# Why The Federation?

Jewish kids, growing up here in Grand Rapids, MI, can't even begin to imagine what it was like growing up in Hewlett, NY, where I spent the formative years of my life. Jewish life in Hewlett was so vibrant, I didn't think about Israel very often.

I'm embarrassed to say it now; but, the idea of Israel actually seemed extra to me. But I had no need for Israel. Why would I? There was a synagogue on almost every street in my home town. Kosher food everywhere. The deli was still alive and well in my town. You could get matzo ball soup for dinner every day of the week if you chose. And with all of these fixtures came all the Jewish kids. And Why do I need to say all of this?



Well, I can't answer the question "Why The Federation?" without explaining why in the first 18 years of my life I didn't need Federation. Any Federation. But now, in the absence of an almost entirely Jewish world around me, I need Federation. I need Federation's community events—like speakers and holiday parties. I need Federation's support for our seniors and people in need. I need Federation's support of our kids, going to camp and through PJ Library. I need the representation that Federation provides, in a larger community, in which Jews are largely invisible.

More than anything, I am grateful to Federation for helping to send me to Israel, on the Momentum trip, last year, although I didn't know it, until I was there, and I was reminded what I have lost over the last 25 years or so—a rich and encompassing Jewish community. I need Federation to be the foundation of Jewish life where I live now—Grand Rapids. Lovely as it is, it feels like the diaspora—compared to New York.

# Three Grand Rapids Women Become Members of the Pomegranate Society!

At this year's campaign kick-off event on September 19, three women in our community stepped up to become donors at the Pomegranate level.

Here's the story of the Pomegranate Pin:

More than a beautiful piece of jewelry, the Pomegranate Pin is a symbol of a woman's commitment to, and compassion for, the Jewish people. In 1981, the women of Allentown, Pennsylvania, introduced the Pomegranate Pin as a way to inspire giving from women. Almost four decades after its inception, more than 8,000 pins have been distributed across North America to women philanthropists.

Women at the Pomegranate level donate between \$1,800 and \$4,999 to the Jewish Federation of Grand Rapids Annual Campaign.

#### The Origin of the Pomegranate:

An ancient symbol found carved into the lintels of the earliest synagogues, the pomegranate has carried with it the concepts of Judaism for generations. In the Torah, the pomegranate is one of the seven species that the spies saw in the land when they were sent forth by Moses. The Midrash tells us that the pomegranate has 613 seeds, which corresponds with the number of mitzvot or commandments found in the Torah. The pomegranate has been woven into ancient fabrics and hammered into ceremonial silver and gold objects. The intricate covers for the handles of the Torah scrolls are called "rimonim" or pomegranates.


