ITC	Welfare teams working with most vulnerable population - Ongoing	Social workers and non hospital based medical care professional working are on the frontlines 24/7 in this, and as in every crisis. This unprecedented emergency poses unique challenges: restrictions on movement; medical workers who can't leave families; many medical workers are infected. The caseload of each career has now grown exponentially. Our goal is to provide online support for teams in order to help them recoup energy and review tactics for coping with the stress. Hospital emergency teams (Doctors and medical interns) are frontline trusted professionals and key players in trauma mitigation and recovery. Issues such as continuing shifts under great stress, coordination between multi-disciplinary teams and delivering bad news all need to be addressed. In the absence of their operation, it will be difficult for parents to return to work. However there is a genuine concern of contagion. The plan at present is to work with up to 24 children, a 75% reduction in the number. The purpose of the program is to assist the principals through tools for building team resilience, managing the stress resulting from fear of contagion and conflicts with parents who are under great pressure. In addition, we will train a psycho-social team - principals and pedagogical mentors - to continue support subsequent to our activities. Employees will need to deal with the difficulty of children returning to the system, parent difficulties and of course their own struggles. The transition, to be successful - requires preparation. The combined effect of increased work hours, stress of having more patients per provider, concern for end-of life care, supporting dying patients and their families who cannot visit and potentially placing their own family and friends at risk is increasing burnout, stress and anxiety amongst the staff. Support and training would not only provide knowledge, tools and immediate relief during the current pandemic it will also serve these teams in their work going forward.
