# JCBA Invests in Community Security

The Jewish Community Board of Akron has long been committed to the safety and security needs at the Schultz Campus for Jewish Life which is home of the Shaw JCC of Akron, The Lippman School, Jewish Family Service of Akron, Schultz Towers and Beth El Congregation. In recent years, significant upgrades to security measures have been made to the Campus achieved through grant funding from the state of Ohio, and time and effort have been made to develop security protocols.

Recent synagogue shootings in Pittsburgh and Poway, California, as well as violent attacks against other religious institutions, have demonstrated the importance of working together as the Akron Jewish community – including Temple Israel and Anshe Sfard Revere Road Synagogue – to develop a crisis communications plan, assess risks and address physical vulnerabilities, share knowledge and resources and implement a long-term security strategy we hope that we will never have to use.

On May 14, the Schultz Campus for Jewish Life welcomed special guests from the Summit County Police Chiefs Association plus Jim Hartnet, Director of Community Wide Security, Jewish Cleveland and John Breen, Special Agent and Joint Terrorism Task Force Coordinator Cleveland Division of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

"It is essential our community is able to continue to grow and prosper while ensuring that we are safe and aligned in our responses to crisis. Security has been and always will be a priority for the JCBA, but in the face of an increased number of tragic and hateful events, we must redouble our efforts on behalf of our entire Jewish community," said Todd Polikoff, JCBA CEO.

Since February, the JCBA has convened community leaders to address communication protocols, and this group subsequently engaged The Impact Group, a local public relations agency and recognized industry expert in crisis communications strategy, to develop a training and communications plan that will unite the messaging and crisis response plans of our Jewish communal organizations in the Akron area.

By the end of July, the Impact Group will provide an actionable plan as well as guidance on how the separate organizations will stay connected and respond promptly and effectively when communication efforts are needed. Additionally, the collaboration will include stakeholder engagement, in-person training in crisis communications response, and community education initiatives.

The JCBA continues to work closely with the Secure Community Network (SCN), a nonprofit entity funded by the Jewish Federations of North America whose purpose is to focus on safety training, security advice and intelligence sharing in the Jewish community. The SCN coordinates with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security as well as local law enforcement agencies to protect the Jewish community and is staffed by former members of the U.S. intelligence community.

Their training efforts have been credited with the saving of lives in the Tree of Life synagogue shooting in Pittsburgh. When an attack does occur, SCN is on the ground to help that particular Jewish community respond and recover.

A state-of-the-art emergency notification and communication system (SCNAlert) has been acquired and will be implemented in the coming months, as Akron Jewish communications groups are established.

"Through JCBA's partnerships with The Impact Group and SCN, we will work together to initiate security protocols that raise awareness for our shared values and strengthen the safeguards in our community," said Polikoff. "The JCBA will be further updating everyone in the coming weeks and months."

Monies raised through JCBA's Annual Campaign go toward funding the Akron Jewish community's crisis communications plan and SCN. The JCBA Board of Trustees recently voted to approve a \$25,000 allocation to fund a comprehensive security assessment for the community.

# Akron Jewish Community Gathers in Wake of Attacks on Israel to Mourn and Commemorate

As Israel was under attack by rockets launched from Gaza, people gathered at the Schultz Campus for Jewish Life to mourn the loss of Israeli soldiers and civilians and to celebrate the birth of the state of Israel on May 5.

"23,741 soldiers lost their lives for the sake of Israel, 56 of them this year," said Mor Roffe, Israeli emissary for the Jewish Community Board of Akron and the Canton Jewish Federation. "All of that, in addition to many citizens who lost their lives in terror attacks in Israel and the world due to anti-Semitism and hate. Three of them today, from the non-stop rocket shootings toward Israel."

After the about 150 people stood to listen to the sound of an Israeli siren, Rabbi Moshe Sasonkin, who leads Anshe Sfard Revere Road Synagogue in Bath Township, spoke.

"The siren that we're listening to is all too familiar as we're hearing over the last day or two, the sirens ... keep on going on in Israel, with children running to the shelters," Sasonkin said. "And I would be remiss not to mention the three Israelis that lost their lives over the last day in the attacks of Israel."

He chanted *Yizkor* in memory of soldiers of the Israel Defense Forces and those lost to terrorism or murder.

"May the fallen of the wars of Israel be crowns of victory and may their names be inscribed upon the hearts of Israel for all generations," he translated.

Cantor Kathy Fromson chanted "*El Malei Rachamim*," the memorial prayer.

Rachel Osherow played piano and sang "Ani Gara Mul Hamayim," which translates to, "I live by the water."

Rabbi Elyssa Austerklein of Beth El Congregation in Akron read the Prayer for the State of Israel, chanting it in Hebrew and reading the translation: "Bless the Land with peace, and its inhabitants with lasting joy."

Todd Polikoff, CEO of the Jewish Community Board of Akron, spoke pointedly about the attacks.

"As you're most likely aware by now, Israel is once again under attack from Hamas, Palestinian Islamic Jihad and other groups from Gaza who are indiscriminately launching rockets towards Israeli civilian population centers," he said. "Since the attacks began on Saturday morning, more than 600 rockets have been fired on Israeli citizens.

"Sadly, a number of Israelis have been killed. Two factory workers in Kiryat Gad who were not able to get to a shelter in time. Moshe Agadi, 58, from Ashkelon, died on his way to hospital after being hit by shrapnel from a rocket. A short time later, a rocket hit a car near kibbutz Yad Mordechai killing one woman. Around the same time, shrapnel from a rocket hit the oncology unit of the Barzilai hospital."

Polikoff said those who launched the rockets had a single purpose: "To terrorize and to interrupt the daily course of life of Israeli civilians. Israeli civilians, be they right wing, hardliners or peaceniks, all run into the same bomb shelters. The terrorists do not discriminate on political ideology."

Polikoff acknowledged the emotional contrast between *Yom Hazikaron* and *Yom Ha'atzmaut*.

"Now I know that this is not a typical way to start a community-wide celebration," he said. "But I believe it's important to know that our celebration means as much here as it does to those in Israel. So let's celebrate. Let's send a signal to those in Israel that we stand with them. ... Am yisrael chai."

Of course, I can include the random comments at many community events and the Mor-Israeli touch to each holiday (so many costumes!).

Those were precious moments for me. It is more than just the fun of learning or seeing something new, but the good fortune to engage authentically. I am happy I got the opportunity to be a Shaliach here in Canton and Akron. I will always remember my time here and what I learned to prepare me for my next steps in life. Thank you very much for having me this year and letting me be part of your life. I hope we will remain in touch and that you will let me know when you are coming to Israel.

# Lippman Students Learn Civil Civics with Constituting America

On May 13-14, middle school students from the Lippman School participated in two programs facilitated by Constituting America, an organization aimed at teaching students about the importance of the U.S. Constitution and the power of compromise.

Day one focused on the Constitution generally, and on day two students participated in a new program developed by the organization called Civil Civic Conversation. The facilitators helped students tackle a controversial issue to navigate a civil discourse on the topic to come up with a "compromise bill" that finds common ground between the opposing viewpoints.

Teachers in the classroom, as well as teachers located remotely, moderated the learning and dialogues. Former social studies teacher and past president of the National Council for the Social Studies Terry Cherry facilitated the programs on the ground with the help of Lippman humanities teacher Matt Russ, while Constituting America co-founder Janine Turner moderated from New York through the use of Google Hangouts.

Lippman 7th and 8th graders addressed the issue of gun violence and the 2nd Amendment by grappling with the question: Should more gun control laws be enacted? Through an examination of opposing viewpoints, students examined perspectives that were not their own to truly understand the position of the other side. In the end, they had some common ground that provided a foundation for developing a piece of legislation.

Students in the 5th and 6th grades followed the same formula to address the question of whether or not students' digital devices should be permitted in the classroom. At the end of their Civil Civic Conversation, they had developed the beginnings of a new school policy on personal technology.

Founded in 2010 by Turner and co-chaired by Turner and Cathy Gillespie, Constituting America is a nonprofit, non-partisan organization whose mission is to utilize the culture and multimedia outreach, such as music, film, television, internet, and social media, to reach, educate and inform America's adults and students about the non-partisan relevancy of the U.S. Constitution and the foundation it sets forth regarding our freedoms and rights. It is a nonprofit organization that provides its programming to schools and community groups free of charge. For more information, check them out online at www. constitutingamerica.org.

Allen and Alex Belsky, who moved from Tulsa in November, are thankful to be part of the J-Ticket program, which helped them become members of Temple Israel and the Shaw JCC, as well as enroll their son Ari in kindergarten at The Lippman School.

"Being an interracial and interreligious family, we want our kids to have both a strong African-

American and Jewish identity," Allen says. "In some Jewish communities, those things would be at odds with each other, but in Akron — especially with the focus on diversity at Lippman and the very diverse student base — Ari's able to be entrenched in his Jewish identity and still be the African-American boy he is. We wanted our children to have a good, well-rounded education, but also a Jewish education. Lippman provides that."

The community concierge program also helps familiarize families like the Stocks and Belskys with Jewish Akron. Community Concierge Cathy Baer "was the gateway," David says. She connected them with others and shared information about the community and how to get involved.

- ▶ **PulsePoints** ... PulsePoints was started by a fire chief in California who saw a need and a way for technology to fill that need. Imagine a diner at a table in one room of a restaurant goes into cardiac arrest. In the next room is someone who can help, but has no idea of the crises. The goal of PulsePoint is to increase the possibility that a victim in cardiac arrest will receive CPR quickly. The app uses the current location of a user and will alert them if someone in their vicinity is in need of CPR. PulsePoints is a combined effort of the Akron Fire Department and EMS.
- ▶ Summit County Executive Ilene Shapiro ... In one of her earlier campaigns, Ilene received more votes in Summit County than Sarah Palin did when she ran for mayor of Wasilla, Alaska! We just don't realize how big Summit County is!
- ▶ **Visiting Judges** ... Did you ever think about why some cases are presided over by a visiting judge? Where do they come from? Where do they return to? Tune in to find out.
- ▶ **Healing Hearts** ... This community nonprofit offers counseling with a personal and nurturing touch. Their goal is to "take the walls off counseling," and thus provide services in nontraditional settings.

# Silver J Ticket Promotes Senior Independence



Seniors who take advantage of Jewish Family Service of Akron's Silver J Ticket program enjoy cost savings with many services that allow seniors to live safely at home, including home health care, grocery shopping, meal preparation, laundry, light home maintenance, transportation and safety equipment installation.

Home health care services are offered through Lily Home Care. A single three-hour visit costs \$31.50 for a single individual and \$36 for a couple. Services include:

- ► Changing bed linens
- ► Help with bathing and dressing
- ► Exercises and or walking
- ▶ Medications reminders ordered by a doctor
- Providing a safe environment in areas of the home used by the client
- ► Washing laundry (if adequate equipment is available)

In addition, JFS will subsidize the cost (up to \$200) for installation of home safety equipment. This includes installation of grab bars, bed rails, hand grips, enhanced lighting, interior or exterior ramps, door widening or floor coverings to accommodate wheelchair use. Only businesses may provide these services, and a cost estimate must be obtained before work begins.

Finally, free transportation is provided to and from religious services and events at your local synagogue, as well as to the Schultz Campus for Jewish Life.

The Silver J Ticket is available to Jewish seniors, age 62 and older, regardless of income, and is made possible through a generous grant provided by the Albert L. and Janet A. Schultz Foundation for Jewish Life. Find out how you can benefit from this special program today!

#### Campus Gala Honorees Mike and Teri Segal



In the summer of 1983, Mike Segal had relocated from Connecticut to Akron for his job at General Tire, and his wife, Teri, was planning to join him a month later with their young daughters Rachel and Jessica. Driving on 77, Mike saw the Israeli flag over the treetops and followed the White Pond exit to the JCC.

"The very first guy I ran into was the JCC Executive Director Hy

Tabachnick. I told him I was moving here with my family, and he said, 'Let me show you the Early Childhood Education wing,'" Mike says. "I called Teri that night and said, 'I think I found a preschool.""

Today, Mike works for a national wealth management firm, and Teri is a retired speech pathologist for the Akron Public Schools. She continues to work part-time with preschoolers who have disabilities. Their daughters graduated from Revere High School, and now Rachel lives in the Chicago suburbs while Jessica works for the Jewish Federation of Greater Atlanta.

"(When we first moved here,) we reached out to Temple Israel, and I spoke to Cantor Gertz," Teri says. "He gave us the information we needed about the synagogue, and then before we hung up, he asked me if I'd like to teach Sunday School. I never did, but I always felt flattered."

Over the years, Mike and Teri have served in leadership roles at the Shaw JCC and Temple Israel. Mike is a Shaw JCC past president, current vice president of the Jewish Community Board of Akron, and an officer and current co-president at Temple Israel. Teri served on the Campus Gala committee, and a variety of committees at Temple Israel, joined ORT, was involved in the preschool parents' committee, chaired the community's Purim Ball celebration, served as Auxiliary co-president, and is a member of the Temple Israel Sisterhood's executive board.

"It's a win-win because you have that socialization, and you also feel like you're doing something good for the community," Teri says. "We came here knowing no one, so our friends became our family."

Together, Mike and Teri chaired Club 750 and participated in a Young Leadership trip to Israel in 1992.

"My vision for the future of Jewish Akron is to lay the foundation for continued Jewish involvement and proactively engage those folks," Mike says.

Teri adds that if people have benefitted from the open arms of Akron's Jewish community, it's their responsibility to get other people involved.

"The community has done so much for our family and us. I'm happy to have done whatever we've been able to do — individually and as a couple — and would like to continue that and pass it on," she says.

#### **Community Spirit Honorees**

#### Rabbi Elyssa Austerklein (Beth El Congregation)

In the two years since Rabbi Elyssa Austerklein arrived at Beth El Congregation, she has been focusing on building a sense of meaning and community.

"Beth El is a community open to change. I am proud of the work I do with the Ritual Committee to be as inclusive as possible within the bounds of Conservative Judaism and halacha, or Jewish Law," she says. "It is also my goal to bring meaning to every aspect of Jewish life — personalizing lifecycle events, focusing our prayers with spirituality, and bringing God and Torah to meetings and moments that may otherwise feel mundane."

With her husband, Matthew, who serves as Beth El's Hazzan, and their two young children, Austerklein has added more creative and spiritually rich services to the calendar. The couple has also reinstituted Saturday morning Junior Congregation services for children and a Consecration class — something Beth El hasn't had in several years.

Beyond the synagogue's doors, Austerklein has led prayers at meetings of the Akron City Council and Greater Akron Chamber of Commerce, and the congregation has partnered with The Lippman School, Akron Artworks and the Akron RubberDucks. And, Austerklein says, she makes a point to attend events at all of Akron's synagogues.

"I am honored to work with rabbis Brown and Sasonkin to create a sense of greater Jewish community," she says. "(I am) trying to live the notion that we are one Jewish community here in Akron."

#### Rabbi Josh Brown (Temple Israel)



This summer marks Rabbi Josh Brown's third year on the pulpit at Temple Israel, and he says his role in Akron's Jewish community is to help people connect.

"We live in a society where our primary mode of communication is through a piece of technology. People want to be part of something larger than themselves and filled with meaning and real interactions," he says. "That's what a synagogue provides, and that's what people are finding in Akron — especially in our Jewish community — because we're so tight-knit, and they're welcomed in."

Brown says the biggest challenge facing synagogues today

is keeping up with the frantic pace of the world and providing organic, authentic experiences for congregants.

#### Rabbi Michael Ross (Temple Beth Shalom in Hudson and the Hillel at Kent State University)



Rabbi Michael Ross jokes that he wears a lot of kippot, or head covers, in the Jewish community just outside the borders of Akron. As the rabbi of Temple Beth Shalom in Hudson and the Senior Jewish Educator for Hillel at Kent State University, he leads a wide age-range of congregants which comes with a unique set of challenges.

"I came to this area last August from a Conservative synagogue in Greensboro, NC, and as the new kid on the block, it's been an interesting acclimation process, but I've been able to balance those two schedules," he says.

He divides his time between activities and programs at

Hudson and Kent, and he leads Shabbat services at each location on alternating weeks. In the fall, Ross will teach a class at Kent State called "Walking with Prophets."

"It's a look at the Hebrew Prophets of the Bible and how - in these crazy, anxietyfilled times — we can have hope and vision for the future," he says.

Ross's wife, Rabbi Rachel Brown, is the Educational Director of Temple Beth Shalom and Director of Educational Learning at Congregation Shaarey Tikvah in Cleveland. They live in Beachwood with their son.

#### Rabbi Moshe Sasonkin (Anshe Sfard/Revere Road Synagogue)

Akron's Jewish community experienced a tremendous loss last fall with the passing of Rabbi Mendy Sasonkin, OBM. His son, Rabbi Moshe Sasonkin, succeeded him as the spiritual leader of Anshe Sfard/Revere Road Synagogue.

Sasonkin's parents moved to Akron in 1989 as Chabad emissaries and worked as a team for over 30 years. After attending rabbinical school out of town, Rabbi Moshe and his wife, Mussie, moved to Kent to run the local Chabad program and raise their two sons. Today, he and his wife run the congregation, education, and programs Rabbi Moshe Sasonkin



at Anshe Sfard and Chabad of Akron/Canton, with his mother Kaila, who he says is "the backbone of everything we do."

"I am continuing the legacy of my father, and I feel like I have a responsibility to continue his work," he says. "I share that same passion, and my wife does as well, to show unconditional love for everyone around them, to show that Judaism has excitement and equal opportunity for everyone, no matter what their background is."

Sasonkin says it's natural for a community to re-group after a loss, but thanks to support from Akron's Jewish community "we feel very confident that the synagogue will continue growing."

"There is so much collaboration and unity within the Akron community," he says. "All the Jewish organizations have such a strong connection with each other, and that's so vital."

#### The Rabbi Mendy Sasonkin Award for Righteousness Rabbi Mendy Sasonkin, OBM



When Rabbi Mendy Sasonkin passed away last October following an eight-year battle with cancer, Akron's entire Jewish community mourned.

Not only was Rabbi Sasonkin the spiritual leader of Chabad of Akron/Canton since 1989 and Anshe Sfard/ Revere Road Synagogue since 1995, but he was also the husband of Kaila, a son and son-in-law, a father of 10, a loving grandfather, and friend to many.

Rabbi Mendy Sasonkin, Of Blessed Memory

Community member Joe Kanfer described Rabbi Sasonkin as having "unbelievable energy, commitment to the community, and brilliance of human understanding. He had not only knowledge of text but knowledge of people."

At this year's Campus Gala, The Rabbi Mendy Sasonkin Award for Righteousness will be presented posthumously to Rabbi Sasonkin, an individual who lived, without exception, a moral and ethical life dedicated to Judaism, the Jewish people and inspiring others to follow in this path.
