A MESSAGE FROM YANNAI

It is a surprising fact that *Rosh HaShanah*, despite its two prayer-filled days comprising the first 20% of the Ten Days of Repentance (of which *Yom Kippur* is the last 10%), is a day on which repentance is forbidden.

This may seem like an outrageous claim, but Maimonides, in the *Mishneh Torah* – his magnum opus codification of Jewish law – clearly states that *Vidui*, confession of one's sins, is the required first step of any and all repentance. And yet all of the early *halachic* codes make clear that confession is forbidden during the High Holidays. In fact, a close reading of the *Rosh HaShanah* liturgy results in a single reference to confession in the opening line to the *Avinu Malkeinu* prayer: "Our Father, Our King, we have sinned before you."

Our rabbis describe how, despite this single offending line, this prayer was reluctantly included in (most traditions of) the New Year liturgy due to the appropriateness of the rest of the verses. Additionally, they caution us to ensure that when we say this offending line of prayer on *Rosh HaShanah*, we should specifically have in mind the general sins of our

ancestors, and not our sins in particular, and should refrain from clapping our chests with our fists as we do when we confess on other days of the year. Without confession there is no repentance. On *Rosh HaShanah* there is no confession and therefore no repentance.

This begs the question, why is this so? Why would we specifically avoid confessing and repenting our sins on *Rosh HaShanah*, despite its obvious role in marking the intense lead up to our repentance-focused *Yom Kippur*?

The answer is that the main focus of *Rosh HaShanah* is *Malchut*, G-d's kingship and dominion over the world. In this context, the blowing of the *shofar* is like the herald's call to arms, and our focus on *Rosh HaShanah* should not be on the sins of the past, but rather on answering that call with immediate action focused on doing Hashem's will in the present and the future. When called upon to do an urgent and important task, one should begin with their best efforts immediately, even if past failings remain to be addressed. Our traditional symbolic foods such as apples and honey, are

likewise focused on an optimistic future, and not on the sub-optimal past.

So this New Year, let's answer that call to arms. Worrying about what we (and others) could have done better can wait for another time. Let's jump into immediate action and focus on what we can do in the present and the near future to build and strengthen our community. To ensure that every Jewish family has access to a meaningful Jewish life. To intensify our connection with Israel and the global Jewish community. Let's find a way to volunteer a bit more, to donate a bit more, to cooperate a bit more, and to reach out a bit more.
