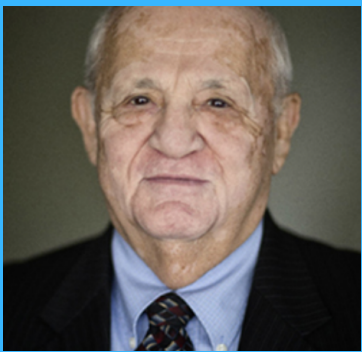

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**Hershel Greenblat** was born in the Ukraine in 1941. The first year of his life was spent hiding in a cave with his parents. When the German invasion of the Soviet Union began, Hershel's family moved frequently to avoid capture. Hershel's father was arrested by the Soviets in 1944 and spent the remainder of the war in prison. When the war ended, and Hershel's father was released from prison, the family fled Communist controlled Ukraine. Hershel and his family lived in Displaced Persons Camps in Austria until 1950 when they immigrated to the United States. Today, Hershel devotes much of his time speaking to school children about his family's experiences and teaching lessons of tolerance. Hershel is available for Zoom/virtual talks.

**Harry Schneider** was a young boy during World War II when Adolf Hitler led Nazi Germany on a mission to eradicate the world's Jewish population. Schneider was born to Jewish parents in Lomazy, Poland, shortly after the Holocaust began. His family joined many others by hiding in the woods to avoid being sent to concentration camps where death awaited millions of their people. After the Holocaust, his family spent the next four years in several displaced persons camps in Austria before U.S. President Harry S. Truman brought 100,000 displaced Jews to the United States. Mala was a survivor of Auschwitz and Bergen-Belsen concentration camps. Leo was a Survivor of Auschwitz. Joe and his parents immigrated to the United States in 1950, arriving through Ellis Island, and eventually settling in Chicago. Joe speaks to school groups of all ages recounting the story of his parents' Holocaust survival while also stressing tolerance of all people, honoring the memory of his parents.

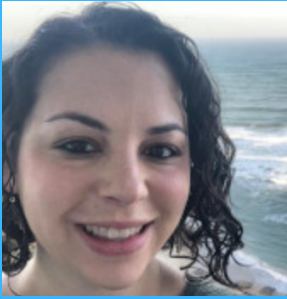

As they were told they were going to Kielbasin, a stop on the way to Auschwitz, they fell into a ditch alongside the road which started their escape and years of hiding. Eventually they came to the US in January 1950 where they settled in Chelsea, Massachusetts. Jill grew up in Boston and moved to Charleston recently with her husband.

At the end of the war, she met Abram Saks, Marni's grandfather, in the Lundsburg displacement camp. Abram Saks grew up in a small Polish town. He never shared his story, but through her own research, Marni discovered that he survived 3 concentration camps including Auschwitz. He and his brother were part of Horst Schumann's medical experiments. Marni's powerful presentation includes recordings of her grandparents. Her passion to tell their stories and continue their legacies is inspiring.
