A MESSAGE FROM BRUCE



I have the honour of serving our Jewish Community as the President of Calgary Jewish Federation. I have just had the privilege of undertaking a significant personal challenge – I rode my bicycle across the United States, over 6,000 kilometres in 40 days of riding. 6,019.98 kilometres to be exact, plus another 45.12 k of vertical gained.

Once I'd committed to the cycle trip, I determined to use the event as an opportunity to encourage people to donate to charities. Carolyn and I, and many of you, accepted, and together we've raised meaningful dollars for our United Jewish Appeal Campaign and for many other worthy charities, from Magen David Adom (Israel's Red Cross) to Calgary Jewish Academy, to a fund to bring doctors to a rural community, to an organization helping people recover from depression.

The cycle trip was a great experience, a wonderful adventure. I saw America from sea-to-sea, some incredible vistas – like the Columbia River Gorge and the fall landscape in New England – and some disturbing sights – like the homeless under bridges in Portland, Oregon and in front of city hall in Madison, Wisconsin. I'm happy to bore you with tales of the undertaking – but at another time.

For now, I want to focus on inspiration, on what it means to be a community. I took inspiration from our cycling group and from individuals within the group. One cyclist was not used to riding in groups and was about to quit after he'd caused a minor fall. The guy who fell took it upon himself to befriend this cyclist. Simple acts, chatting over breakfast and riding together the next day, took this guy (who, by the way, is bi-polar) from depression to delight. I'll bet he's never enjoyed himself more from then on;

I praise the man who did the Mitzvah of helping someone in need. My most emotional moments were seeing cycle friends in family moments:

There was my friend from Toledo whose family had endured multiple serious health issues (23 surgeries in all), including his wife's fight with breast cancer. When our ride passed near his home, Dan wore a pink jersey in honour of cancer survivors and each of us wore a pink ribbon lapel pin on our jerseys. More than 70 people showed up to show their love and support for him and his family. I was moved to watch his face as he was greeted by his wife and daughter.

My cycling buddy from New Jersey: he wasn't really a cyclist but undertook this extreme challenge as part of acknowledging his daughter's struggle with depression. I took a side trip with him to Ithaca, New York, the town where he'd been a college baseball star. Unexpectedly, his daughter met us at the baseball field. I had tears in my eyes watching him cry when he saw her.

Another side trip, in pouring rain, took me to a cemetery in rural Ohio, where one of our group laid flowers at the graves of her grandparents.

One more: Stacie, from Phoenix, has been living with her guy Tom for 20 years. She's 55 or so, he's 60. They're not married, though only in the formal sense. Tom, not on our trip, came up to Clear Lake, Iowa to see Stacie. He was only able to stay one night. The next day, Stacie was riding with a group of us late morning when Tom drove past us and yelled something about seeing her up ahead. When we got to where he'd stopped, he went down on the road on one knee and proposed. She said yes – without getting off

her bike – and then clipped back in and rode off to catch up with the rest of us. He got in his car and headed back to Phoenix. That night our group celebrated her engagement.

These moments, these vignettes, are part of what brought our group of cyclists together – we formed a community – which means we looked out for each other, we cared for one another, we helped those with problems, those in need. We shared in moments of joy and moments of sorrow.

Our United Jewish Appeal Campaign provides each of us the opportunity to show our solidarity with our Calgary Jewish Community. In coming together we acknowledge the need to look out for the members of our Community, to care for one another, to help those in need.

Let's each of us, as individuals, as a Community, do our part to inspire all to live generously, to give generously. As a Community we must meet our goal of supporting growing needs, of sustaining Jewish life in Calgary and around the world – despite the economic and political challenges that face us.

I encourage everyone to lead by example, to make this year's campaign the great success it needs to be. To be inspired to be a proud member of our Jewish Community.


Attention Israeli Citizens





A Message from UJA 2015 Volunteers Dan Balaban and Lynne Preston



Because... every community is built around a village square.

The shtetl life of the Old Country, as romanticized in "Fiddler on the Roof," portrayed the tight-knit, self-sufficient but isolated communities of our ancestors. Jewish life was integral to daily living, part of the atmosphere. Modern Jews are so much more integrated into mainstream society and pulled in so many directions, that the need for a central Jewish gathering place, our own "village square," is arguably greater than it was for our ancestors. Jewish life isn't a given as it was in those days. It takes conscious effort and deliberate choices to make that happen.

Having a Jewish Community Centre creates a hub for Jewish activity, opening doors literally and figuratively for Jews in Calgary to develop a feeling of belonging, to express their Jewish identity in a welcoming, familiar environment. It's often the case that the lobby is buzzing with greetings, conversations, kvelling over babies, excited children heading to after-school programs and animated discussions over a nosh at Karen's. That's why Calgary Jewish Federation funds the "Community Living Room" aspect of the Calgary JCC, as well as cultural programs and senior's activities.

We are proud that the Calgary JCC is open to everyone - Jewish or not. However, some members of our Jewish community can't afford the membership fee. Thankfully, Calgary Jewish Federation offers membership bursaries through their confidential and anonymous Integrated Bursary Program. It truly allows the JCC to be open to all.

Because... we take care of one another... everywhere.



Diana is a shy seventeen year old from Kiryat Shemona who finds it hard to communicate or create new relationships with her peers. Although she has been living in Israel for the majority of her life, she still feels more comfortable speaking Russian, and most of her friends are from the Former Soviet Union (FSU). Diana's parents work long hours and their daily struggle to make a living and navigate an unfamiliar social system means they can't help her integrate better. Diana does not participate in any extracurricular activities, so she often ends up wandering the streets.

In school, Diana was placed in an academic track where students are not expected to take matriculation exams. Since little was expected of her, she wasn't motivated to be at school very often in her final year. Consequently, she tested poorly in the IDF's psychometric exams and was exempt from placement in Israel's defense forces. Diana's self-esteem plummeted, because for Israelis, exclusion from service after high school can have a negative social and economic impact later in life.

Diana is one of many children helped by *Hafuch al Hafuch*, a project funded by Calgary Jewish Federation's Partnership 2Gether program which links Coast-to-Coast Canadian communities to Etzba Hagalil (the Galilee Panhandle) region of Israel. The *Hafuch al Hafuch* centre in Kiryat Shemona reaches out to teens like Diana who find themselves on the margins of Israeli society. It is there that teens with low socioeconomic backgrounds can find guidance, counselling and friendship.

The staff helped Diana with her feelings of rejection, allowing her to find her voice, gain confidence, and build new relationships. When the IDF exempted her from service, the Hafuch staff intervened because they knew that the test results did not reflect her true potential. They counselled her and arranged a re-evaluation, and ultimately Diana was accepted into the IDF in a special program for marginalized citizens.

Calgary Jewish Federation's partners in Israel and around the world provide services that ensure that Jewish people everywhere are supported.


