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

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

Engaging the Savannah Jewish Community

At the Savannah Jewish Federation, we help guide people through their Jewish journeys, from Babies to Bubbies.

The journey begins by fostering a connection to Judaism from the earliest of memories with PJ Library by introducing Judaism through colorful Jewish books and fun Jewish music. The connection does not end once a child ages out of PJ Library, they get to sign up for PJ Our Way and choose the Jewish books that interest them. Yachad then engages middle schoolers in Jewish life through fun social action events. They turn into teens and join BBYO where high school students begin to develop leadership skills and understand more about Judaism. When a teen graduates from high school and attend SCAD, there is SCAD Hillel to continue to connect them to their Judaism. And when a student graduates from college and moves to Savannah, there is Young Jewish Savannah for them to connect to other Jewish young adults and to the local Jewish community. Adults can participate weekly in the, now, [virtual] Food for Thought speaker each week.

Each initiative links to the next and gently guides a person from experience to experience and propels them to the next chapter of their Jewish Journey.

Engagement is a strategic process, not a particular program.

Engagement is the act of reaching others, getting to know them (and their passions), connecting with them and connecting them to their passions in the Savannah Jewish community.

Engagement is about creating multiple entry points for participation in the community. People want to find meaning and feel connected. We are excited to continue building community – even during these unprecedented times – and engaging the community.

We Remember Marlene Seidman-Robinowich

In May 2019, fourteen "young adults" from Savannah participated in the International March of the Living, thanks in part to a generous grant from the Dena Yaschik Bodziner and Lawrence S. Bodziner Foundation Fund of the Federation's Jewish Community Foundation of Savannah.

The March of the Living is an international, educational program that brings people from all over the world to Poland during Yom Hashoah, Holocaust Remembrance Day, to march from Auschwitz to Birkenau. And, then travel to Israel to observe Yom HaZikaron, Israel Memorial Day, and Yom Ha'Atzmaut, Israel Independence Day.

A new exhibition, curated by Marlene Seidman-Robinowich, of photographs by Savannah delegates of the 2019 International March of the Living, opens April 5 at the JEA Gallery.


The exhibition "We Remember" is a series of cyanotypes, black and white, and color photographs, documenting multiple death camps preserved throughout Poland, as well as capturing the vibrant display of life in Israel today.

Originated in the 1840's, the cyanotype was one of the first photographic processes and became known by the term "blueprint." Several participants expressed that the death camps, usually only seen in black and white, were actually colorful, even beautiful, spaces filled with bright yellow dandelions. This juxtaposition of tragedy with visual symbols of hope was both unsettling and calming. Inspired by the words of Anne Frank,

"look at how a single candle can both defy and define the darkness," color and black & white photographs are also used in the exhibition to create contrast, as the viewers are invited to experience and bear witness to the past and the present.

The exhibit will be on display in the JEA Art Gallery throughout April. Marlene Seidman-Robinowich will be joined by participants of the trip [virtually] at Food for Thought on Thursday, April 8 at 1:00 PM to share their story and her photographs. The exhibit is part of the Savannah's observance of Yom HaShoah on Thursday, April 8 which includes the annual Reading of the Names from 9:00 AM to 6:30 PM and the community Holocaust Observance at 6:30 PM. Marlene Seidman-Robinowich is an Assistant Professor of Fine Arts at Savannah State University and has exhibited her photographs and artist books nationally and internationally. Images were also contributed by Savannah March of the Living delegates.





Georgia's Jewish Senator Daniel Skidmore-Hess

pservatively in a naw blue suit white the dispossessed" as he told Moment Magazine in

Standing tall, dressed conservatively in a navy blue suit, white shirt, and matching tie, a Tanakh that belonged to the late Rabbi Jacob Rothschild grasped in his left hand, Thomas Jonathan Ossoff raised his right hand and swore the oath of office. In his suit jacket pocket, Ossoff carried copies of the ship manifests of his Litvak forebears who arrived at Ellis Island, refugees from pogroms. Ossoff swore an oath affirmed by every one of his predecessors to the office of U.S. Senator from Georgia. But this is a year unlike other years, for to Ossoff's right, also taking the oath, was the Reverend Raphael Warnock, Georgia's first African-American U.S. Senator, who shares with Ossoff much more than Democratic party affiliation but a historically connected history of striving for the blessing of American liberty. Rabbi Rothschild was the spiritual leader of The Temple in Atlanta, infamously bombed in 1958 for the rabbi's support of the reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s struggle for civil rights. Years later, Ossoff's bar mitzvah was celebrated at the temple and Warnock served as pastor at King's Ebenezer Baptist Church.

It should be noted that Ossoff is not the first Jewish candidate to win statewide office in Georgia. That honor goes to Sam Olens, elected Attorney General of Georgia on the Republican ticket in 2010 and re-elected in 2014. But Ossoff's success in the higher profile U.S. Senate election is noteworthy as an indication of the state's "blue" trend that has been apparent to close students of voting since 2008 but came to fruition in 2020. Politically, Ossoff is a liberal Democrat who credits his Jewish upbringing with his "conviction to fight for the marginalized, the persecuted and

the dispossessed" as he told Moment Magazine in 2017 during his then unsuccessful bid for a U.S. House seat. Ossoff is also a strong supporter of Israel with a strong bent for foreign policy alongside his advocacy on domestic issues. Ossoff is a graduateof Georgetown's School of Foreign Service where he took classes from Madeline Albright and Michael Oren. He enters the Senate as its youngest member at age 33, the last Senator to attain the office at such a relatively young age was none other than Joe Biden.



Young Judaea, My Year in Israel

I am currently living in Israel on Young Judaea's Year Course, a nine month gap-year program for Jewish teens ages 17-19 years old.

The program consists of a total of 220 teens split between Jerusalem and Tel Aviv. The program is split in two halves, an academic semester and an internship/volunteering semester. Each Tuesday the program takes us on a day trip to see different parts of the country and learn about each place. We have visited the Syria, Lebanon, and Israeli borders as well as a journey to the Gaza strip. At each we learned about the security challenges that Israel has with its neighbors. We also spent two days at a kibbutz in the south of Israel planting and harvesting dates.

For my volunteer track I worked with MDA (Magen David Adom) Overseas Volunteer Program (picture below). I attended a 10-day training course to become EMT certified and was an active volunteer three shifts per week. I have seen COVID-19 patients up close, patients in life altering situations, and even helped deliver a baby (I'm a chip off my Mom's shoulder).

My semester in Tel Aviv has been a continual adventure. I have had a lot of fun but I have also learned every day and grown a lot. Living in an apartment with 14 other participants quickly teaches you how to live on your own, be independent, cook and clean after one another (I've learned the value of a dishwasher!).

There was definitely a culture shock at first but as the semester progressed I could see myself and my peers becoming more and more independent.

Living in a foreign country has forever changed me as a person. I'm so thankful and privileged to be able to attend this program and experience what life is like in Israel. I am looking forward to my next $4\frac{1}{2}$ months of adventures and learning in Jerusalem before returning back to the States.

JELF Helps Students Continue Education Through Crisis



Before COVID, Joshua Elbaz had decided to become a lawyer. It was important to him to help people, like his brothers, that had passed away pre-COVID. The challenge was to get the money he needed for law school. He got federal loans, worked several jobs -- and turned to JELF (Jewish Educational Loan Fund) for those final dollars. Then he caught coronavirus.



JELF helps students fund their higher education and avoid as much interest as possible. According to the Department of Education, 70% of college students graduate with student debt.

When the pandemic hit, Joshua had just started law school and was living in his father's house, where his grandmother also lived. After suffering a fall, she was taken to the hospital. She contracted COVID and unknowingly passed it to Joshua and his father. Joshua's grandmother recovered, but sadly, Joshua's father Robert, died at age 65. When paramedics came to the house for his father, they realized that Joshua was extremely ill. Joshua spent two weeks on oxygen. After recovering, he returned home to face the loss of his father -- and his first year of law school. "If I quit, all the hard work that my father and brothers watched me put in would be for nothing. So, I continue on in their memory."

JELF was there to help. As JELF's President, Jane Aronoff, recently said, "With JELF, your dollars do great things today. Then when paid back, they help more and more." Since the organization first started providing interest-free loans in 1961, JELF has loaned over \$14.5 million to 2,000+ Jewish students.

JELF's application is open from March 1 - April 30 and then again September 1 - 30 each year. Students and parents learn more and sign up for reminder emails at JELF.org.
