## PURE INVENTION: HOW JAPAN'S POP CULTURE CONQUERED THE WORLD (2020) by MATT ALT

Matt Alt, a Japan-based writer and translator, provides a thoughtful look at the country's post-war economic boom and the subsequent journey of Japanese pop culture in shaping global trends.




## A SPECIAL FATE: CHIUNE SUGIHARA: HERO OF THE HOLOCAUST (2014) by ALISON GOLD





She took issue with the fictional novel's portrayal of *geisha* and the suggestion that they served as prostitutes. Sharing her firsthand experiences, this revealing memoir offers an authentic glimpse into this secretive world, detailing the discipline, artistry, and dedication behind this iconic and traditional profession.


## SHOGUN (1975) by JAMES CLAVELL

A sweeping historical novel, *Shōgun* follows an English sailor who finds himself shipwrecked in 1600s Japan. As he navigates the country's rigid samurai society, he becomes embroiled in political intrigue and personal transformation. Though fiction, the story is based on historical figures and events, making it a thrilling way to understand feudal Japan—in particular the birth of the Tokugawa shogunate.

The historical and political backdrop also provides insight into the role of samurai in Japan, the spread of Christianity, and the presence of the Portuguese.

The novel was adapted for TV as a mini-series in 1980 and was popular with western audiences, though was not received well by Japanese viewers, facing criticism for its historical inaccuracies and portrayals. In 2024, a new adaptation was released by Hulu, receiving wide-spread international acclaim. Both adaptations won an Emmy—Outstanding Limited Series in 1981 and Outstanding Drama Series in 2024—a first in Emmys history.







#### **FICTION**

## NO LONGER HUMAN (1973) by OSAMU DAZAI

Osamu Dazai's *No Longer Human* is the powerful yet dark story of a young man in post-war Japan, who struggles with identity, mental illness, addiction, and social alienation. The story is told through notebooks and journals left behind by the protagonist—Ōba—capturing his life from childhood until his late twenties, detailing the various struggles he faces at different stages.

While written about fictional characters, the novel is semi-autobiographical, reflecting the author's own internal battles with identity and the feeling of "otherness," along with his addiction, depression, guilt, and his lack of ability to conform within a changing society.

Offering deep insight into human nature and the burden of expectations, *No Longer Human* is a melancholic post-war novel, that is made painfully more poignant with the knowledge that the author committed suicide shortly before the story was published.

Memoirs of a Geisha, written by Arthur Golden and the basis for the film, follows Chiyo, a young peasant girl sold into a Kyoto geisha house. Here, she transforms into the celebrated geisha Sayuri. 




## AN ARTIST OF THE FLOATING WORLD (2022) by KAZUO ISHIGURO

Shortlisted for the 1986 Booker Prize, An Artist of the Floating World is a profound historical fiction novel, set in post-World War II Japan. Following Masuji Ono, a once-revered artist whose propaganda work during the war has left him shunned and struggling with guilt, the story explores themes of personal responsibility and moral duty, shifting societal values (such as the roles of women and the declining status of elders), betrayal, and the lingering shadows of war.

Written by Kazuo Ishiguro—a Japanese-born British novelist, winner of the 2017 Nobel Prize in Literature, and one of the most renowned contemporary authors today—the novel uses autobiographical elements to enrich the narrative.

## BEFORE THE COFFEE GETS COLD (2020) by TOSHIKAZU KAWAGUCHI

Tucked away in a small back alley in Tokyo, the Funiculi Funicula café serves more than just coffee and tea—it provides visitors with the rare and unique opportunity to go back in time. Following four visitors as they navigate the rules of time travel and confront their pasts, *Before the Coffee Gets Cold* is a touching story that explores themes of love, loss, regret, and the fleeting nature of time.

The first in a series, each of the subsequent books focuses on new sets of characters.

Spanning four generations of a Korean family in Japan, *Pachinko* is a deeply moving saga about identity, resilience, and discrimination. The novel sheds light on the struggles of Korean immigrants in Japan, who, despite being born in the country, face systemic prejudice and exclusion over generations.



#### NORWEGIAN WOOD (2000) by HARUKI MURAKAMI

An emotional coming-of-age novel, *Norwegian Wood* by Haruki Murakami follows Toru Watanabe, a university student in 1960s Tokyo, as he navigates love, loss, and self-discovery. Torn between his devotion to the fragile and melancholic Naoko and his growing attraction to the independent Midori, Toru grapples with themes of memory, grief, and identity throughout the novel. With its evocative prose and nostalgic atmosphere, *Norwegian Wood* captures the complexities of young love and the loneliness that often accompanies it.

Though the author Haruki Murakami had earned positive recognition for his earlier works, the success of *Norwegian Wood* made him an overnight sensation in Japan. After continuously being mobbed by adoring fans in cities and airports, Murakami left Japan for a period of time. Today, he is one of Japan's most famous and revered writers, receiving numerous local and international awards for his work.

## CONVENIENCE STORE (2019) by SAYAKA MURATA

A bestseller in Japan, *Convenience Store Woman* by Sayaka Murata offers a glimpse into contemporary Japanese society, highlighting the pressures for conformity still present. The story follows Keiko Furukura, a 36-year-old woman who has never quite fit in. She finds solace and structure working at Smile Mart, where every interaction is dictated by a manual. While Keiko is content, she is pressured to conform by finding a husband and a "real" job.

In *Convenience Store Woman*, Murata masterfully explores Japan's rigid social expectations, work culture, and attitudes toward mental health in a way that is darkly humorous, deeply moving, and often painfully familiar.




## KITCHEN (2006) by BANANA YOSHIMOTO
