ITC	Teams working in early childhood facilities	Day care centers are part of Israel's early childhood education infrastructure. In the absence of their operation, it will be difficult for parents to return to work. However there is a genuine concern of contagion. The plan at present is to work with up to 24 children, a 75% reduction in the number. The purpose of the program is to assist the principals through tools for building team resilience, managing the stress resulting from fear of contagion and conflicts with parents who are under great pressure. In addition, we will train a psycho-social team - principals and pedagogical mentors - to continue support subsequent to our activities. Employees will need to deal with the difficulty of children returning to the system, parent difficulties and of course their own struggles. The transition, to be successful - requires preparation.
