

Preschool at AJCC fosters exploration with sensory bins in each classroom. They are changed regularly to reflect the theme in which the students are learning.



Preschool is so thankful to be part of the AJCC, where the beautiful grounds allow for so much outdoor play.

The enrollment totals for Preschool at AJCC reached 89 students this year with strong engagement across various programs and events. Highlights include the Purim Party on March 22 welcomed 24 family members, the Art Gala welcomed 42 family members and 17 community members, and the Family Shabbat Party on May 17 welcomed 27 family members. Community contributions included hosting KJDS for the Sukkah Hop, running a pet supply drive for PAWS, offering free birdfeeder-making at Knoshville, and providing tuition assistance for Israeli refugees. These efforts highlight a year of growth, community engagement, and giving back.

Our monthly e-newsletter further supports families by sharing local programming, blog posts, podcasts, and virtual events that connect them to the broader Jewish community.

This year, Amelia Brooke led 61 swimmers. The Smokin' Salmon team were undefeated this summer in 4 meets, which should allow us to move up to League 5 next year. Thank you Amelia, Ethan, Effie, and Alisa for a great summer of swimming. On September 7, the 3rd annual Pooch Plunge at the Allen Rosen Aquatic Center was a successful fundraiser! This event was open to the greater–Knoxville community and an opportunity for pet owners to bring their dogs for a day of swimming at the pool.

A Strategic Plan was developed and implemented to improve collection development and management and increase the utilization of the Archives:

- · Support to KJA Partnering Organizations included providing materials to Heska Amuna Synagogue and creating a digital collection of Gilya Schmidt's exhibit presented in the Schwarbart Gallery

Jewish Family Services The JFS committee met eight times during the year to plan and manage activities, including monthly First Friday Shabbats at Sherrill Hills with services and refreshments provided to 12 residents.

Volunteers visited 24 residents in senior facilities, delivering challahs and holiday gift bags. The chairperson handled 25 discreet calls for referrals, addressing housing, community services, and emergency funding.





One educational event, Nature and Wellness, featured photographer Ron Sentell and wellness discussions, attended by 12 community members. The committee supported Susannah's House with donations and is exploring new initiatives for the greater Knoxville community. Future plans include collaborating on an aging program in March and assisting with a proposed community health fair.









Hillel at UTK engaged 86 Jewish students this year. Thanks to grants from KJCFF, Jewish Federation of Greater Nashville, and Hillel International, as well as targeted fundraising, Hillel at UTK was able to provide 86 Jewish students with 17 Shabbat and holiday gatherings, weekly study group for first year students, 4 Nights Out at local restaurants, 3 service projects, 4 campus tablings, and a variety of other campus and community programs. Hillel at UTK also worked with the Dean's Office to provide the director with weekly office hours for spring and fall semesters. Also in the spring, fifteen students gathered for the 4th annual Shabbaton in the Smokies to focus on Shabbat and Israel.

We have worked diligently to expand funding for Hillel at UTK in 2024. Thanks to a local donor, a Hillel at UTK Fund was created with KJCFF. During Hillel Global Giving Week in May, Hillel at UTK raised \$5,132.42 from 53 donors.

Thanks to Hillel International, we received a \$5,000 match and an additional \$500 for increasing our last year's donors more than 20%. Our total of \$10,632.42 was a 10% increase over last year.

This year, more than 1,200 households received HaKol. This is a 7% increase over last year. We also welcomed two annual advertisers in 2024, and all previous advertisers returned.

Media & Communications

In 2024, KJA Connection averaged its readership at 1,067. Our open rate averaged 51%, a decrease of 9% since 2023.

The Knoxville Jewish Alliance welcomed our first Shinshinim in August, Noa Gilan and Tsur Kushnir. Shinshinim are recent high school graduates from Israel who spend a year volunteering in our community through the Jewish Agency for Israeli. Noa and Tsur have been bringing their energy, joy, and deep connection to Israel throughout our community. They have revitalized our BBYO-Connect program for middle schoolers, taught weekly cooking classes for the Preschool at AJCC, tutored Hebrew at KJDS, brought fun Israeli activities to Temple Beth El Religious School, joined with Shabbat services and dinners with Hillel at UTK and Jewish Family Services at Sherrill Hills, and more. They have also put together a powerful exhibit in the Schwarzbart Gallery in honor of victims and hostages of the October 7th attacks in Israel, as well as participating in community memorials, educational programs, and programs at local churches to speak about their personal experiences.
