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#### **Keeping Our Community Safe—Together**

By Jesse Lunin-Pack, Chair of the Jewish Security Council of the Hudson Valley and Beacon Hebrew Alliance Past President/Safety & Security Team Lead

In recent years, Jewish communities across the country have faced a rising tide of security challenges. From small congregations to large institutions, the landscape has changed—and with it, the responsibility we all share to protect one another. Here in the Hudson Valley, our strength has always come from our ability to come together. That spirit of unity is the foundation on which the Jewish Security Council of the Hudson Valley (JSEC -HV) was built.

JSEC-HV operates as a clearinghouse for security information, best practices, and coordinated planning for Jewish institutions across the region. As part of the Jewish Federation of Dutchess County, our mission is simple: to help our synagogues, schools, camps, and community organizations stay informed, stay prepared, and stay connected.

When security incidents happen anywhere in the region—or anywhere in the country—information and lessons learned must be shared quickly. JSEC -HV ensures that local leaders have access to timely updates, vetted recommendations, and a network of peers facing similar challenges. With the help of Patrick Regan, our dedicated Community Security Initiative Regional Security Director, we help institutions understand available state and federal grant programs, share model security protocols, and connect them with trusted law-enforcement and emergency-response partners. Most importantly, we encourage collaboration. No synagogue or school should have to navigate these issues alone.

A key partner in this effort is The Community Security Service (CSS), the leading national organization that trains volunteer security teams for Jewish institutions. I am proud to serve as a security trainer with CSS, and



I've seen firsthand how their approach empowers regular community members—people just like us—to contribute meaningfully to safety without ever compromising the welcoming spirit of our spaces.

CSS's philosophy is rooted in preparedness, not fear. Their programs train volunteers to recognize suspicious behavior, respond appropriately to unfolding situations, and work seamlessly with professional security and law

New Year's resolutions are often made this time of year; but by this time a month from now, they've fallen apart. Maybe the goal was well-intended but too ambitious, or maybe we worry that we'll reach our goal but find it's just an additional burden.

How about reaching a goal that you know will be *less* of a burden?

If older adults, families and caregivers can make one plan for 2026, let it be one you've heard from us before:

Get to know us BEFORE you need us.

It's much easier to plan intelligently for aging before there's a crisis, as opposed to reacting in a hurry when the crisis happens. Planning for our aging builds a strong foundation for reacting to what lies ahead.

No plan will be flawless, but adapting an existing plan to changing circumstances is far simpler than drawing up an all new plan under pressure.

Starting to get to know us is as easy as finding something to pass the time the next time a snowstorm keeps you in the house. Head over to the OFA website at **dutchessny.gov/aging**, and go where your curiosity takes you. There's plenty to learn about!

Now wait just a minute here. I may be 80, but I'm still the parent and they're still the child, and who said it was okay to reverse the roles?

As a parent of adult children, has that thought ever crossed your mind? If you're the adult child, have you well-meaningly crossed a boundary with your parent when they weren't ready for it?

Racism and sexism are no longer acceptable in society, but ageism somehow remains acceptable in many ways. Just take a look through the greeting card section of any store for all the wisecracks about getting older. There remains a healthy worldwide market for "anti-aging" products that try to hide the aging process, while not slowing it in the least.

We don't deny that the aging process exists, but ageism gets it all wrong. It's true that the risk for certain chronic diseases and dementia does increase with age; but the health and cognitive function of the overall aging population can remain steady over many years, especially when we practice good nutrition and stay physically and mentally active. A narrative of relentless decline with no positives isn't just false - it's dangerous to all of us.

The truth? Older adults are as likely to offer support as to need it. One look at OFA's hundreds of older volunteers is all you'd need to know. We've had volunteer instructors in our Senior Exercise program in their nineties, and volunteer Home Delivered Meals drivers well into their eighties. 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

#### Rabbi's Blog by Rabbi Glenn Jacob

Living in a time of tumultuous events changes the dynamic between the Jew and the world surrounding the Jewish community. National are pushing us into unfathomable only a few decades ago, and the country sees itself as in crisis. Two years have passed since October 7, and Israel is still struggling with the consequences of the attack and the poor choices of resolution. The deaths, the suffering, and the ongoing threats in both theaters demands more robust response than most Jews can remember in their lifetimes.

Hanukkah captured the early rabbinic imagination because the Jews of that era also lived in a time of tumult. The Jews were despised in the Roman lands and tolerated in the Persian lands while traveling ever further to find places of refuge where they could live peacefully. Hanukkah was transformed from a poorly remembered military victory where the nascent Hasmoneans also seized the mantle of high priesthood into a celebration of Jews creating a safe haven, a country free of foreign tyranny and restored with godly worship. In the twentieth century, Hanukkah was transformed again into a festival of freedom, of civil and religious rights.

All these religious ideas, beliefs that our ancestors created in the face of their challenges, are again being put to the test today. American democracy is under threat and Israeli democracy is under severe strain.

The new normal is fear, anxiety, and panic. The zeitgeist is ugly behaviors and distressing news on the front page followed by disturbingly normal news on the other pages, as if the tumult does not really exist or is contained. Where does the conscientious Jews stand? What does a conscientious Jew say or do?

There are only four possible responses: apathy, avoidance, diligence, and protest.

The apathetic response is the most popular action, that many chose by not choosing. Apathy is the default. Such folks keep a tenuous tab on the news and are always willing to utter an innocuous exclamation before returning to other tasks and concerns. Apathetic people practice a belief that there is someone else out there who will address the issues on their behalf.

Those who avoid all the ugliness must work hard to achieve their goal. The suffering and chaos are scribbled on the grocery store shelves as much as they are broadcast on any media or social media outlet. Steering clear of the blaring signs is deliberate and requires effort; these people choose ignorance, even to the point of separating themselves from the community and the conversation.

The diligent are those who bring up the challenges, the suffering, and the dilemmas we face in conversation. Over coffee, over dinner, during the oneg and during any gathering, the diligent are seeking out others who also see the events unfolding as they do. They seek to nudge the apathetic and rouse the runaways to pay attention. These are our community organizers, the people who call upon our conscience.

Finally, there are the doers who are often the protesters, the folks who take their diligence out into the community and further, onto the streets and into the offices of legislators. They are labeled aggressive in their behavior, as if what they are doing is somehow not polite. They may be good people, but they are not polite given the circumstances. They are calling us to task, to address the pain, the suffering, the loss, and the further threats to all we hold dear, in Israel and in the United States. These are the people who practice the maxim, actions speak louder than words.

This month, you will light the candles of the hanukkiah. Each night you hold that shamash in your hand to light the candles, you are going to make a conscious choice, either to add to the holiness or to subtract from the sanctity of the festival. I hope you will make choices that promote a better future both here and in Israel. Choose wisely.

enforcement. Participants do not need prior experience. What they learn is awareness, coordination, and confidence—skills that can make a critical difference in a crisis and that elevate the overall security posture of our entire region. The reality is that security is strongest when it is shared. A single camera, guard, or policy helps, but an engaged, trained, and connected community is transformational. When our institutions communicate with one another, when volunteers understand their role, and when professionals and laypeople work from the same playbook, we create a protective network far greater than the sum of its parts.



What the upcoming changes to charitable deductions could mean for you by Richelle Maguire, CPA, Partner and Sarah A. Guilmette, CPA, Partner of PKF O'Connor Davies

As we approach year-end, it is crucial to review any tax planning opportunities that may be available to you, especially in light of the various changes from "The One, Big, Beautiful Bill Act" (OBBBA). One of the most significant changes affects charitable deductions beginning in 2026. You may want to consider making charitable contributions before December 31, 2025 to maximize the current tax rules.

The benefits of specific planning opportunities can vary based on the income or losses expected for the year. By this point, many taxpayers will have a good picture of where they stand. Read on for more details on how you can prepare for the upcoming changes to charitable deductions and other tax planning considerations for year-end.

#### New Charitable Deduction Limits Coming in 2026 — Here's How to **Prepare**

Under OBBBA, starting in 2026 there are some significant changes to charitable deductions. Changes include:

- For taxpayers who do not itemize, there will be an "above-the-line" deduction for cash contributions to public charities of up to \$1,000 for single taxpayers and \$2,000 if married filing jointly.
- For taxpayers who itemize, there is a new 0.5% floor on charitable contributions, meaning only the portion of charitable contributions that exceed 0.5% of an itemized taxpayer's adjusted gross income will be deductible.
- The tax value of charitable deductions is also capped at the 35% tax rate (even if the taxpayer is in a higher 37% bracket).

Since these changes start for tax year 2026, taxpayers may consider making charitable contributions before December 31, 2025, to maximize the current tax rules. This is especially important for those who may have significant charitable contributions planned for early 2026, since it may be more tax advantageous to make those contributions before December 31, 2025, instead.

For some taxpayers who typically do not itemize their deductions, it may also make sense to "bunch" your charitable contributions. This involves making two- or three-years' worth of charitable contributions in the current year so that you maximize your tax deduction by exceeding the

#### We Have Seen This Before

It is a bad movie that we are watching on repeat. The same plot, narrative, and hatred. Political parties have shifted to their extremes, again looking at the same cause of the root of their problems: The Jewish people. This time, unlike in the 1930's, it is as well pointed at Israel, the Jewish state.

It is incumbent upon everyone who cares about the future of Jews in the United States to get active and take part in helping to bolster our small Federation here in Dutchess County. To that end, one of the most significant things that has happened here is the antisemitism found in schools in this county. We are looking for parent volunteers to get involved in these school districts and monitor the antisemitism coming out of it. As well, we are looking for those who wish to serve on committees to help us with Jewish Community Building, fighting the scourge of antisemitism, and building community between Jewish and non Jewish groups.

Antisemitism continues unabated across the west, worsening in scope, size, and apathy. standard tax deduction otherwise available.

As a reminder, taxpayers who receive a required minimum distribution (RMD) but do not need the funds can also consider a qualified charitable distribution from their IRA. Individuals can direct up to \$108,000 from their IRA to go directly to a qualified charity and their taxable income is reduced by that amount.

There are many options available to achieve your charitable goals. Depending upon the amount of your charitable contribution and your specific tax situation, you will want to consider whether the gift should be made in cash, appreciated securities or other assets and whether the gift should be made directly to the charitable organization or to a donor-advised fund. Since the deduction limits differ depending upon the various methods used, it can be helpful to discuss options with your PKF O'Connor Davies team in advance of making the gift so that proper tax projections and planning can be done, with an eye toward ensuring your overall goals are met.

I often say that I would love to have at least one opportunity of experiencing an idyllic "Hallmark movie" evening before my family descends back into reality. As you know, I do love my family, more than they will ever know, but having everyone under the same roof,

especially after they have been living on their own, can be challenging. I remember how my mom used to give us "the lecture" every time we came home about how we had to adjust back to living in a family again and that we could not just do what we wanted, when we wanted, but I digress.

We will still continue with our *Mitzvah Now*, helping those in need (such as the "Pack the Purse" for victims of domestic abuse at the Grace Smith House, for which the response was overwhelming, or our upcoming "Heads, Shoulder, Hands, and Toes" collection of hats, scarves, gloves, and socks for children and adults at the Family Partnership to prepare for dropping temperatures), our senior holiday gifts (which started as 25 gifts at 4 nursing homes is now close to 250 gifts at 11 nursing homes and private residences), our Learn & Lunch Bunch led by the amazing Suzanne Turissi, and our PJ Library led by the fabulous Tamatha Williams, helping ensure the sustainability of Jewish life, to name a few. It just means that we are all rowing together...and we need more rowers! Please join us. Make a difference. Volunteer! Donate! Take advantage of our Board's Annual Campaign Matching program to make your dollars go even further!

#### **New Remembrance Garden at Vassar Temple**

When the shrubs around Vassar Temple were trimmed back to alleviate a security issue, the eternal flame sculpture in front of the building was fully uncovered. A "remembrance garden" has been planted around the sculpture in keeping with its theme. The garden will feature pollinatorfriendly plants, supporting sustainability and education in this important environmental area. Fall planting has been completed and the sculpture cleaned. The garden has been designed to provide multi-season interest, and additional work will taker place in the spring. Our Cemetery, Dayenu, and House committees are collaborating on this project, with plants donated by our members from their home gardens. The sculpture was erected in 1993 by the Bloch family in memory of Elaine F. Bloch, and was designed by the well-known sculptor Joseph A. Burlini. A plaque on the sculpture's pedestal, now visible, contains a Hebrew quotation from Proverbs 20:27, translated as "The human spirit is the light of the Eternal."





