RECONNECTING TO COMMUNITY

Ron Stern was born in Berlin, Germany in 1927.

In 1933, his family fled the Nazis after Stern's father was forced out of his job as a bank director, arrested and beaten by the Gestapo,

but released a week later. His extended family was forced to "sell" their home, and hardware and lumber business, to an SS officer in their small town of Montabaur.

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Tikkun Olam: Repairing the World

Jewish Federation's **Children and Family Programs** practice *tikkun olam* every day at the Bronfman Family JCC, touching lives and connecting people to community. We spoke with one woman, new to Santa Barbara, for whom Federation provides a comforting link to Jewish life on the Central Coast.

Leehe Barel is a young mother with a toddler named **Maya** and another baby on the way. From Israel, she and her family are in Santa Barbara temporarily while her husband **Itay** does post-doctoral work at UCSB. Leehe and Maya attend Family Time, a free program that offers arts and crafts, music, stories and dance for little ones and their parents.

How old is your daughter Maya?

She is two years old.

Which programs do you attend or use at the Federation's Bronfman Family JCC?

Family Time every Friday with the lovely Holly Chadwin.

What has your experience been like?

We were welcomed with open arms and a very warm atmosphere. There are lots of activities for kids, such as playing, indoors and out, storytelling, arts and crafts, and of course [the] blessing on the challah and eating it afterwards.

I understand you are here at least temporarily from Israel — welcome! Do you feel that Federation and the JCC have helped you connect with Jewish life here?

Yes, very much. When we just got here we weren't sure exactly how Jewish life is being held here. We had no idea there's such a great community who keeps the Jewish tradition so alive. Thanks to the Federation, we had a chance to celebrate Purim and Passover properly there, just like at home in Israel.

It was the Federation people who informed us about the other Jewish activities and services being held at Santa Barbara, such as Tot Shabbat at the Temple.





What would you say to other young Jewish families about Federation programs?

Message from the Executive Director



Tikkun olam, "repairing the world," is one of the cornerstones of Judaism. It is at the very heart of who we are as Jews. It is at the core of what we do at Jewish Federation, and it is the theme of this issue of *Focus*.

Tikkun olam takes many forms in the work that we do and the efforts we support. Sometimes it is an act that is immediately, physically impactful, such as when members of our **Young Adult Division (YAD)** teamed up with **Habitat for Humanity** to fix up low-income housing units or when members of our "**Schmooze Crew**" assist the larger community to feed the homeless through the Freedom Warming Centers each winter. Our **Jewish Women's Network** partnered with Jewish Family Service to provide holiday food and gift baskets for local housebound seniors. And, of course, every Tuesday, we provide a hearty, nutritious lunch and great entertainment to seniors, at no charge, through our very popular **Schmooze Room** program.

While programs such as Schmooze Room feed people's stomach, other Federation-led endeavors feed the soul. **Art at the JCC** has

We recently commemorated the Tenth Anniversary of our *Portraits of Survival* permanent exhibit, which tells the story of 39 local Holocaust Survivors through their photographs, mementos and in their own words. Docent-led tours of the exhibit have connected thousands of visitors — from high school students to police officers, from church and civic groups to elected officials and the community at large — to these profound and poignant stories, and provided inspiration to fight hatred and bigotry in all its forms.

As you read this issue of *Focus*, I hope you will consider the ways in which you practice *tikkun olam* in your own life, and I invite you to join the Jewish Federation of Greater Santa Barbara as we work to serve, strengthen and secure our community.

tedly not a religious man, stayed away from the Jewish community.

Barbara's mother later emigrated from Germany to Santa Barbara and lived with her, Stern and their daughter **Roxana**. Stern says they often talked about the war, but his mother-in-law always claimed that everyday Germans had no idea what was really happening to their Jewish neighbors. It was only many years later, Stern says with tears in his eyes, that his wife's mother finally admitted that they did know, but said "What could we have done?"

Barbara passed away in June, 2008. Six months later, Stern saw a listing in the Santa Barbara News-Press calendar for a lunch at the Jewish



Federation. He decided to attend and found a new sort of home. Noting that he doesn't

"come for the eats," Stern says he feels comfortable at the Jewish Federation, "amongst my own crowd. Jews are Jews." He has become involved as a Schmooze Room volunteer and as a docent at the *Portraits of Survival* exhibit, telling his story to a new generation of young people — some of them, as it happens, students at San Marcos High School where his daughter Roxana is an assistant principal.

And, just last year, Stern and his family experienced a small measure of closure when their ancestral hometown of Montabaur created a memorial, unveiled on the anniversary of *Kristallnacht*, honoring the lost Jewish community of their town.

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
