JCBA LAUNCHES \$1.5 MILLION CAMPAIGN

Campaign co-chairs Sheri and Stuart Glauberman have announced a \$1.5 million goal for the Jewish Community Board of Akron (JCBA) 2020 Annual Campaign. The goal, a ten percent increase over last year's campaign results, was approved by the JCBA Board of Directors at its May 2019 meeting.

"The \$1.5 million is needed to care for the vulnerable, enhance Jewish Life, and ensure a Jewish future," said the Glaubermans. "By investing in JCBA's annual campaign, you help the person around the corner and the world."

JCBA works with local, national, and international agencies to transform lives and deliver hope, dignity, and comfort to millions of people, ordinary people facing extraordinary needs.

Locally, JCBA directly supports several programs in the Akron Jewish community including, but not limited to, The Lippman School, The Shaw JCC, Rubber City Jews, Jewish Family Service Akron, and the Summit County Board of Rabbis. Additionally, JCBA oversees the J-Ticket Program, the Jewish Community Endowment Fund, and serves as the administrator of the Schultz Campus for Jewish Life.

There are several steps taken before Annual Campaign dollars raised are distributed.

Every year, the agencies submit proposals to a special JCBA Allocation Committee – comprised of experienced, community-minded volunteers – requesting funds for Jewish programs for the upcoming fiscal year. The committee reviews the proposals in a thoughtful process and balances the needs and the monies available to ensure your investment has the greatest impact.

JFS launches Shalom Café

Helping connect Survivors to the community.

JCBA rewards best ideas in community innovation

For the first time, the Jewish Community Board of Akron is accepting applications for community innovation grants from anyone regardless of age in the Summit County Jewish community.

"I don't believe that all the best ideas for the community are in the synagogues or the campus," said Todd Polikoff, CEO of the Jewish Community Board of Akron. "I think there are people out there who live a Jewish life and they'd say, you know it would be great if we had this. I want to hear those people. And the community needs to hear those people."

Polikoff estimates there are 3,000 to 5,000 Jews in Summit County. Any of them may apply. The top proposals in each of three categories will be funded up to \$5,000 each to launch the projects.

The categories are young family engagement, Israel and Jewry connections, and community volunteerism.

"We're going to have sort of a 'Shark Tank' thing," he said "They come in, they pitch their idea. There's an application online." Polikoff said if the idea works, then the Jewish Community Board of Akron will consider making the project part of its allocation process.

"A lot of this is just engaging the community in the work of Jewish community," he said, adding that there is a common perception that in order to win funding people need to be on a board or committee.

"Oftentimes, people come with ideas and they don't think, they don't ask what happens if it work," Polikoff said. "They go immediately to what happens if it doesn't work. ... If it works, then there's a lot of work to maintain it."

The Annual Campaign is not merely a vehicle for raising funds to support the programs and initiatives of our community agencies and synagogues. It is also our collective answer to the family that can't afford Jewish education, to the infirm elderly that can't leave their homes for food or medical treatment, to the next generation that is seeking direction on how best to identify with their Jewish heritage,



and to stand with our brothers and sisters in Israel and in 70 countries around the world. This is the power that you wield through your investment in JCBA.

I hope that you will take a few of today's 1,440 minutes while you are reading this article - and consider investing in the JCBA Annual Campaign. If you've never invested before, please do, if you have, please consider an increase to help meet the increasing needs.

Lastly, regardless of the ups and downs that come with the position of CEO of the Jewish Community Board of Akron, I continue to feel incredibly fortunate to be in this position and to serve this terrific community.

Applications are available at Jewishakron.org and are due by Dec. 2. They require a budget, a maximum 1,000-word description of the proposal and a maximum 500-word description of first-year goals.

Polikoff said a committee of businesspeople and entrepreneurs will vet the projects and decide a winner in the first quarter of 2020. The winners will be expected to deliver progress reports.

"We want to hear the idea and I think \$5,000 is a decent amount of money to put behind it to incentivize people to come up with something," he said. "I want to get people thinking about community who are not just the professionals and lay leaders."

"Shalom Café"

With support from the Jewish Federations of North America, Jewish Family of Service launched "Shalom Café" in the summer for Holocaust Survivors living in the greater Akron area. Shalom Café is a socialization program designed to bring local Survivors together to experience a variety of meaningful social activities. It is also an opportunity for Survivors



who may not be connected to Jewish Family Service, to engage with the programs offered through JFS.

The Beth El Congregation on the Schultz Campus for Jewish Life has generously donated the space for the program to operate. On average, 15 Survivors gather each month in the Mercaz room for planned activities. Beth El's own Hazzan Mathew Austerklein has performed twice for Shalom Café participants. In addition, Rabbi Elyssa Austerklein of Beth El hosted a special Simchat Torah service on October 22nd, with lunch for all following the service. Other Shalom Café activities have included field trips to a local orchard this past summer and a tour of Cleveland on the "Lolly the Trolly."

Looking forward, on November 17th, Survivors will be entertained by the Rubber City Jews (a young professionals group) with a program that will include music, story sharing, and socialization with the group members.

A friendly visitor program also helps connect Survivors to the community. Survivors currently living in a long term care facility can also receive friendly visits by either an agency volunteer or a JFS staff member. Recently, festive holiday baskets were delivered by volunteers and staff to help Survivors celebrate the High Holidays.

In addition to the new Shalom Café activities and friendly visitor program, Survivors can receive a variety of services from JFS designed to maintain their independence and live safely at home. A bi-lingual Russian speaking case manager works directly with Survivors to determine what benefits they might quality for, including reparations from the German government or other available subsidies to help pay for medical needs like hearing aids or dentistry. Other JFS services include homecare and care coordination.

The Women's Reform Judaism (WRJ) has been a leading advocate for reproductive rights and health, adopting more than a dozen resolutions affirming a strong and vocal stance and mobilizing its members to speak out for the rights of those who are pregnant to exercise autonomy over their bodies. Banning potentially life-saving medical procedures and interfering with a doctor's and a patient's decision runs contrary to the Jewish commandment to protect life. Campaign Community Impact: Advancing Holocaust survivor care

Holocaust survivors bore witness to the worst of humanity, and their resiliency showed us the best.

There are more than 100,000 Holocaust survivors in the United States today. Many are aged 85 or older, and one in four lives in poverty. Many live alone and are at risk for social isolation, depression, and other physical and mental health conditions stemming from periods of starvation, disease, and torture.

With a grant from the Jewish Federations of North America, the Jewish Family Service Akron (JFS) is changing the lives of this vulnerable population through innovative programs and services. JFS is also supported by your investment to the Jewish Community Board of Akron's (JCBA) Annual Campaign.

Here's how you have powered Holocaust survivor care, right here in the Akron Jewish community:

- Shalom Café brings together Holocaust survivors to experience a variety of meaningful social activities. On average, 15 survivors gather monthly at Beth El Congregation located on the Schultz Campus for Jewish Life. Hazzan Mathew Austerklein has performed, and Rabbi Elyssa Austerklein hosted a special Simchat Torah service on Oct. 22 with lunch for all following the service. Other Shalom Café activities have included field trips to a local orchard this past summer and a tour of Cleveland on the "Lolly the Trolly."
- On Nov. 17, Holocaust survivors will be joined by the Rubber City Jews, a young professionals group funded by JCBA, with music, story sharing, and socialization.
- Connecting survivors to the community, a friendly visitor program ensures that survivors living in long-term care facilities receive visits (and festive holiday baskets) from agency volunteers or a JFS staff member.
- Survivors benefit from a variety of JFS services that help them maintain their independence and live safely at home. A bi-lingual Russian speaking case manager works directly with survivors to determine what benefits they might qualify for, including reparations from the German government or other available subsidies to help pay for medical needs like hearing aids or dentistry.
- Other JFS services include homecare and care coordination.

Just as it is imperative never to forget the Holocaust, it is essential to care for its survivors now. We have the opportunity to provide support, needed attention, and concern for those who need it most.

Retired Akron Public School teacher Irv Korman, the author of The Legend of Hannukah Harry, released his latest children's storybook, A Mess and Andy, now available through Amazon.

One day, Andy's mother is amazed to find Andy's room tidy. She praises him, but he denies doing it. It was somebody else. Korman is also a theatre critic, actor, clown, and magician. He has been performing in plays for 60 years, ever since he was given the role of the king in "Breakfast for the King" in first grade. Thom Mandel fondly remembers father, Morton

Morton L. Mandel surrounded himself with smart people, listened carefully, and had a charisma that allowed him to connect with people of all ages, said those who benefited from his advice.

Mandel, 98, died Oct. 16 at his home in Palm Beach, Fla.

Thom Mandel, Morton L. Mandel's son, remembers watching his father graduate in 2013 from Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland.



Thom Mandel, adding that his capstone project was his 2012 book, "The Power of Who," which he co-authored with John Byrne. "I know he had to defend his dissertation in front of a panel of professors, one of whom assumed, told me that before the session that they assumed some that this would be some guy being honored by the university who had a book that was probably written by a ghostwriter and he wouldn't know the material very well because he didn't write it. And the reality was, yes, John Byrne assisted him in writing it and really was his editor, but my dad wrote every word. He just had a lot of assistance from John. When he got to the dissertation and appeared before the professors, they were all really, really impressed with how knowledgeable he was. They couldn't catch him without an answer to anything."

Mandel said his father marched with the undergraduates.

"And then at the graduation, he marched with the M's," he said. "He was, at the time, 70 years older than everyone else around him. And it was funny because we were up in the front row sitting with the trustees of the university, who many of them weren't on stage. We looked in the back of the room and see one place there are all these students standing up in huddle around somebody. Yeah, that was my dad. Holding court in front of about 100 undergrads that were about to graduate. When he got his diploma, he got a standing ovation from the entire room. I think that could be as happy as I ever saw him."

Thom Mandel said his last conversation with his father was about ten days before he died.

"I did have a chance to sit with him about a week-and-a-half ago," he said. "The doctor said I could sit with him for an hour. I wound up being there for two hours, 21/2 hours. He just couldn't stop talking. And we truly talked about everything."

Mandel's last moments were well-orchestrated, his son said.

"Yes, he knew he was close," he said. "He wanted to see us all before he passed away. He wanted to see us all together. And we all got there. And we all sat with him. He passed away quietly while we were sitting with him. It's almost as if he knew how long it would take us to get there, and he knew how long he had. And he had it timed perfectly. The trains always leave on time."
