WE CARE FOR OUR MOST VULNERABLE

UJA Federation embraces Torontonians in need at every age and life stage. Together with our network of partner agencies, we work to improve the lives of our community's most vulnerable. We help those who live in poverty, people with mental and physical illnesses, individuals with disabilities, new immigrants, seniors, Holocaust survivors and others who might need a hand up.

SUPPLEMENTARY FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (SFAP)

The Supplementary Financial Assistance Program (SFAP), administered by Jewish Family and Child (JF&CS) provides financial assistance to the Jewish poor in the Greater Toronto Area. The program has three components: Supplementary financial assistance, counselling and rehabilitation. In 2015, 1,443 individuals were helped by SFAP.

SENIORS PROGRAMS & SERVICES

Over 30,000 Jewish seniors live in the Greater Toronto Area and of those, nearly one-third are Holocaust survivors. Together as a community, we care for our elderly and ensure they live their lives with dignity, through the following services and programs.

HEALTHY AT HOME

Healthy at Home focuses on creating supportive environments, building social networks and connectivity for low-income, isolated seniors in our community. The program seeks to enrich these seniors' lives by providing recreation, socialization, cultural enrichment, health promotion, kosher meals and connections to other services, serving them where they live. The program takes a client-centered, creative and culturally sensitive approach that addresses the psychological, social, spiritual and physical aspects of healthy aging. Over the past four years, Healthy at Home has grown from 1 site to 12, and is now reaching more than 2,700 isolated seniors, of which 70% are Holocaust survivors.

FACILITATING TRANSPORTATION

Circle of Care provides more than 30,000 rides to 967 frail seniors living on their own, transporting them to doctors appointments and recreational activities.

ASSISTING LOW-INCOME HOLOCAUST SURVIVORS

JF&CS provides emergency financial assistance to 648 low-income Holocaust survivors to cover urgent needs such as rent shortfalls, health costs not funded by OHIP, dental care, repairs to medical and home help equipment, eye glasses and more.

PROVIDING ACCESS TO CULTURAL PROGRAMS & MEALS

The Bernard Betel Centre provides more than 3,000 English and Russian-speaking Jewish seniors with social, recreational and education programs, as well as kosher meals.

COORDINATED SERVICE FOR HOLOCAUST SURVIVORS

UJA Federation has developed a new coordinated service together with Jewish Family & Child and Circle of Care for Holocaust survivors, providing access to restitution programs, emergency funds, home care, transportation and kosher meals .



“Monisa, a 90 year-old Holocaust survivor from Khmelnytskyi, Ukraine, lives in a senior residence which is government subsidized. She was one of the thousands of isolated seniors living along the Bathurst Street corridor. After enjoying being a Healthy at Home program participant, she became one of the organizers of the manygatherings that were taking place in her building. She takes pride in helping to plan and coordinate the activities for her peers. “Feeling needed by others spurs me to continue with my very active life. Healthy at Home is a wonderful blessing for all the residents in our building”, says Monisa.



NEWCOMER INTEGRATION

UJA Federation provides funding to Jewish Immigrant Aid Services (JIAS) Toronto - an organization committed to helping new immigrants with resettlement and integration into Canadian and Jewish community life. Last year, JIAS helped nearly 400 new families settle in the Greater Toronto Area and gain access to financial relief, language instruction, synagogue participation, Jewish summer camp, Jewish holiday and life cycle events, community centre memberships and Jewish education.

WOMAN ABUSE & CHILDREN WITNESSING VIOLENCE PROGRAM

Administered by JF&CS, this program provides crisis intervention, development of a safety plan, advocacy, referral and practical assistance to women/children who are victims of domestic violence. Over 800 women and children are served annually.

ASSISTANCE WITH EMPLOYMENT

Jewish Vocational Services (JVS Toronto) offers job placement assistance and career counselling to Jewish job seekers through EMEmployment. This past year, 439 individuals were helped to secure employment and/or upgrade their skills to become financially self-sufficient.

ASSISTANCE TO INDIVIDUALS DEALING WITH ADDICTION

More than 4,700 youth suffering from addiction to alcohol, drugs or gambling receive addiction and other support services through Jewish Addiction Community Services (JACS).

INTEREST-FREE LOANS


Jewish Free Loan Toronto offers interest-free loans to needy individuals in the Jewish community to meet educational and personal needs and to create business opportunities. This past year, 235 personal, education and business loans were provided.

PASSOVER ASSISTANCE

UJA Federation ensures that the most disadvantaged members of our community are able to celebrate Passover through gifts of food and financial support. This past year, 1,069 clients of JF&CS received Passover boxes and 1,198 family members received financial assistance to ensure they could celebrate the holiday in dignity. In addition, through UJA's Global Sederto End Hunger, 1,200 Cuban Jews receive packages of Passover foods that they are unable to obtain otherwise.

RENT SUPPLEMENT PROGRAM

The Kehilla Residential Programme administers a rent supplement program that allows those living below the poverty line to have decent, affordable apartments along the Bathurst Street corridor.



CHAPLAINCY

The Chaplaincy program provides spiritual and religious care to Jewish patients/residents of 133 hospitals, long-term care facilities and correctional institutions.

HOSPICE

The Jewish Hospice Program, coordinated by JF&CS with Baycrest, Circle of Care and Mount Sinai Hospital, offers compassionate, home-centered programs to those with life threatening and/or terminal illness. Last year, 156 families were served.

WE BUILD JEWISH IDENTITY & EDUCATION

In an environment where being Jewish is a choice, inspiring young generations to embrace Jewish life is one of UJA's priorities. That is why UJA Federation places a strong emphasis on investing in Jewish education and a vast array of identity programs.



JEWISH SUMMER CAMP

Research shows that summers at Jewish camp transform Jewish youth into spirited and engaged Jewish adults, laying the groundwork for strong Jewish communities. UJA Federation's incentive program, One Happy Camper, provides a one-time incentive grant of up to \$1,000 to first-time overnight campers. Since its inception in 2009, grants have been awarded to 2,236 children.

SUMMER CAMP SCHOLARSHIPS

Through JF&CS and JIAS Toronto, UJA Federation provides financial assistance that enables more than 350 children of low-income families to attend Jewish day and overnight summer camp.

JULIA AND HENRY KOSCHITZKY CENTRE FOR JEWISH EDUCATION

The Julia and Henry Koschitzky Centre for Jewish Education is UJA Federation's education pillar serving 14 day schools and more than 30 after school educational programs in Toronto, including 1,500 educators and 16,000 students.

TUITION ASSISTANCE

This past year, tuition subsidies to attend Jewish day schools and other educational programs were granted to approximately 2,300 students, for a total of \$10 million for families with financial needs.

WOW!

The WOW! project is a community initiative to provide Jewish supplementary education to children who do not attend a Jewish day school. The project aims to increase participation by enhancing current after school activities as well as expanding the range of available program options.

THE SARAH & CHAIM NEUBERGER HOLOCAUST EDUCATION CENTRE

Each year, the Sarah & Chaim Neuberger Holocaust Education Centre engages over 50,000 students, educators and community members from the GTA and surrounding areas through a vast array of dynamic professional programs, events and services, to foster an understanding of the Nazi aggression during the Second World War and its horrific consequences. Education is the most powerful tool in combating the ignorance and fear that feed hate.

PJ LIBRARY

An award-winning, international initiative, PJ Library increases Jewish engagement in young families with children ages 6 months to 7.5 years. Each month families are mailed Jewish-themed children's books, free of charge. PJ Library reaches close to 5000 families in the Greater Toronto Area and has become a feeder into Jewish daycares, day schools and other educational and identity-building programs.

UJA ON UNIVERSITY CAMPUSES

UJA Federation invests in Hillel of Greater Toronto, as well as Jewish student life on university campuses across Ontario. Through exciting, creative programming and events, Hillel promotes Jewish identity, student leadership, religious and political diversity in a dynamic and inclusive environment.



YOUNG ISRAELI EMISSARIES (SHINSHINIM)

UJA Federation's Israel Engagement ShinShinim are pre-army Israeli teens who defer their army service for one year to volunteer in the Greater Toronto Area. The ShinShinim informally teach about Israel through creative programs and challenging discussions, bringing an authentic Israel experience to the Toronto community. Each year, the ShinShinim engage more than 3,000 Jewish community members, in over 35 day schools, synagogues, supplementary schools, youth movements and summer camps across Toronto. UJA Federation of Greater Toronto has the largest delegation of ShinShinim in the world – currently 24.

ARTS, CULTURE & HERITAGE

Jewish arts, culture and heritage are a powerful portal to Jewish identity and engagement. UJA Federation provides an annual allocation to the Ashkenaz Festival, the Ontario Jewish Archives - Blankenstein Family Heritage Centre, The Sarah & Chaim Neuberger Holocaust Education Centre, Koffler Centre of the Arts, Committee for Yiddish and Toronto Jewish Film Festival.

DILLER TEEN FELLOWS PROGRAM

The Diller Teen Fellows Program is UJA Federation's premiere leadership development program for Jewish teens in grades 10 and 11. Now operating in 26 communities in the United States, Canada, South Africa, Australia, and Israel, the goal of the Diller program is to develop future generations of active, effective leaders with a strong Jewish identity, commitment to the Jewish people, respect for pluralism and love of Israel. The Fellowship prides itself on producing strong lifelong Jewish teen leaders around the world, including 20 teens from Toronto.

JEWISH COMMUNITY CENTRES

Three Jewish community centres in the Greater Toronto Area serve as vibrant hubs of cultural, educational, athletic, recreational and communal activity. UJA Federation allocates over \$2 million annually for JCC programs, enriching the lives of thousands of community members by providing opportunities for social, cultural, and educational activities.

BIRTHRIGHT ISRAEL

Since its inception, Birthright Israel has sent over 500,000 participants to Israel, including 18,600 Torontonians. This free ten-day trip to Israel for Jewish young adults (ages 18-26) introduces them to key landmarks of historical, national, archeological and natural significance that have shaped, and continue to shape Jewish life. Most participants say that the trip was a life-changing experience that made them feel closer to Israel and their Jewish heritage.

MARCH OF THE LIVING

The March of the Living is a two-week intensive educational experience that takes Grades 11 and 12 students to Nazi concentration camps in Poland in the company of a Holocaust survivor, and then on to Israel. UJA Federation subsidizes the participation of high school students who cannot afford to pay the trip's full fee. To date, more than 10,000 students from Toronto have taken part.

JOSHUA INSTITUTE

The Joshua Institute for Jewish Communal Leadership ensures that new leadership is identified, cultivated, placed, tracked and supported. The program creates a network for participants as they take on leadership roles in the Jewish community of Toronto. Over the past five years, the Joshua Institute partnered to recruit, train and/or place over 100 volunteer leaders.



EMERGING COMMUNITIES

Newcomers comprise over 25% of the Toronto Jewish community, and are amongst the most unaffiliated. UJA Federation has developed the following initiatives that engage Israeli and Russian speaking Jews.

J ROOTS

J Roots is a supplementary Jewish school, primarily for Russian-speaking Canadian youth, providing a wide range of Jewish educational programming for children ages 3-14. At J Roots, students explore their Jewish heritage by learning about holidays, traditions, history, literature and developing their Hebrew skills.

LIMMUD FSU

Limmud FSU brings together and empowers young Jewish adults who are revitalizing Jewish communities and culture in the Former Soviet Union, as well as in countries with Russian speakers around the world. Limmud promises a rich educational experience and shares the core goals of diversity learning and volunteerism with other Limmud conferences throughout the world.

J. ACADEMY CAMP

J. Academy Camp is a unique sleepover camp for children ages 8-16 from Russian-speaking Jewish families in the Greater Toronto Area. The camp aims to connect teens from Russian-speaking families, introduce them to Jewish culture and help them discover their roots through their personal engagements in various creative arts, interactive activities and sports.

TZOFIM-SHEVET HERMON

The "Tzofim" is Israel's leading youth movement, which was brought to Canada in 2004 by Israeli parents and youth volunteering in Toronto's Jewish community. It offers a social structure enriched with interactive scouting activities, with Jewish/Israeli flavour, for children (ages 3-9) and youth (ages 14-18) of Canadian Jewish Hebrew speaking families. The local chapter – Shevet Hermon serves 160 children and teens.

KACHOL-LAVAN

Kachol-Lavan, an initiative of UJA Federation, the Schwartz/Reisman Centre, and Israeli Forum, is the cultural and educational centre for Hebrew and Israel Studies. The school offers a wide range of studies including supplementary/Sunday School, Hebrew lessons for adults and credit programs for high school students starting in Grade 8.

WE INVEST IN ISRAEL & OVERSEAS

Over the past 68 years, UJA Federation of Greater Toronto has established an exceptional bond with the State of Israel including investments in Aliyah and absorption, vulnerable populations, education, healthcare, and cutting-edge technology.

Through a strategic partnership, UJA Federation multiplies donors' dollars by leveraging millions of dollars from the Israeli government, Israeli philanthropists and private foundations for a significantly bigger impact.

UJA is also a vital supporter of humanitarian relief and rescue efforts for Jews around the world living in war zones such as Ukraine and in areas of growing anti-Semitism such as France.



PROGRAMS FUNDED THROUGH THE JEWISH AGENCY FOR ISRAEL (JAFI)

For over 80 years, the Jewish Agency has served as the link between Diaspora Jews worldwide and Israel. UJA Federation's partnership with JAFI includes investments in the following programs.

ALIYAH & RESCUE

UJA Federation has helped over three million Jews relocate to Israel since Israel's inception. Through JAFI, Jews from areas such as Ukraine, Iran, Tunisia, and France are able to fulfill their Zionist dreams, often leaving behind growing insecurity.

According to JAFI, 40% more Jews immigrated to Israel between January and March 2015, than the previous year. Most significant was the 214% increase in the number of new immigrants from Ukraine, 1,971 compared to 625 in the same period last year. The number of Russians rose by almost 50% to 1,515. Another 1,413 immigrants came from France.

YOUTH FUTURES – EMPOWERING ISRAELI YOUTH

The Youth Futures Program enables disadvantaged Israeli youth to develop their academic and social skills, in consultation with parents, teachers, school counsellors, social workers and other professionals. The program serves nearly 10,000 youth in 32 localities, primarily in the Negev and Galilee.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING FOR SENIORS

Amigour, JAFI's leading sheltered housing company, puts a roof over the heads of more than 7,500 disadvantaged elderly, many of whom are new immigrants from the Former Soviet Union and Holocaust survivors. Amigour housing provides residents with access to an array of on-site social and cultural services.

TIKKUN OLAM

Project TEN ("ten" is the Hebrew word for "give") brings together Jewish young adults from Israel and the Diaspora to spend three months working on social service projects in vulnerable communities throughout the globe.

POST-ARMY SUPPORT TO SOLITARY SOLDIERS

Each year about 700 immigrant soldiers who made aliyah without their parents leave the IDF. The Wings program of the Jewish Agency supports their transition into civilian life for two years, starting two months before release from the army.

Sarah Tamim is a 26-year-old Parisian school teacher who fled France for a new life in Israel after a first-hand experience with anti-Semitism. A week after responding to her students' question about whether or not she was Jewish, Sarah was horrified to see her name painted on a wall next to a Nazi swastika. The school administration did nothing and simply painted over the hateful graffiti. Feeling threatened and alone, Sarah decided to move to Israel. A few short months later she arrived at Beit Brodetsky, a UJA-sponsored residence program for new immigrants. Sarah, like many new immigrants to Israel, arrived with only a suitcase, her hope and determination.



PARTNERSHIP WITH THE AMERICAN JOINT DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE (JDC)

JDC is the world's leading Jewish humanitarian assistance organization, impacting millions of lives of the world's poorest and most vulnerable Jews in more than 70 countries. Their efforts help revitalize Jewish life in remote communities, build tomorrow's leadership among Jewish youth, and rescue victims of global emergencies. Examples of JDC's work include:

- Crisis Relief and Rescue in Ukraine
- Assisting the Poor and Elderly Jews of Kishinev, Moldova
- Early Childhood & Youth-At-Risk Programs in Israel
- Summer Camp Programs in Szarvas, Hungary
- Haredi Employment Centres in Israel

PARTNERSHIP WITH COMMUNITIES IN ISRAEL

SDEROT

In recent years, UJA Federation has focused its partnership in Sderot on youth and community responsibility. Programs have been put in place to improve performance of students at school, encourage community activism and involvement, enable youth to succeed in the army, and encourage young adults to get a college education and jobs. Last summer, additional emphasis was placed on helping residents of Sderot cope with the trauma of enhanced rocket attacks from nearby Gaza.

BAT YAM

Bat Yam is home to the fastest growing Ethiopian-Israeli community in Israel. To significantly advance this community's integration, UJA Federation and its partners in Israel invest in educational, vocational and young leadership programs including afterschool educational enrichment for children and youth; hot meal programs; educational enrichment in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM); vocational training in nursing, early childhood education, bookkeeping, bus driving and more.

EILAT/EILOT

UJA Federation's partnership in Eilat/Eilot has helped create a fundamental demographic change in the region through investments in:

- Higher education, including the building of the Ben Gurion University dormitories, scholarships and volunteer programs
- Healthcare - A world-class emergency room was recently opened at Yoseftal Hospital in Eilat. Special incentives have attracted talented medical professionals
- Education - increasing access to educational opportunities for Eilat's youth in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM)
- Career development services - vocational training services that retrain low-skilled Eilat residents
- Renewable energy – empowering the leaders of Eilat and Eilot to harness the region's vast natural assets by supporting research and development in solar energy



WE PROMOTE JEWISH/ISRAEL ADVOCACY

UJA has developed a highly effective Jewish and Israel advocacy plan at the federal, provincial and local levels. We ensure that Jewish Toronto has a voice and is respected by decision makers, inside and outside of government. Whether it's Canada's relationship with Israel on Parliament Hill, the seniors' agenda at Queen's Park, or anti-Israel activities on campus, we take action on the community's behalf.

CENTRE FOR ISRAEL & JEWISH AFFAIRS (CIJA)

CIJA serves as the organized Jewish community's central address for advocacy advice, support, and strategic resources aimed at improving the quality of Jewish life in Canada and abroad, increasing support for Israel, and strengthening the Canada-Israel relationship.

HOW IS CIJA UNIQUE?

- It is the only registered lobbyist for Canada's Jewish community.
- It is the only organization to bring hundreds of Canadian influencers to Israel annually.
- It focuses on communication with non-Jewish Canadians in key positions in government, media, academia, and civil society.
- It issues action alerts to mobilize the Jewish and pro-Israel communities to make our collective voice heard with key government officials about breaking developments and major policy decisions.
- It is the only Canadian Jewish organization to have a multi-pronged strategy for campus advocacy, focusing on students, faculty, and administrators.
- It works closely with Hillel to build working relationships with student unions and to support moderate candidates.
- It operates an international BUYcott campaign, empowering activists to support Israel through their purchases.
- It provides multiple, timely, effective workshops in advocacy training. Subjects include media training, crisis communications, online advocacy and strategic messaging for Israel.
- It works closely with ethnic and faith community leaders and Jewish community members on projects and programming of shared interest.

YOUR INVESTMENT DIRECTLY ENABLES:

- Government lobbying and media communications on major issues affecting Jewish Canadians – including social justice policies, antisemitism, religious freedoms, genetic discrimination and the cost of kosher food.
- Security training and audits at Jewish sites across Canada, resulting in more secure schools, synagogues and other community facilities.
- Fact-finding missions to Israel that mean parliamentarians, journalists, university officials, and civil society leaders understand the values Israelis and Canadians share.
- Training, grants, and resources for campus activists, empowering students to speak up, counter BDS, educate their peers on Israel and the Middle East and ensure campuses remains safe and comfortable.
- Effective advocacy based on the strategic use of polling to measure current and emerging opinion trends in the Jewish and broader Canadian community.



JEWISH FEDERATIONS OF CANADA – UIA


Jewish Federations of Canada – UIA is the national organization of Jewish Federations that responds to needs of Jews across the globe, with offices in Jerusalem and Toronto. Nationally, it serves Jewish federated and non-federated communities with programs and services. In Israel, it is responsible for transforming campaign contributions into social welfare and educational programs. The fundamental themes guiding the organization are: connecting Canadian Jews in ALL size communities to each other, to Israel and World Jewry; strengthening Jewish identity and Israel engagement in the next generation; financial resource development and leadership development.

WE ALLOCATE FUNDS EFFECTIVELY

UJA Federation uses its cross-communal perspective, resources and financial leverage to amplify the impact of donations it receives. As a steward of charitable donations, UJA Federation commits to operating efficiently and ensure fundraising costs remain amongst the lowest of any comparable charitable organization. It operates transparently using metrics and reporting to ensure the most effective and strategic allocation of donations it receives, while balancing the most pressing present and future needs of our community.
