Public Acknowledgement Policy Innovations, Expanded Critical Supports, Promising Practices, and National Network Cohorts

Subgrantees are required to recognize JFNA as a funding source in the following places:

- In annual reports, promotional materials, press releases, on the subgrantees' websites, and on any print, and web-based or electronic promotional materials, including but not limited to newspapers, newsletters, catalogues, and brochures related to the organization's JFNA-funded program.
- 2. To beneficiaries of the JFNA-funded grant
 - a. <u>Direct Services to Older Adults and Caregivers</u>: When a subgrantee provides social services, the subgrantee must inform the beneficiary in writing stating that the services provided are made possible by a grant from JFNA. The written notification may be given in-person, electronically, or through postal mail. Each individual client file must include a copy of this notification.
 - b. Socialization and Training Events: Invitations to and flyers for socialization programs must acknowledge JFNA as a funding source. At the program itself, there must be an announcement acknowledging JFNA support of the program stating, "This program was made possible by a grant from The JFNA Center on Holocaust Survivor Care and Institute on Aging and Trauma." In addition, a sign should be prominently displayed including the unaltered JFNA logo.

The following statement and JFNA logo must be included as part of the recognition:

Statement: This service is supported by a grant from The JFNA Center on Holocaust Survivor Care and Institute on Aging and Trauma.
