# JEWISH FEDERATION OF CINCINNATI URGES NEA TO REJECT BOYCOTT OF HOLOCAUST AND ANTI-BIAS EDUCATION PROGRAMS

**Cincinnati** — The Jewish Federation of Cincinnati has joined our national system—alongside 86 Jewish Federations, dozens of JCRCs, and nearly 400 Jewish organizations across the country—in urging the National Education Association (NEA), America's largest teachers' union, to reject a resolution that would boycott the Anti-Defamation League's widely used anti-bias and Holocaust education programs.

Known as New Business Item (NBI) 39, the resolution specifically targets educational resources such as No Place for Hate® and Echoes & Reflections—programs that have helped millions of students in thousands of schools across the U.S. recognize bias, confront antisemitism, and build safer, more inclusive school communities.

Removing the very tools that help schools foster inclusion and confront hate—especially at a time of rising fear and harassment in schools—undermines, rather than advances, the goal of justice. Antisemitic incidents in non-Jewish K–12 schools have spiked by 434% since 2020, according to the ADL's 2024 Audit of Antisemitic Incidents. These resources are not just for Jewish students; they equip all students to understand difference, reject hate, and build empathy.

Public schools should be spaces of learning and belonging—not places where Jewish students and teachers feel silenced, excluded, or unsafe. Holocaust education, lessons about Jewish identity, and resources that combat bias belong in the classroom. Trusted programs like those developed by the ADL should not become political targets. They are essential tools for building respectful, inclusive learning environments—for everyone.
