

CLUTTER, HOARDING AND SQUALOR

As soon as it is warm enough, we can bring our warm weather necessities out of storage while packing away the winter gear; and while that is going on, it is an opportune time to rid ourselves of anything that has outlived its usefulness. We all acquire things that become clutter, but we are able to manage it by donating, selling, recycling, or discarding what we no longer need.

Now imagine a home where the clutter only grows, to the point where living spaces can no longer be used for their intended everyday activities. Simply moving from one room to another becomes a challenge, especially for an older person who may have mobility challenges - and yet the idea of disposing any of it, or putting a halt to additional acquisitions, causes distress. An individual in a situation like this fits the definition of someone with hoarding disorder. Helping them emerge from a hoarding situation is a delicate task.

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
The following are commonly accepted clinical definitions.

- *Clutter:* Possessions are disorganized and may accumulate around living areas.
- *Collecting:* Possessions are part of a larger set of items. Display does not impede active living areas. A typical collection can include things like baseball cards, vinyl records, comic books, dolls, and autographs. Collecting isn't hoarding.
- Hoarding: Possessions become unorganized piles. Hoarding becomes a mental illness when it prevents rooms from being used for their intended purpose.
- Squalor: A home that is so unclean and unhygienic that people of a similar culture and background would consider extensive clearing and cleaning essential. Although hoarding and squalor can at times appear similar, they are two different conditions that sometimes overlap.

There are at least a dozen disorders, injuries, and diseases that have been documented as leading to hoarding disorder and/or squalor. People with hoarding disorder may not be able to recognize the severity of their condition. Without addressing the underlying conditions, any cleanups are likely to be only temporary solutions.

There are ways to engage with a person with a hoarding disorder that are more likely to result in sustained positive results. If you fear you may have hoarding disorder, or care for an older adult in Dutchess County who you fear may have hoarding disorder, reach out to OFA at ofa@dutchessny.gov or call (845) 486-2555 during business hours.



Vassar Temple Celebrates 175 Years

Vassar Temple, founded in 1848 as Congregation Brethren of Israel, is the oldest continuously functioning Jewish congregation between New York City and Albany and among the oldest Reform congregations in the nation.

The seeds planted generations ago have flourished. Today's Vassar Temple is a thriving, growing, and vibrant community that offers a spiritual,



educational, inclusive, and supportive home to its members. The congregation emphasizes *tikkun olam*, striving to heal the world by supporting its local neighbors in need and engaging in social action and justice initiatives, supporting human rights, and caring for our planet.

The theme of "from generation to generation" runs through anniversary events this year, which have included a tour of its cemeteries highlighting past Poughkeepsie business owners, a concert of Jewish music and composers to dedicate its refurbished 1923 grand piano, an adult education series about Prophetic Judaism, and more. A new Endowment Campaign was also launched in conjunction with the anniversary to secure the congregation's future.

The festivities will culminate in April, kicking off with a celebration for Religious School and preschool families. On April 14th the congregation will honor its history, and build for its future, with an Anniversary Gala at The Grandview in Poughkeepsie featuring keynote speaker, distinguished historian and author Deborah Dash Moore. On April 19th Rabbi Rick Jacobs, President of the Union for Reform Judaism, will be guest speaker at the 7:30 PM evening service led by Rabbi Renni Altman and Cantor Elizabeth Goldmann. This special event will include prayers and music reflecting the evolution of worship style at Vassar Temple: traditional melodies from its origins as an Orthodox synagogue and excerpts and songs from the three Reform prayer books used. There will be a pot luck dinner at 6 PM (meat/pareve). The public is welcome to this unusual dinner RSVPs and requested event, are to ritual@vassartemple.org. Dear Seder Plate

Welcome to new traditions. We want to have a world where we are all inclusive. For instance: an orange represents fruitfulness for all Jews. Vegans use a beet or a yam at the table in place of a shank bone or an egg. Miriam's cup is also used to represent women. Other modern additions are: a banana to represent refugees; an acorn to represent indigenous land; and a potato for Ethiopian Jewry. What a wonderful way to show our love and respect to everyone!

Remember *Back to the Future* and the DeLorean time machine? No need to stream or go to Broadway to relive the time machine experience --- just run to your Seder table this Passover!

The Seder is a Jewish "time machine," created by the sages 2000 years ago to fulfill the commandment: "And you shall tell your child on that day, saying, "This is what God did for **me**, when **I** came out of Egypt." (Exodus 13:8) The special foods and rituals of the Seder transport us back to the exodus: we dip parsley in salt water to remember the tears of our

ancestors; we eat bitter herbs to taste the bitterness of slavery; the sweet haroset reminds us of the bricks the Israelites were forced to make; and the matzah, baked hurriedly with no time to rise, is the taste of freedom. In Sephardic homes, physical acts enhance the time machine experience. Customs include hitting one another with scallions during *Avadim Hayinu* ("We were slaves") and walking around the table carrying matzah wrapped in a napkin as if marching to freedom.

Why not just tell the story? We "relive" it this way? Not only do these actions initiate children's questions so the story can be told, but this time machine experience is designed to instill within us greater empathy for those who suffer oppression in our time. The Torah commands us not to forget this painful part of our people's history and shapes our behaviors because of it: "You shall not oppress the stranger, for you know the heart of the stranger, having yourselves been strangers in the land of Egypt." (Ex. 23:9)

Emerging from the time machine having gone out of Egypt, we are called upon to apply the lessons of Passover to issues of our day and to discuss them at our Seder tables:

- What is our responsibility to help today's immigrants struggling for their freedom?
- How can we help those who are enslaved to hunger, poverty, homelessness?
- What is our vision for Israel and how can we participate in bringing that about?

We travel from the past to the present and then to the future with Elijah's cup, which represents the redemption still to come. At my family's seders, we follow a tradition of filling Elijah's cup with wine from each participant's cup, as each person shares their hope/wish for the future.

This statement, from a contemporary Haggadah, encapsulates the purpose of the Seder: "This is the promise of deliverance from servitude. Created in God's image, we need never be subject to another's cruel will. As God promises us deliverance so must we ensure the freedom of every human being."*

As we rise from our seder tables sated from the food we have been blessed to eat and the company we have shared, so too may we rise from our seder tables inspired to work for the future redemption of all.



Dr. Helmut Walser Smith is the Martha Rivers Ingram Professor of History at Vanderbilt University and currently a National Endowment for the Humanities Scholar in Residence at the Center for Jewish History in New York. He is the author of several books, including The Butcher's Tale: Murder and Antisemitism in a German Town (W.W. Norton, 2002), and Germany: A Nation in Its Time: Before, During and After Nationalism (W.W. Norton/Liveright, 2020). His current book project is tentatively titled Local Truth: How Jews and Germans Made the Memory Culture of the Federal Republic, 1945-2000.

One of his students asked, "What can one learn from a train?" Jacob of Sadgora answered, "That because of one second a person can miss everything." The student went on to ask, "and from the telegraph?" Jacob of Sadgora answered, "That every word is counted and charged."

Being curious, asking questions, exploring the world around us in an inquisitive manner leads us to greater discovery, increased awareness and deeper insight.

Let's face it, all kids are born curious. It is not something that you need to teach them, but it is something that can be squashed as they grow older. It is our job as parents to provide a safe and encouraging environment where our kids' natural curiosity can flourish. These 15 simple activities for curious kids from the Bookery, they are just a few ideas that you can try with your family.

Wonder Activities:

1: Go outside and look at the clouds. What things do you see in the clouds?

2: What shape is the moon tonight? Is it always that shape?

3: Trace your hand. What animals can you turn it into?

4: Look at your family. What is something that is the same about all of them? What is something different about each person?

5: Find your shadow. How many ways can you make it move?

11: With Play-Doh, make a ball, snake and pancake. What is the same about all of them? What can you make using all three shapes?

12: Use a rope or hose to make a line on the ground outside. How many different ways can you go over the line?

13: Put some water in a bowl. Pick 5 small things from around the house. Take turns putting each one in the water. Which ones sink and which ones float. Why do you think some things float and others sink?

14: Collect 4 different leaves. How are their shapes and colors different? **15:** Bake something sweet, or anything else together. Where do you think the ingredients come from? What happens if you don't follow the recipe? How can something be liquid when it goes in the oven and solid when it comes out?

My Ukrainian Babushka

She was proud to wear her traditional Ukrainian National hair design: a "crown braid" that circled over the top of her head until her death at age 86. Grandma, Sarah Wiser and Sam Schubert had 4 children inside of 4 years on a truck farm in Hightstown, NJ growing vegetables. After Sam got frustrated with how a much anticipated contract with Heinz treated his tomatoes at

their pickup, he gave up farming and became "the best tailor in Washington Heights". Sarah soon moved her brood without the geese and chickens to 162nd St. where many Jews had gathered.

Our Mom was 17 when they left the farm and graduated Hunter College in 1935, straight A's in Physiology. But the local public school system would not hire her due to her "immigrant accent", until she organized the local Teachers' Union and finally prevailed, eventually teaching "Home Economics", selling Consumers (CU Reports) Union subscriptions on the A Train on the way to and from College & Grad School. Jews had a hard time getting jobs. Grandma was proud of her only daughter and also of my three brothers, I am the 4th, the youngest. She sewed all her own clothes, taught my Mom how to sew anything, and I can too. Apparently we were Litvaks, householders, decidedly not the Glitziana businessfolk.

Grandma lived with us for the last 5 years of her life, away from the projects ln Greenpoint Brooklyn. Once I asked my Mom why Grandma hid her bread in her fist during dinner? "She was afraid of roaming Cossacks. (Sounds like the shtetles in Fiddler?) Growing up in the Old Country, they could walk into her childhood home unexpectedly and take everything, anything." Wow!

Ukraine is on the frontlines of the fight for democracy, values that the U.S. was founded on. As Americans, we must continue to remember why Ukraine matters – it matters because we are bound by our word and moral obligation to speak up and act in the face of challenges to democracy. It matters because if Putin succeeds in devastating Ukraine, there is no telling where his brutality will stop.

What will your legacy be?

Earlier last month, my family received a great honor. We were invited to celebrate the legacy of my mother, Susan Peltz Hochhauser, in a very special way. In commemoration of Women's History Month, New York State Assemblymember Didi Barrett and her team put together a book showcasing some remarkable women in our region. The annual book is called "Women's History in the Hudson Valley: Ten Stories from Columbia and Dutchess County". In it,

readers learned about ten special women from varying time periods, each of whom had a unique story about how she positively impacted the community. My mother definitely fit the bill and not only was she included in this year's book, she was also chosen as the "highlighted" honoree including an event to share her story and all that she did.

As she had been a Dean at Dutchess Community College, the event was held there and I felt such nachas when the room became so full, it became standing room only. While we had the honor of hearing from Dr. Peter Jordan, President of DCC and Didi Barrett, others who shared personal stories included DCC's Dr. Werner Steger, City of Poughkeepsie Mayor Yvonne Flowers, and representatives from Nubian Directions II, all of whom worked with my mother and had stories about how she helped so many who would not have been successful without her stern, strong, but loving guidance and assistance. Brian Doyle, former Family Services CEO, shared how my mother was a pioneer in many ways, especially with her work with developmentally delayed youth and creating a safe yet enriching college experience for them.

While I looked around the room, I was overwhelmed at how many people she touched, and hearing their stories and experiences with her. It has been 8 years since she passed, but her spirit and impact is still greatly alive. I felt she was there with us, most likely being embarrassed by all the praise she was receiving. More than on one occasion over the past several years has someone said to me, after connecting my name to my mother, how great and wonderful she was and what a positive impact she had on their life.

After the event, my son said to me that he does not know how his grandmother accomplished so much or how I accomplish so much and he felt he would never be able to live up to that level. I shared that growing up, I never really thought about how my mother was impacting so many people and all I expected from him was to contribute positively to society and make the world a better place than it currently is. I should have also shared with him the story of how someone once asked me how would I ever fill my mother's shoes to which I replied, "Well I am my mother's daughter so I am not worried." Maybe someday my son will say something similar.

My ask of you is to consider what will your legacy be? How are you making the world a better place? There are many ways one can do so. I would be remiss if I did not offer the Jewish Federation as a great opportunity to help others and maybe even set something up financially to keep giving long after one moves on. If it is something you would like to discuss, we are here for you. What we do today has the potential to create a positive impact for years to come.
