Security During the High Holiday Season

The 2025 High Holy Day Season is upon us. While we all give and receive warm wishes of renewal, reflection, and hope for a good year ahead, it is also a time for all communities to be alert, safe, and united.

The Jewish community will hold its usual large gatherings, both indoors and out this year. The vitriol directed at the Jewish and Israeli communities has inspired several people to commit, plan or attempt to commit acts of violence against Jewish and Israeli people or institutions throughout the US in the past year. While there are not known threats to specific individuals or institutions in the Greater Hudson Valley, it is more important than ever that we develop, update, discuss, and practice awareness, security, and emergency response procedures.

The Community Security Initiative (CSI) continues to meet the moment in a variety of ways, not limited to continuing to liaison with law enforcement at all levels, monitoring of events in our institutions, threat and intelligence analysis, trainings, and connecting individuals and institutions with security related resources. CSI continues to conduct comprehensive vulnerability assessments, offering guidance in grant application as well as post grant procurement.

Institutions can also continue to meet the moment. Most often attacks against any institution begin long before the point at which they actually occur. Everyone should be discussing their day to day security and emergency response procedures. If you have none, CSI is always there to help you develop them. For the gatherings over the next few weeks, particular attention should be paid to access control and screening. The greatest strength of the Jewish community has always been its unity. Haters do not discern whether an institution is reform or conservative, modern, or ultra orthodox. Cultural barriers should never stand in the way of information sharing and alertness. If you see something, say something. If you hear something, say something. When we hear about an attack, we always read about the signals that preceded it. Our collective mission is to notice those signals so action can be taken anywhere from weeks, to minutes or seconds before someone accelerates on their pathway to violence. In our neighborhoods and communities, both physical and virtual, if something seems or feels out of place, trust your instincts. If something doesn't feel right and you don't know what to do - tell someone. Always call 911 in an emergency, if you're not sure what to do, call CSI.

CSI will hold a webinar on Tuesday, September 2, at 3:00pm. The webinar will be available afterward. CSI will also hold a security awareness briefing specific to the Hudson Valley (Dutchess, Orange, and Ulster Counties) on September 9, at 7:00pm. I encourage all community members to participate in these opportunities, and please contact CSI's regional director with any questions or concerns.

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

IT'S TIME TO JEW IT!

Dear friends,

As we approach the new Jewish year, we find ourselves in the very special month of Elul, preceding the New Year and the High Holy Days. It is a month dedicated to introspection and self evaluation, as well as a time to seek to correct the past and make attempts to better ourselves in the coming year.



The month of Elul is a special time of Divine closeness between us and G-d. It is a month where G-d's thirteen attributes of mercy are dominant and when G-d makes Himself more accessible to connect with Him than the rest of the year.

Rabbi Borenstein

Rabbi Schneur Zalmen, the first Chabad Rebbe and author of the Tanya and Code of Jewish Law, offers the following parable about the special quality of this month. He calls it: "THE KING IS IN THE FIELD". During the year a king is found in his palace, and getting an audience with the king involves much scrutiny, preparation, and usually a long wait. However, one day the king comes out of his palace and strolls through the fields, making himself available to the common man, and each person can approach the king with any request and the king "shows a smiling face to all." (Likutei Torah)

G-d is a loving Father and is always accessible to us. We call out to Him and He always hears us. However, in the month of Elul, He comes out "to the field", where we can approach Him, no matter who we are or where we are at. We can approach Him "as we are". It is a time when the Jewish soul is more easily aroused, to reconnect with our Divine source. It is a time for Teshuva.

The world translates Teshuva as 'repentance', however, Chassidic teachings enlighten us to the true meaning of the word Teshuva which is 'return'. Repentance denotes a break from the past and a new beginning. But for a Jew, reconnecting with his Jewishness is not a new endeavor or adventure. It is merely returning and reconnecting with his true inner source, his G-dly essence. For no matter the external layers, or his having deviated from Jewish observance, he remains a Jew and "A Jew neither he wants nor can he disconnect from G-dliness".

So as we approach the New Year and the High Holidays, it is a time to reconnect with G-d, to seek a true relationship. And just as the King of all kings comes out to the field, we too should come out 'to the field' by expressing our Jewishness openly and proudly. Not just in "the palace", in the synagogue or on holy days, but on every day of the year, on a simple workday (as is the month of Elul) by studying Torah to deepen our understanding of what it really means to be and live like a Jew by observing the Mitzvot to the best of our ability. That is the true demonstration of our Jewishness. That is how we should enter the New Year with a deeper connection to our heritage, and by taking upon ourselves to strengthen oneself in observing another Mitzvah or Mitzvot.

So how do we greet the New Year?

Forgiveness by Suzanne Turrisi, PJ Library Assistant Director

To forgive at the high holidays is essential for personal and communal atonement. We need to acknowledge the wrong doing and seek forgiveness, to apologize sincerely and make amends. Forgiveness during the High Holidays goes beyond superficial apologies. It involves a genuine effort to repair relationships and move forward with a clean slate. While seeking forgiveness from others is paramount, Yom Kippur is also a time to seek forgiveness from G-d or for sins against G-d.

Forgiveness can be challenging, especially when dealing with deep hurt, but it is considered a crucial part of personal and spiritual growth. Forgiveness is also a way to release yourself from the burden of resentment and anger, promoting your own healing and well-being. Being able to forgive is a gift to yourself, freeing yourself from anger and bitterness. Forgiving doesn't mean forgetting, excusing the wrong, or even reconciling with the one who wronged you. You can forgive and still never trust them. It is, however, a way of healing, not because they necessarily deserve it, but because you do. It is a process, not a one time event. Forgiveness, like growth, is not always linear. Anytime you eliminate negative feelings, you make space for more positive ones.

According to Makeitjewish.com, "Yom Kippur gives us an opportunity to teach our children important lessons about recognizing that we've made mistakes, we need to apologize for them, and we need to try our best to do better next time. It can be tough to say "I'm sorry" at any age, but making "I'm sorry" hearts can make it a little easier. Your kiddos can decorate these mini wood hearts however they like and then write "I'm sorry" on each of them. When they feel ready, they can give an "I'm sorry" heart to someone whose feelings they've hurt. This gives them a tangible way to experience owning up to a mistake and hopefully experiencing forgiveness, too. How could you not forgive someone who's given you a beautiful "I'm sorry" heart?'
