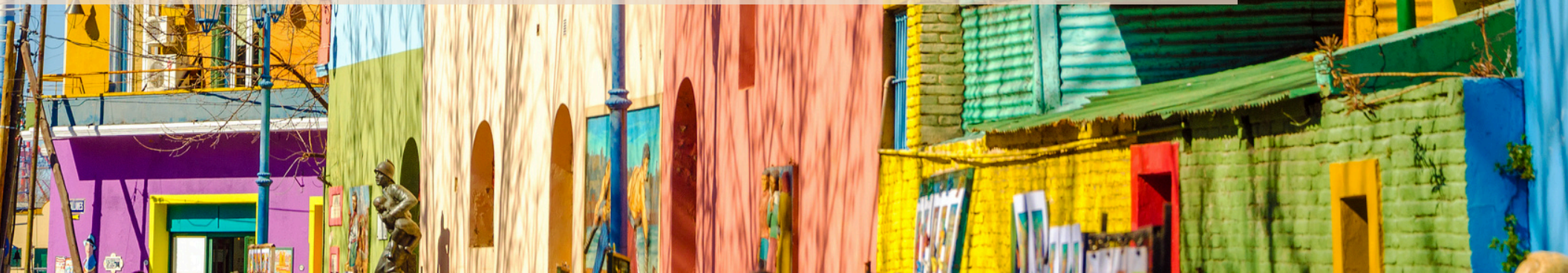

Argentina & Uruguay

Argentina and Uruguay, cradled in the southern cone of South America, possess a captivating history marked by waves of immigration, including a significant Jewish presence. These nations became safe havens, particularly during the turbulent 20th century, fostering vibrant Jewish communities that have deeply enriched the cultural landscapes. In Argentina, the echoes of Jewish life resonate through institutions and neighborhoods, reflecting both the integration and the preservation of Jewish traditions. Notably, the "Once" neighborhood in Buenos Aires stands as a vibrant hub of Jewish life, home to numerous synagogues, schools, and cultural centers, with the Asociación Mutual Israelita Argentina (AMIA) serving as a central pillar of the community. Uruguay, too, holds a history of welcoming Jewish immigrants, creating a community that has contributed significantly to the nation's social and cultural fabric. In Montevideo, the Holocaust Memorial stands as a poignant reminder of history, and the Hebraica-Maccabi Sports Centre serves as an important community hub. Both countries bear the marks of Jewish resilience, where synagogues stand as testaments to faith and community, and cultural centers serve as hubs for preserving heritage. These communities have navigated the complexities of assimilation and identity, creating unique expressions of Jewish life within the broader Argentine and Uruguayan societies.

MONDAY, DAY 1

Welcome to Buenos Aires!

Arrive in the morning after your overnight flight

Arrival transfer to the city

Visit the first avenue that the city of Buenos Aires had, Avenida de Mayo, the **Plaza De Mayo**, surrounded by the **Casa Rosada** (Government House), the Metropolitan Cathedral and the Cabildo (the first City Hall)

Walk to the Cathedral, where **Pope Francis** celebrated services when he was Cardinal of Buenos Aires

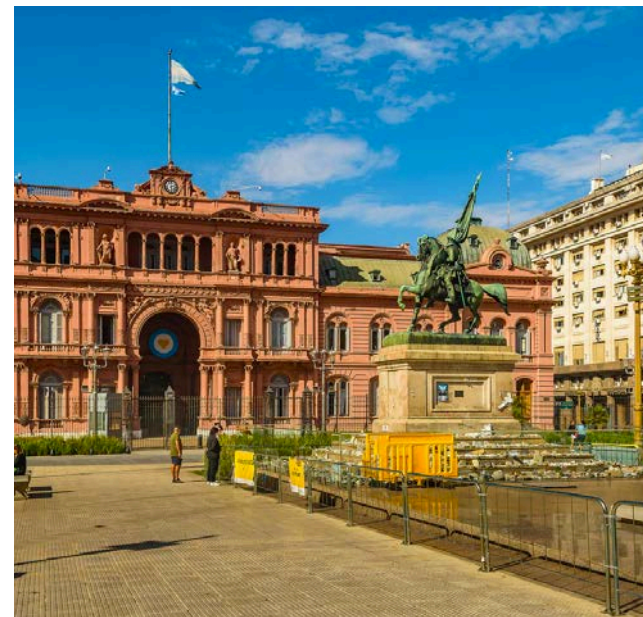
Lunch at a local restaurant

Check in and refresh before your opening dinner.

Walk to your opening dinner at **Club Frances**

TUESDAY, DAY 2

Depart Hotel.

Drive through the “**Once**” neighborhood.

You will find the largest Jewish population in the city and most of the Jewish institutions like Hebraica JCC, synagogues, schools, and the only kosher McDonald’s outside of Israel.

Tour **AMIA**, the main Jewish institution in Buenos Aires. AMIA’s goal is to strengthen educational environments to guarantee continuity and reflect the diversity of the Jewish-Argentine community. The institution works in many ways, all leading to dignified quality of life for Jewish individuals and families throughout the country, especially those at social risk. AMIA has deep ties with Israel and other Jewish worldwide communities; they also encourage the observance of Jewish traditions and cultural heritage. The tour includes a visit to the memorial devoted to the 89 victims of the bombing in 1994, built by world famous artist, Yaacov Agam.

Then meet your campaign partners of **The Jewish Agency** at **AMIA** and meet with program participants including BAMA, MASA and Birthright.

Lunch at **Al Galope** (kosher steakhouse)

Visit the **American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee’s (JDC) Le Dor v’Dor** facility for the elderly. This state-of-the art complex is home to approximately 350 Jewish seniors, and they offer a wide range of services.

Drive to the **Palermo neighborhood**, Buenos Aires’ largest barrio and one of its most walkable and trendy locations. Enjoy a bit of free time for exploring.

Return to the hotel to refresh before dinner.

Depart the hotel for an evening of **Tango**. Have a lesson, then dinner and a show. The tango experience teases the senses, combining the movement, color, sounds, and sensuality of one of the best tango shows in town.

WEDNESDAY, DAY 3

Breakfast at the hotel.

Transfer to the **Port – Ferry to Montevideo** (passport is needed)

This excursion gives you an informative and fascinating overview of the history of the Jewish people as part of Montevideo’s diverse community. The journey will first take visitors back in time to the **Old Town**, where Jewish immigrants first settled at the end of the 19th and beginning of the 20th centuries. Visitors will get to see various historic sites like **Constitution Square**, the **Cathedral** and **Colonial Town Hall**, the Solis Theatre, and Jewish sites such as the **Hebraica-Maccabi Sports Centre** and the **Golda Meir Square**.

The visit includes **Independence Square** at the center of which stands the monument dedicated to national hero, General José Artigas. Facing the square is the former **Government House** (Museum of the Presidents). The main commercial avenue “18 de Julio” lined with shops, cafés and office buildings starts here.

Drive by Batlle y Ordoñez Park, the Obelisk, “La Carreta” (Covered Wagon) monument and Centennial Stadium. On the way to our destination we will drive through the **Pocitos residential area** past some Jewish schools, allowing a glimpse of present-day Jewish life.

The journey will switch toward more recent times with a visit to the **Holocaust Memorial**, the only one of its kind in South America. Dr. Luis Alberto Lacalle, Uruguay’s former President, inaugurated it on November 10th, 1994. Inspired by Jerusalem’s Wailing Wall, the memorial is a wall with a noticeable defect: a deliberate and symbolic fracture, which represents the rupture the Holocaust caused in the existence of Europe’s Jews. Yet despite the crack, the wall still stands, as does the Jewish community here and around the world.

Breakfast at the hotel

Depart for **Colonia del Sacramento**

Free time in this must-visit historical town with charming centers, cute shops, beautiful marina and wonderful food and wine.

Lunch and wine tasting at **Las Liebres**

Depart for **Ferry** to Return to Buenos Aires (Passport is Required)

Arrival and drive to the hotel in Buenos Aires

FRIDAY, DAY 5

Breakfast at the hotel

Drive to **La Boca**, a colorful area with the famous Caminito Street. The famous **Boca Stadium** is in this area (Boca Juniors is one of the most important soccer teams in South America and known around the world). Stop for a walking tour on Caminito Street, full of local painters offering their Tango pictures and tango dancers. Time for shopping or tour **Boca Juniors' Museum/stadium**.

Proceed to **San Telmo**, the best kept historic neighborhood and oldest district of Buenos Aires.

Enjoy a group **cooking class** where you will make typical Argentinean dishes followed by lunch

Visit **Templo Libertad**. The first synagogue built in Buenos Aires and a National Historical Monument; it also houses the city's **Jewish Museum**.

Return to the hotel and refresh before Kabbalat Shabbat.

Kabbalat Shabbat Services and Shabbat Dinner

SATURDAY, DAY 6

Breakfast at the hotel

Explore **Recoleta**, the most affluent neighborhood in Buenos Aires. Tour **Recoleta Cemetery**, founded in 1822, the oldest in Buenos Aires, where you will find the grave of Eva Duarte de Perón (**Evita**). The cemetery's mausoleums and pantheons reflect the architectural diversity that emerged from the different cultures Argentina incorporated in its formation as a nation.

After lunch, a private tour of **MALBA** museum

Refresh back at the hotel followed by a reflection session before departing for your farewell dinner.

SUNDAY, DAY 7

Breakfast, check out, and drive to the airport either for your departure back to the USA or participate in a post mission to Iguazu.

Flight to **Iguazu**

Arrival and transfer to Brazilian Falls.

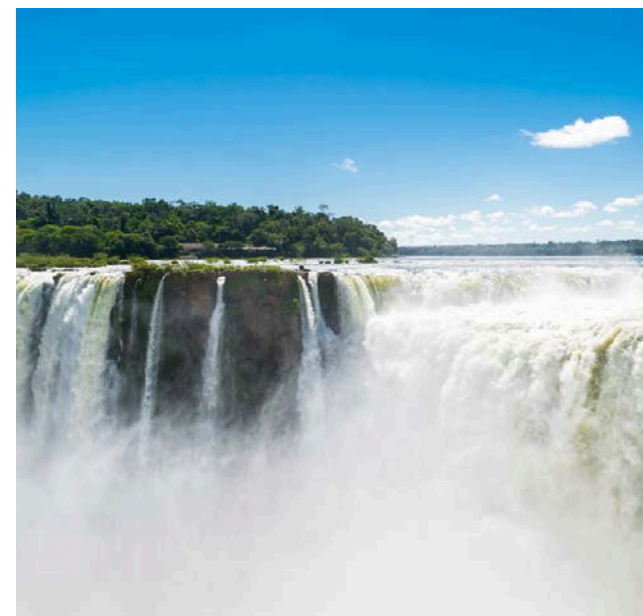
Once we cross the Tancredo Neves Bridge into Brazil, our journey takes us into the **Iguazu National Park in Brazil**. We'll pause at the start of the catwalks, offering an initial glimpse of the falls from the Argentinian side. The promenade unfolds, providing a comprehensive and breathtaking view of the falls in all their splendor. Words simply fall short in capturing the sheer magnificence and unparalleled beauty of this natural wonder.

Enjoy the best view of the **Devil's gorge** from Brazilian side

Return to the Argentinean side. Transfer to the Hotel and check in.

Dinner on own.

MONDAY, DAY 8

After breakfast, depart the hotel.

We'll enjoy a scenic ride on the **Ecological Train**, to enter the National Park

Lower Circuit: It is a walking path that has a longitude of 1700 meters. During the walk you will be able to see very close several water falls. You will see the main falls, including Garganta del Diablo, the San Martin and the Bozzetti Falls.

This circuit is very interesting as it offers the visitor the possibility of an intense contact with the falls, walking along deep vegetation, therefore having a close experience with the landscape.

The **Great Adventure** is a unique experience, that combines jungle, rapids and cascades. In all terrain trucks the group will go through the jungle, following the Yacaratiá path to reach Puerto Macuco. After boarding speed semi-rigid boats, the group will navigate on the lower Iguazú river, crossing 2 miles of rapids. At the End, the boat gets into the Devil's Gorge Canyon approaching the water falls The tour ends at the bottom of the Lower Circuit and after touring the catwalks passengers will return to the hotel.

This experience makes one feel that the falls can be watched from the quiet paths or felt from the inside.

Lunch at local restaurant

Upper Circuit: along the paths of this circuit you will experience a fantastic panoramic view of the falls. This circuit has a full longitude of 1200 meters and 6 wide viewpoints.

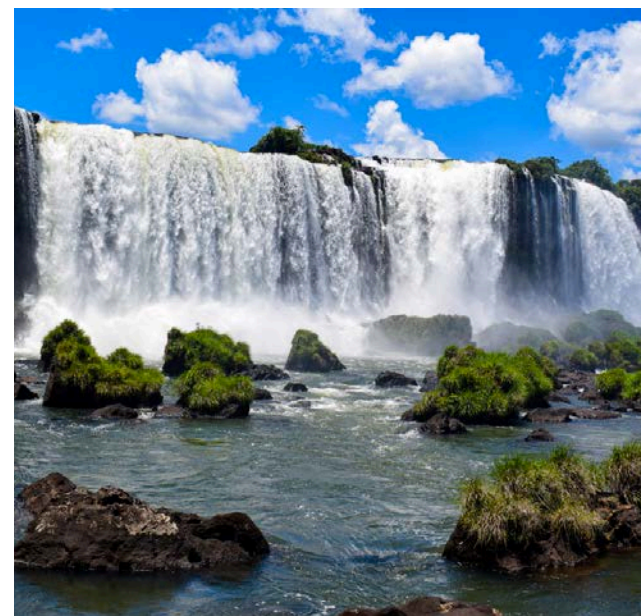
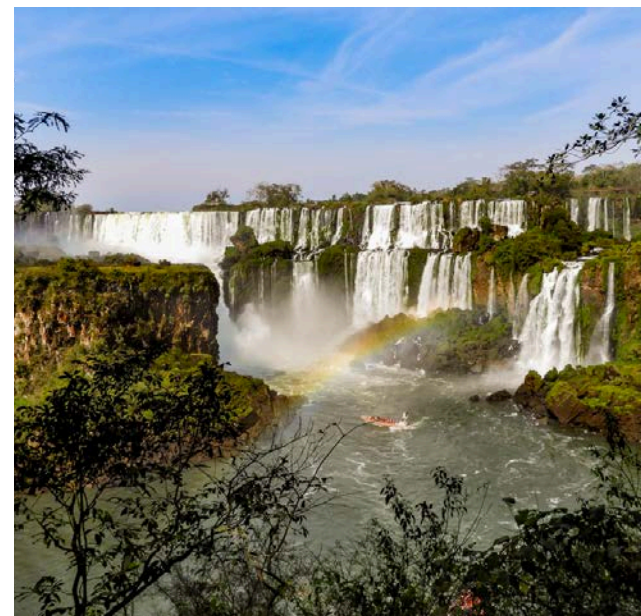

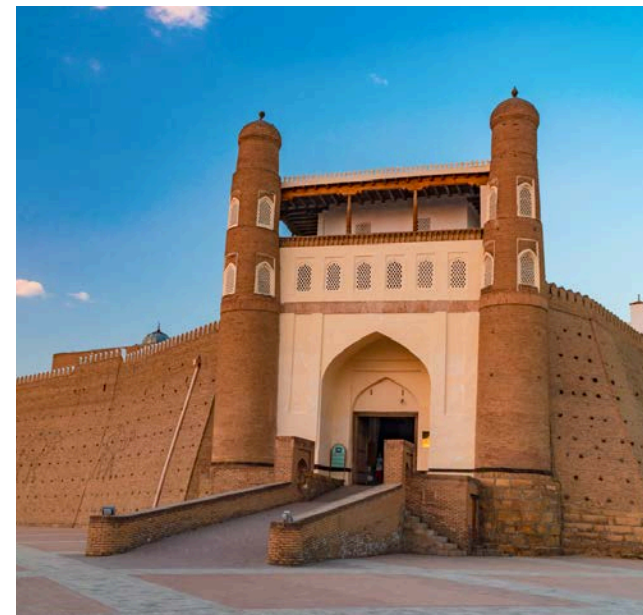

Upon arrival, your exploration begins with visits to the ancient Samanid Mausoleum, a masterpiece of early Islamic architecture, and the mystical Chashmai Ayyub Mausoleum, steeped in legend. The imposing Ark Fortress, a symbol of Bukhara's long and storied past, will also be featured. The day culminates with a visit to the architectural wonders of the Poi Kalon Complex, the Miri Arab Madrasa, and the Ulugbek Madrasa, showcasing Bukhara's rich heritage.

Today's exploration of Bukhara continues with visits to the serene Labi Hauz Complex, a tranquil oasis in the city, the unique Chor Minor, known for its four minarets, and the historically significant Magoki Attari Mosque, a testament to the city's diverse religious history. This day will also include a focused exploration of the Jewish Community of Bukhara. You will visit the Jewish Community Center (JCC) to learn about the work of the JDC (American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee) and conclude the day with a special dinner with members of the local Jewish community.

Enjoy a period of personal time in Bukhara before transferring to the train station for your journey to the majestic city of Samarkand. After checking into your hotel, you will participate in Shabbat services, followed by a traditional Shabbat dinner hosted by The Jewish Agency, providing a meaningful opportunity to connect with the local Jewish community.

SATURDAY, DAY 6

Today is dedicated to the architectural splendor of Samarkand. You'll visit the iconic Registan Square, a breathtaking ensemble of madrasas, and the regal Gur-Emir Mausoleum, the final resting place of Timur. The afternoon will feature visits to the grand Bibi-Khanum Mosque, the stunning Shahi Zinda Necropolis, a necropolis of breathtaking tilework, and the vibrant Siab Bazaar, where you can experience the local culture and commerce. In the evening, you'll enjoy a farewell dinner at a lively venue with delicious Uzbek and international cuisine and live music, providing a perfect setting to celebrate your Uzbek adventure.

In the afternoon, you'll board a train for your return journey to Tashkent, where you'll transfer to your hotel, concluding your memorable exploration of Uzbekistan.

Prague & Budapest



The 'city of a hundred spires', this is a magical place. **Prague** has a rich history that is both fascinating and awe-inspiring. During your visit, you'll get the chance to explore colorful baroque style buildings and Medieval structures and get a peek into the richness of our shared Jewish history and culture through historical facts, stories, and legends.

Bordering the Northside of Old Town, the Jewish Quarter is one of the most historic places to visit in Prague embracing the history and traditions of the Jewish community. The story unfolds vividly as we explore the synagogues, cemetery, and the streets of the former Jewish Ghetto. Who was the famous "Golem"? And how, despite the terrible purges of the Nazi occupation, did the beautiful monuments in the Jewish Quarter survive? The Jewish Quarter forms an integral part of the city. It's a fascinating story and we look forward to sharing it with you.

Budapest, the capital of Hungary, is not only a place to feast your eyes with its illuminated bridges, medieval buildings, and scenic paths but also a living museum to dive deep into the cultural heritage of Hungary. Before World War II, approximately 200,000 Jews lived in Budapest, making it the center of Hungarian Jewish cultural life. Following the German occupation of Hungary in 1944- approximately 437,000 Jews were deported to Auschwitz - most of them killed upon arrival. The communist rule resulted in the closure of many Jewish institutions and many Jews were expelled from Budapest. With the fall of communism in 1989, came a Jewish renewal for the Hungarian Jewish community. Today, the Jewish population is estimated between 75,000 -100,00 most living in the capital, Budapest which hosts a plethora of Jewish institutions. Clustered in the beating heart of Budapest's famous nightlife, the synagogues of Budapest tell a remarkable story of revival following the devastation of the Holocaust and decades of oppression under communism. Budapest's spirited atmosphere has something for everyone.

PRAGUE

- Visit the historic synagogues: Maisel Synagogue, Spanish Synagogue, Pinkas Synagogue, Spanish Synagogue, and Klaus Synagogue,.

- Visit **Theresienstadt** - the former concentration camp where 33,000 Jews were killed.
- Stroll through the **Prague Castle Complex** and get a fascinating view into the lives of the Czech monarchy.
- Explore the medieval armory and house No. 22 where Franz Kafka used to live at **Golden Lane**.
- Tour the **Strahov Monastery and Brewery** where you will walk among the 320,000 ancient books and artifacts and sample of their brew on tap.
- View the private museum of the Princely Collection in the **Lobkowitz Palace** via a special audio guide recorded by Mr. William Lobkowitz himself.
- Walk to **Lesser Town** with its charming narrow streets, unique Bohemian glass shops, marionettes and join in a gingerbread or chocolate workshop.
- Before crossing the Charles Bridge, we will stop at the **John Lennon Wall** followed by a **private boat** cruise on the Vltava River.
- Take a day trip to the **Villa Tugendhat**, the place where the book, The Glass Room written by Sam Mawer took place.

- Walk to the **Memorial for Victims of the German Occupation** located in Liberty Square.

- Take a drive to **Szentendre** known for its baroque architecture, colourful houses and narrow, cobbled streets lined with art galleries, museums and shops.
- Delight in a meeting with a viner and enjoy a wine and cheese tasting experience in a unique atmosphere at **Etyek**.

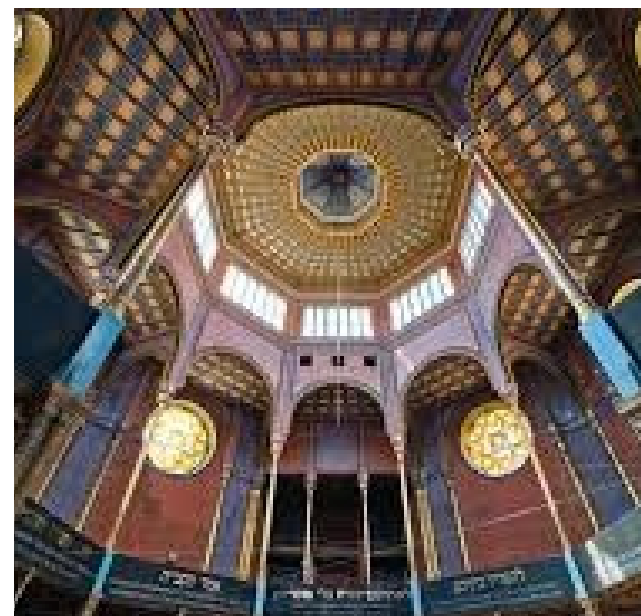
Gain a comprehensive understanding of Hungary's geopolitical landscape and its impact on Jewish heritage, setting the stage for your stay in Budapest.

Discovering Budapest's Historic Jewish Quarter

Embark on a captivating walking tour through Budapest's historic Jewish Quarter. This vibrant neighborhood is not just a relic of the past but a living, breathing community. Wander through the intricate streets and feel the pulse of history at every corner. Marvel at the grandeur of the **Dohány Synagogue**, one of the largest in the world, and pause to reflect at the Raoul Wallenberg Holocaust Memorial Park. Wander through the **Jewish Museum** in the Hertzl family home led by young adults from The Jewish Agency-supported Israeli Cultural Institute (ICI).

Visit the **Mozaik Jewish Community Hub** in the newly renovated **Rumbach Synagogue** - The Mozaik Jewish Community Hub, an initiative by JDC, serves as an incubator for non-profit organizations and grassroots initiatives within the Jewish ecosystem, aimed at strengthening Jewish life in Hungary. Engage in discussions that explore the rich Jewish heritage woven through these streets and embodied by this program.

Take a leisurely break for lunch on your own in Budapest's charming old town area. This is the perfect opportunity to savor Hungarian cuisine, whether it's a cozy café or a bustling market stall. Relish the flavors, soak in the atmosphere, and recharge for the afternoon ahead.

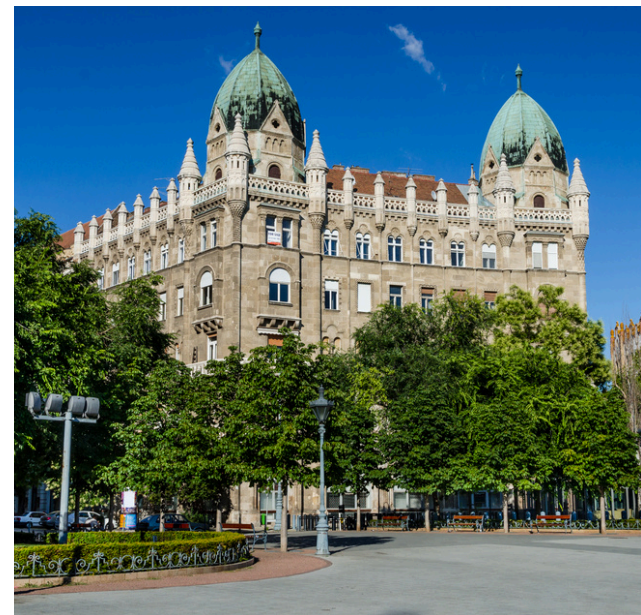

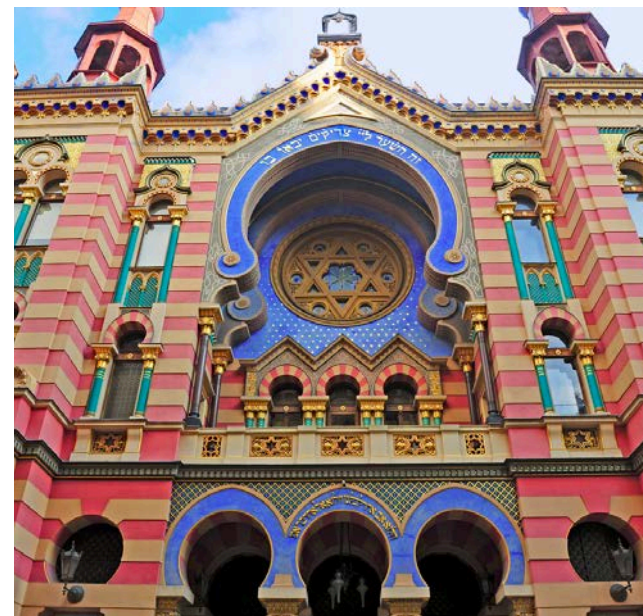

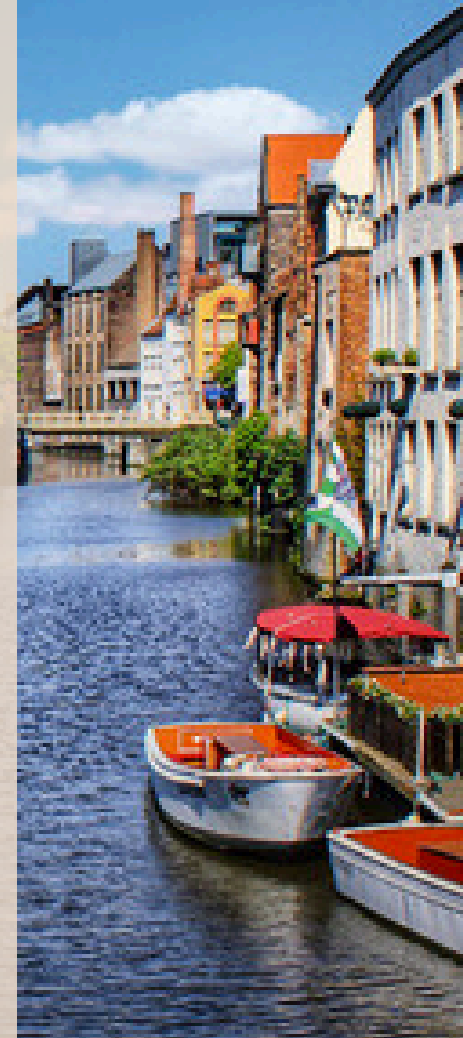
Berlin & Belgium

Berlin is the largest city in Germany and one of the largest cities in the European Union. Berlin is the capital of the world's fourth-largest economy. As the most eastern city of Western Europe and the most western city of Eastern Europe, it is packed with juxtapositions and contradictions.

For centuries, Berlin had a vibrant Jewish culture and was the birthplace of important Jewish movements such as the Jewish Enlightenment and the Reform and Modern Orthodox movements. The 1933 census counted 160,000 Jews living in Berlin, but in less than 15 years, the Jewish population of Berlin was reduced to 8,000. Hitler's 'Final Solution' had decimated the Jewish population of Berlin and many of Berlin's Jewish institutions, synagogues, schools, and cultural sites were destroyed during the war.

Join us in Berlin and see how Berlin's government is striving to make Berlin a city that once again welcomes Jews and our unique culture. Perhaps the sheer existence of the memorials you will see throughout the city to honor the six million Jews who were murdered by Hitler's Germany is a testament to the hopeful future for Jews in Berlin.

Nestled between the Netherlands to the north and France to the south - lies tiny, beautiful **Belgium**. Boasting one of the most beautiful canal cities in Europe, stunning architecture, a riveting history, and, of course, delicious Belgian food—most famously Belgian chocolate. Jews enjoyed full civil rights in Belgium, except under the Nazi occupation. During this dark chapter of our history, a great number of Belgian citizens actively countered the Nazi anti-Semitic policy by hiding numerous Jews. These actions allowed more than half of the Jewish population residing then in Belgium to survive. After World War II, the Belgian Jewish community flourished again. It now numbers about 40,000 people, most of whom reside in Antwerp or Brussels. Towns and cities stuffed with medieval buildings, soaring bell towers, Flemish artistry and meandering canals tell of its rich history. And the best beer, chocolate and waffles in the world are reasons enough to visit Belgium.

Hassan Tower is the **minaret** of an incomplete mosque in Rabat that was intended to be the largest minaret in the world, and the mosque, if completed, would have been the largest in the western Muslim world. When al-Mansur died in 1199, construction on the mosque stopped. The minaret was left standing at a height of over 144 feet tall. The rest of the mosque was also left incomplete, with only the beginnings of several walls and 348 columns being constructed. The tower, along with the remains of the mosque and the **Mausoleum of Mohammed V**, located across from the Hassan Tower and contains the tombs of the Moroccan king Mohammed V and his two sons, late King Hassan II and Prince Abdallah, forms an important historical and tourist complex in Rabat.

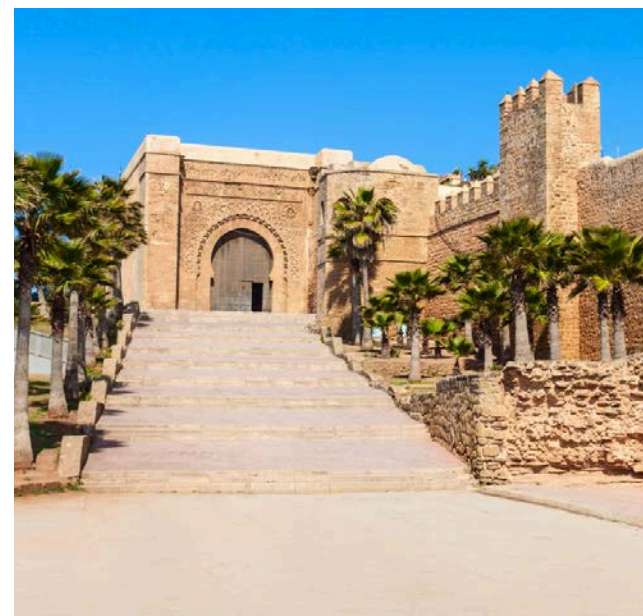

The **medina of Fes El Bali** the largest car-free urban area in the world. Inside its medieval walls is an intriguingly paradoxical place that's at once chaotic and calm. Half the population lives in this crowded warren of narrow passages, mosques, souks, artisan workshops and humble homes. The sounds of daily life, multiple languages—namely Arabic, Berber, and French—and muezzin (the call to prayer) echo through the corridors. We will explore the complexity of this centuries-old puzzle as we wander through the Medina including a VIP tour of the **Dar Batha Museum** - a former royal palace, a stop at the **House of Rambam** (Maimonides) - a well-trained physician revered for his saintly personality as well as his writings and to the **Chouara Tanneries**- the ancient craft of tanning and dyeing, in all its visceral authenticity and a stop at the **King's Palace** well known for its golden gates and its highly ornate exterior wall. **Weaver's foundouk** - an open-air market found through a literal hole-in-the-wall on the edge the Fez medina does not seem a likely source for those red-and-indigo blankets, the **Madrasa Boulnania** -the only madrasa in Morocco which also functioned as a congregational mosque. It is widely acknowledged as a high point of Marinid architecture and of historic Moroccan architecture generally and the University of Al -Qarawiyyin.

Lunch at **Nejjarine restaurant**

The Mellah of Fez is the historic Jewish quarteris located in the part of Fez which contains the Royal Palace (Dar al-Makhzen), and is believed to date from the mid-15th century. While the district is no longer home to any significant Jewish population, it still contains several monuments and landmarks from the Jewish community's historical heritage in the city including **Ibn Danan Synagogue**, the **El Fassiya Synagogue**, the **Jewish cemetery**, and the **Jewish Museum of the EmHabanim synagogue**.

Koutoubia Mosque: One of the best examples of the Hispano-Moresque art, which combines apparent simplicity with superb craftsmanship and restrained luxury. With its minaret rising 252 feet into the sky, it is certainly one of the most impressive sights in Marrakech.

Jewish Quarter: Start with a visit to the Mellah. Visit the 500-year old **Slat Al Azama synagogue**. This is the oldest and most picturesque synagogue in Marrakech. It is also known as the synagogue of the Dissidents. It was built in 1492 by Sephardi Jews fleeing Spain. Stop by at the **Jewish Cemetery**. Visit the **Bahia Palace** with its extraordinary tiles, opulent courtyards and fountains built by Sultans amidst a two-acre garden. Stop at **Souq Place D'epice**.

Visit to the **Herbalist**

Souks: It is a riot of color, noise and activity, a wealthy storehouse of all the treasures of this vast and varied country. You will find all the silver merchants in one corner, all the gold merchants in another, and rows of stalls selling exclusively leatherwork or copper goods or jewelry. The real fascination is to watch the craftsmen at work, gilding on leather, or inlaying with enamel the sheaths of ornate silver daggers, hammering out copper, embroidering silks or smoothing out the surface of cedar wood table.

Yves Saint Laurent Museum: A museum entirely devoted to the work of the legendary fashion designer, Yves Saint Laurent. The new building, situated on Rue Yves Saint Laurent and adjacent to the renowned Jardin Majorelle, spans over 4,000 m² and is more than just a museum. It features a 400 m² permanent exhibition space where the work of Yves Saint Laurent will be presented in a scenography by Christophe Martin: a 150 m² space for temporary exhibitions, a 130-seat auditorium, a boutique and bookshop, a café-restaurant, as well as a research library.

Majorelle gardens: it is one of the most delightful places in Marrakech – a small, meticulously planned botanical garden created from the 1920s by the French painter Jacques Majorelle. Now superbly mature, it is owned and splendidly maintained by Yves Saint Laurent. In the artist's former studio, a museum of Islamic arts exhibits Saint Laurent fine personal collection of north African carpets, pottery and furniture.
