## Year Ending June 30, 2013

Jewish Federation of Greater Atlanta is about strengthening community. Through the generosity of our supporters, we touch the lives of thousands of people in our local Jewish community, in Israel and overseas. Partnering with over 80 organizations located in the greater Atlanta area, in Israel, and throughout the world in countries such as Russia, Poland, Ukraine, Cuba and Argentina we provide much needed financial support so that critical programs overseen by these organizations can be sustained. Providing children with a Jewish education, supporting older adults to live independently, training new Israeli immigrants with job skills, delivering food and medical supplies to impoverished Jews in Ukraine, are but a few examples of the incredible work being done to serve Jews in their communities.

Hand in hand with over 100 volunteers of various ages, with diverse religious orientations, and living in communities throughout greater Atlanta, the Federation facilitates a very stringent allocations process. With measurable results and fiscal sustainability as our guiding principle, we are in a very unique position to allocate funds based on the needs, goals and objectives of the entire community.

The following financial report represents resources raised and distributed by the Federation's Annual Campaign, designated gifts from donors, as well as government and private foundation funding.

#### The Alfred and Adele Davis Academy \$402,391

Jewish Continuity Allocation: \$402,391

Furthers the goal of Jewish continuity by providing a Reform Jewish day school education for children in kindergarten through grade eight.

#### American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee \$1,003,680

FSU Allocation: \$442,110 Core Allocation: \$511,570 Donor Designated: \$50,000

Furthers the goal of caring for those in need throughout the world by providing baskets of services (food, medical care, homecare assistance, winter relief, and social programs) for the elderly and provides welfare relief for those who are not eligible for Holocaust restitution funding. Also works with other partner organizations to develop joint programming (i.e. Passover Project) for the community, as well as leadership and volunteerism development.

#### Camp Living Wonders \$9,000

Caring Allocation: \$9,000

Furthers the goal of caring for those in need by training staff members in order to offer a highly specialized camp that serves Jewish children with moderate to severe disabilities.

#### Center for Israel Education \$14,535

*Jewish Continuity Allocation:* \$14,535

Promotes Jewish continuity through Jewish education initiatives including curricula about modern Israel and workshops on teaching Israel and the Middle East to pre-collegiate, college, and adult learners.

#### Chabad of Minsk \$6,500

FSU Allocation: \$6,500

Furthers the goal of promoting Jewish continuity by providing transportation to day school, where children receive a Jewish education and foster a deep connection to Judaism's rituals and faith.

#### Community-Wide Grant Writer \$17,819

Shared Services Allocation: \$17,819

Provides subsidized community-wide grant writing services for synagogues and Jewish organizations in Atlanta and is coordinated through Jewish Federation of Greater Atlanta.



#### Community-Wide Lobbyist \$20,000

Shared Services Allocation: \$20,000

Lobbies at the state level for issues relevant to all Jewish organizations in Atlanta and is coordinated through Jewish Federation of Greater Atlanta.

#### Community-Wide Security Program \$101,618

Shared Services Allocation: \$101,618

Provides security consultation for synagogues and Jewish organizations across Greater Atlanta, including assistance in securing Federal Homeland Security grants, and is coordinated through Jewish Federation of Greater Atlanta.

#### Completing the Journey \$35,000

Overseas Allocation: \$35,000

Furthers the goal of caring for those in need by rescuing the remaining Ethiopian Jews from Ethiopia and transporting them to Israel.

#### Day School Marketing Consultant \$20,000

Jewish Continuity Allocation: \$20,000

Furthers the goal of Jewish continuity by funding a marketing consultant to create an awareness campaign for the Jewish Day Schools in Atlanta as an aggregate, and to ultimately increase interest in and demand for day schools.

#### The Doris and Alex Weber Jewish Community High School \$156,083

Jewish Continuity Allocation: \$156,083

Furthers the goal of Jewish continuity by providing both a secular and a pluralistic Jewish education for Jewish youth that focuses on classical liberal arts in grades nine through twelve.

#### **Education Directors Council \$25,000**

*Jewish Continuity Allocation:* \$25,000

Promotes leadership development by providing professional development for the teachers at Atlanta area supplementary schools.

#### The Epstein School, Solomon Schechter School of Atlanta \$287,623

*Jewish Continuity Allocation:* \$285,823 Donor Designated: \$1,800

Furthers the goal of Jewish continuity by providing a Conservative Jewish Day School education for children in preschool through grade eight.

Jewish Continuity Allocation: \$20,000

Promotes leadership development by providing professional development for the heads of school and teachers at Atlanta area Jewish pre-schools.

#### Jewish Educational Loan Fund \$17,000

Caring Allocation: \$12,000 Donor Designated: \$5,000

Furthers the goal of caring for those in need by offering needs-based, "last dollar", interest-free educational loans for Jewish students to attend a college or university, graduate school or professional/vocational school leading to a degree or certificate.

Caring Allocation: \$1,420,904 FSU Allocation: \$8,000 Donor Designated: \$22,200

#### Jewish Interest Free Loan of Atlanta \$6,000

Caring Allocation: \$6,000

Furthers the goal of caring for those in need by providing interest-free emergency loans to those living in Atlanta.
