2022

Our Alliance started this year with high expectations and a staff full of excitement. Through an enormous amount of hard work, extra hours and true community dedication, I believe our results met our expectations. This doesn't happen through wishing it, or writing an article...it takes HARD WORK!

Hard work our staff put in, whom I truly believe is unparalleled in their devotion, care and commitment to our community. Hard work our Executive Board and General Board put in by helping to fill the gap created by not having an Executive Director. Hard work by all the volunteers sharing their passion with our community. Without the combined efforts of these groups, our organization would not be able to accomplish a fraction of what we have done in 2022. But you may ask...what have we done and what are we doing?

I like to tell people the Knoxville Jewish Community far out punts our coverage. There exists in Knoxville almost every aspect of Jewish life a person or family could want to find in a larger city.

Our alliance underwrites Hillel at UTK and provides our local students a director, an amazing array of programming, and a transition from student life to adult life. Our PJ Library program interacts with young families and provides them a fun and interactive entry point to Jewish life. Our Jewish Family Services provides vital "behind the scenes" help to individuals at their times of greatest need as well as continuing to provide Jewish life experiences to our community members in assisted and adult living centers. Our thriving Preschool's Judaica programming introduces expressions of Jewish life to our youngest. Our camp programming is exceptional, and our pool is the highlight of Jewish summer life in Knoxville again. Our Alliance's staff serves as a great resource for the entire community.

Of special note is what our statewide Federation coordinated effort was able to achieve. Active and engaged both locally and on a state level, we have accomplished MAJOR milestones in 2022.

One of our main goals was accomplished when we were able to get \$500,000 for nonprofit security grant funding to be included in the state budget. This funding was ADDITIONAL State monies allocated over and above the Federal Homeland Security Nonprofit Grants. Tennessee is now one of only 6 states to enact such budget items.

We supported the passage of the Antisemitic bill, which prohibits and bans in all K-12 schools, all discriminatory acts, and practices committed against individuals or institutions based on the individual's or institutions Jewish religious practices or on the tenets of the Jewish religion, shared Jewish ancestry, or Jewish ethnic characteristics. To determine whether the act was anti-Semitic, local agencies must take into consideration the definition and examples of anti-Semitism taken from the working definition of antisemitism adopted by the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance (IHRA).

We supported the passage of Anti-BDS legislation. As enacted, it prohibits a public entity from entering into a contract with a company unless the contract includes a written certification that the company is not currently engaged in, and will not for the duration of the contract engage in, a boycott of Israel. We worked to pass the National Holocaust Remembrance Resolution early in this legislative session and supported additional funding for the Tennessee Holocaust Commission.

Before 2022 closes and we turn our eyes to next year, let us all take a moment and reflect how blessed our community is to have our Alliance. We get things done that other communities our size only dream of. We should remain grateful to each other and engaged as a community so that we can continue providing meaningful Jewish life experiences for many years to come!

AJCC Building:

- Painted throughout



Programming

In 2022, KJA Programming brought the Knoxville Jewish community together through large community-wide events as well as sponsoring intimate events where we could learn and grow together. In collaboration with all the Knoxville area Jewish organizations, Knoshville returned in 2022 bigger and better than ever. KJA Programming also worked with area organizations to host well-attended Yom HaShoah, Shabbat at the Pool, and Hannukah events. As well as helping out with all events that use the KJA campus, Programming organized the UT Faculty Lecture series, monthly Rosh Chodesh circle, KJA Gives Thanks (which collected coats and food items for local charities), community yoga, and an enlightening outing to the Titanic museum.
