants program, we were able to support the disabled, needy families who didn't have funds to send their children to camp, and families looking for ways to learn, connect and celebrate their Jewish identities through a variety of programs. We are proud of the "gateways" our partners provide for connection to Jewish life along a broad continuum to meet individuals and families wherever they are in their Jewish journey.

MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO

As you read this, more than 650 days have passed since October 7th, 2023. Twenty living hostages remain in Gaza, and 30 who have been killed. Many Rockland community members I have spoken with have told me that they feel like time has stopped; it seems impossible to continue as life was on October 6th.

I agree with them. Nothing will be the same, ever. We've all taken on a burden, a generational trauma, that we bear sometimes with sadness, sometimes with rage, and often with a silence that looks like stoicism but is in fact a trauma response.

Yet we are not the first generation of Jews, here in the US or elsewhere who have encountered evil, either coming for our family in Israel or on our streets in America. Jews have encountered all of this before. It is instructive for all of us to learn from our collective experience.

First, we heal and we grow stronger when we take care of each other. Kol Yisrael Arevim Ze Lazeh. All of the Jewish people are responsible for one another. At Federation we live that value every day. Whether it is raising well over \$1.2 million in emergency funds to date for Israel, including funding two ambulances and four satellite relay stations for Magen David Adom this year, or training 2000 community members in Active Threat, Stop The Bleed or Synagogue Greeter training, we've learned to take care of our own.

Second, we speak up and speak out. Following up on our massive engagement last year, we brought together over 1500 to commemorate 10/7 together. We brought another delegation to march in the streets of New York City. We went to Albany and repeatedly to Washington to advocate at the highest levels for the security funding and the vital support our sisters and brothers in Israel need to overcome those who seek to destroy us.

Third, we sustain those who are vulnerable. Our allocations for the past year increased to core agencies like Rockland Jewish Family Service, JCC Rockland, Hillel Rockland and the Holocaust Museum and Center for Tolerance and Education. And this year we have expanded our reach, funding organizations dealing with food insecurity, PTSD, trauma, job training, camp scholarships and more.

Lastly we look ahead, with an eye on practicality and effectiveness. We understand that hate and antisemitism are not going away. We know that dealing with these challenges takes two hands. One reaching out to educate, dialogue, and build alliances, and the other ready to take up the tools necessary to confront antisemitism and make it more costly in social, legal, legislative and financial ways to attack us than to let our community live in peace. A key focus in 2025–2026 will be on building the resources and alliances our Jewish community and the broader Rockland community need to confront hate and antisemitism wherever it rears its head.

Nothing will ever be the same. It will be stronger, more compassionate, and more secure. You have a part to play. We look forward to your partnership!

MISSION AND VISION

BRINGING THE COMMUNITY TOGETHER

Rockland's Jewish community is unlike any other in its strengths and its challenges. Federation is the community's convener - celebrating our heritage, securing Jewish lives and institutions and congregations, acting together in support of Israel, and empowering our diverse community to take action against antisemitism

HELPING THOSE IN NEED

The vital needs and interests of the Jewish community and helping the vulnerable here and abroad are at the core of Federation's identity and agenda and are met through allocation grants, directed gifts and legacy giving.

STRENGTHENING JEWISH INSTITUTIONS

Leveraging the community's resources, Federation supports and enables expressions of Jewish identity and engagement, reaching a diverse population inclusive of background, observance, gender and race. We achieve this by delivering or supporting a range of Jewish services, programs and experiences- including in Rockland, in Israel and around the world.

CELEBRATING JEWISH LIFE

Uniquely among Rockland's Jewish institutions, Federation acts in the communal interest beyond limitations of place, platform or media, investing in Jewish life and celebrating the tradition, heritage and culture that distinguishes our community.

ACTING WITH INTEGRITY

Federation strives to maintain a steadfast ethical communal voice in Rockland, informed by consultation, partnerships, and collective action across divides both within and beyond the Jewish community.



ROCKLAND'S COMMUNITY SECURITY INITIATIVE

- CSI Conducted 150+ consultation sessions and has delivered 72 Threat Vulnerability Assessments over the last three years, helping institutions apply for state and federal Nonprofit Security Grants (NSGP)
- CSI helped Rockland institutions win 6 NSGP grants in 2023, with grants totaling nearly \$830,000. In 2024, Rockland institutions won 16 NSGP grants, totaling over \$2.2 million, demonstrating CSI's ability to assist Rockland institutions in maximizing this funding opportunity.
- CSI installed an enhanced local institutional alert network—now covering over 250 Jewish institutions, integrated into regional systems.
- CSI completed 85 tailored trainings, reaching up to 100 individuals per session. This averages almost two training sessions per week, to include Situational Awareness Training, Stop-the-Bleed, and "Run, Hide, Fight" as well as lock down drill training.

<u>CSI Organized High-Profile Community Wide Security Briefings:</u>

• In September 2024, CSI hosted a virtual security briefing attended by over 100 people, bringing together community leaders and law enforcement officials from Rockland County to prepare for the upcoming Jewish holidays.

YEAR IN REVIEW: CSI'S KEY HIGHLIGHTS

- In advance of Passover 2024, CSI held a high-level security briefing at Yeshiva of Spring Valley, bringing together over 100 community leaders and senior law enforcement officials, including representatives from Ramapo Police Department, the Rockland County Sheriff's Office, FBI, and NY State Police. CSI shared local threat data and emphasized practical steps to improve institutional security, which is especially critical during high-risk periods like the holidays.
- In June 2025, CSI hosted an Emergency Preparedness Training for local Jewish institutions, leaders, and first responders with 80+ attendees. The session focused on creating emergency plans, assessing risk, and responding to threats—tailored to the unique needs of religious and communal settings.
- CSI Coordinated security for Rockland's October 7th memorial service, held at Clover Stadium one year after the attacks against Israel. This event, attended by 1,500 people, required extensive coordination with the venue, local, county, and state police, the town attorney, security vendors, and volunteer groups.
- CSI orchestrated the security for the Israel on the Fifth Parade in the center of Manhattan that included over 60,000 people, including Maccabiah stars and freed former hostages. This massive undertaking required months of preparation to ensure the community's safety.

The Jewish Federation of Rockland raised an additional \$330,000 since July 2024, surpassing our aspirational goal of \$1.2 million. Our work is part of an incredible effort from more than 145 Federations and additional associated communities that has raised over \$900 million for the Israel Emergency Appeal since October 2023.

ANNUAL CAMPAIGN AND IMPACT



Our unrestricted campaign for 2025 (ending June 30) initially had a target of over \$700,000. As we close the campaign, we reflect on what methods worked and what we need to improve upon for the 2026 Campaign year.





Looking forward, our fundraising efforts will be improved by our addition of a dedicated staff member focused on business and corporate sponsorships, as well as further refinement in our communications and methods. Recognizing that different elements of our community will be responsive to distinct priorities, we will better tailor our asks to the impact that each constituency finds most resonant.



The total revenue for our 2024-25 campaign ended up being \$1,551,543. This is more than double our initial goal. As for who this money went to: Over 200 Jewish institutions and their members in Rockland including synagogues, camps and schools, serving a population of over 100,000. This also included tens of thousands of Israelis directly helped through emergency funds. Locally, these funds went to the dozens of campers assisted through scholarships, hundreds of JCC members, hundreds assisted through food bank and other JFS services, over 50 Holocaust survivors through social services and programming, over 400 students through Hillel, and over 10,000 students who visited HMCTE.

Federation has made allocations and small grants to several different non-profits. These new partnerships are detailed on the next slide.

NEW PARTNERSHIPS POWERED BY FEDERATION

1

Nevut

Nevut empowers IDF Lone Soldier Veterans as they transition to civilian life. Led by Ari Abramowitz, this organization provides essential mental health and well-being services to soldiers who have completed their services and returned to the United States. They use a one-on-one case management protocol to ensure that each individual's needs are uniquely met. Nevut is the only organization in the United States that is dedicated to supporting IDF veterans.

2

The Friendship Circle

The Friendship Circle is a part of the Chabad Jewish Center of Suffern. This organization provides services to families with children or young adults with special needs. Friendship Circle is focused on providing activities and experiences for the kids, while also providing support for the parents. The wide variety of programming allows for strong friendships to form within the community. Adult and teen volunteers are also a part of the organization.

3

Tevaland

Tevaland Sanctuary Farm is an animal rescue farm located in the Ramapo Mountains. It was founded as a safe haven for abused, neglected or abandoned animals. Today it operates as a hand on learning farm so members of the community can help rehabilitate the animals. Tevaland has educational and therapeutic programs. Our collaboration created a safe space where combat veterans were able to seek an alternative type of therapy for PTSD.

NEW PARTNERSHIPS POWERED BY FEDERATION

Rockland Chesed Network

Rockland Chesed Network was founded 30 years ago to address a variety of needs in the Monsey community area. They initially formed a Tomche Shabbos for Rockland County to provide weekly food boxes. Today they have expanded into many different areas including, but not limited to, camp scholarships. JFFRC has given allocations to the Monsey Camp Fund for families who are unable to afford camp.

5

Sparks

Sparks is an organization that is dedicated to providing accessible and affordable quality mental health care to new mothers. Sparks is the only organization of its kind in Rockland County. They offer treatment plans, counseling, care and crisis services for families.

6

Chabad Israel Jewish Center

Chabad Israel Jewish Center serves the broader Jewish community in Rockland County through classes, lectures, holiday events and youth programming. This specific grant was to support the Israeli Sabbaton Project. It was a weekend gathering with about 40 local families, guest speakers and journalists, all working to foster more pride and strength in the Jewish community here in Rockland.

HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE AND EDUCATION

A LOOK BACK



Federation is proud to be among the Rockland Holocaust Museum and Center for Tolerance and Education's most significant funders. The Holocaust Museum sees visits from tens of thousands of students from across Rockland and surrounding counties from local and regional parochial and public schools.

One of the programs we participated in this year was the "Names Not Numbers" presentation with Clarkstown Central School District, to further the Holocaust education to local high school students.

LOOKING AHEAD



The landscape of antisemitism has morphed and metastasized with new elements, the Federation is working even more closely with the Holocaust Museum as the integral educational element of our strategy to confront antisemitism and helping to build diversity, tolerance and respect within and beyond the community. We will be focused on programming and consultations with the school districts and local politicians.

A LOOK BACK



Rockland Jewish Family Service is the unsung hero among Federation's beneficiary agencies. Federation proudly supports their programming and services. These include Family-Based Clinical Counseling Services, Social Skills Education, Older Adult Services – especially Holocaust survivor support – and the Rhoda Bloom Kosher Food Pantry. We also enjoyed helping judge the "Kosher Chopped" competition!

In the coming year we will return to our goal of exploring and developing opportunities to support youth mental health initiatives as well as providing additional resources to Holocaust survivors in our community who receive services through Rockland Jewish Family Service.

A LOOK BACK



Under the inspiring leadership of Rabbi Dov and Shevy Oliver, Hillel brings together hundreds of students from Rockland Community College as well as recent graduates to celebrate Jewish experiences, including Shabbat dinners, Birthright missions, musical programs, and advocacy workshops. This year Federation has been proud to deliver and partner in programs addressing Jewish unity, the challenges of antisemitism, new security challenges, and productive engagement with College administrators.

LOOKING AHEAD



Rockland Community College has welcomed a new President, and is now working on addressing its significant fiscal challenges. We will continue to work closely with Hillel in mitigating effects on Jewish students. We also work with the ADL, and are now part of their local analysis in producing their college scorecard for RCC, which has improved its score over the past year. We have a continuing interest in developing a new generation of leaders for local organizations as well as involvement in Federation programming. Hillel is and must continue to be a source of volunteers for Federation programming, advocacy for Israel and the Jewish people.

JCC ROCKLAND

A LOOK BACK



Rockland's Jewish Community Campus is the center for much of the local Jewish programming, whether is Adult education classes, sports leagues, entertainment, after school programming or summer camp, the JCC has it all.

Over the past 22 months, Federation has had no greater partner than JCC Rockland in bringing the community together to stand in solidarity with our sisters and brothers in Israel in their time of greatest need. We partnered with them for our rally and parade buses, and we continue to work closely with them on significant endeavors. JCC Rockland amplifies Federation's communications and efforts to combat antisemitism and support Israel. We also had the honor of celebrating CEO David Kirschtel's 25 years of dedication!

LOOKING AHEAD



JCC Rockland and Jewish institutions across the county provide a wealth of program options to our residents. Looking ahead, Federation will work with the JCC and other organizations to find the most efficient and effective ways to deliver original programming to the broadest constituency, including outside the walls of our institutions, meeting our constituency where they are.



AGENCIES IN ISRAEL

A LOOK BACK



Federation continued to support the work of Leket Israel, addressing the needs of hundreds of thousands of Israelis encountering food insecurity. We are proud to have created a microcampaign to help fund the Israel Trauma Coalition, as well as creating opportunities to help small Israeli entrepreneurs reach a new audience and customer base here as they continue to deal with the fallout of 10/7.

LOOKING AHEAD



For the first time in close to a decade, Federation is engaging in a comprehensive review and analysis of where our community's Israel-specific funding can have the greatest impact in the long term. This is in addition to funding that we have raised and provided for emergency needs over the past 22 months. Gathering data and creating a shortlist of candidates in Israel, Federation will select key recipients addressing compelling needs in Israel in 2025.

PJ LIBRARY

A LOOK BACK



Federation has delivered Jewish themed books monthly to over 450 children across the community through our partnership with the Grinspoon Foundation and PJ Library. This was our goal for the 2024-2025 year and we are proud to have met that number.

LOOKING AHEAD



In the coming year, Federation intends to hire an experienced informal educator to develop and deploy programming commensurate with the growing number of participants in the PJ program. We aim to deliver PJ Library books and programming to 500 children and families by June 2026, developing more programming around Jewish holidays and themes, both directly and in partnership with local synagogues and libraries.

MIDRESHET

A LOOK BACK



Federation's Midreshet programming serves our constituency of adult learners with three sessions throughout the calendar year. This constituency is also very engaged in our community activities, including rallies, memorials, and programs in the wake of October 7th. It consistently sees around 120–130 lifelong learners, engaging Rabbis and Community leaders to deliver Israel and Jewish themed classes.

In February 2025, we held the Rockland Day of Jewish Learning. Over 50 registrants experienced a day with their favorite educators and discussions of important topics within the Jewish world.




Federation's Midreshet programming will seek to engage additional constituencies within the community, exploring programs for Israeli-Americans, Sephardic Jews, and others.
