Mission Statement

Section 1.

The mission of the Knoxville Jewish Alliance (KJA) is to serve the Jewish people locally, in Israel, and throughout the world. Through coordinated fundraising, community-wide programming, social services, educational, and other activities, the KJA seeks to:

- A. Build community;
- B. Provide assistance for those in need;
- C. Promote Jewish culture and identity;
- D. Develop effective Jewish leaders;
- E. Enhance community relations locally, regionally, nationally, and internationally;
- F. Operate and maintain the Arnstein Jewish Community Center (AJCC).

Section 2.

This corporation is organized exclusively for charitable, religious and educational purposes including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended, or corresponding provisions of any future federal tax codes.





President's Report

Chip Rayman, KJA President

My **three-year tenure** as your president has come to a close and it has been most **fulfilling**. My name is inscribed on the Presidential Plaque and on a brick at the Logan Brown Memorial. And that's all I want – **that I was here and tried to make a difference serving the community**. One of the most **rewarding** benefits was meeting all the wonderful Jewish people I would never have known had I not served as President.

I have referred to my time as "**Vigil to Virus.**" The Vigil was to commemorate the murders at the Tree of Life Synagogue. And the coronavirus pandemic has covered almost the entire year of 2020. But we had a great year in-between.

Understandably so, our **preschool numbers were significantly down due to the virus**, even after expanding the preschool and adding infant care the past two years. Upon the onset of the virus we **laid off everyone** except our executive staff and preschool director. Later we were able to call them back. **Preschool expansion and infant care** had been very successful up to this point.

This year camp was greatly reduced in numbers. Even so, it **was very successful**, not having a virus related issue, and we made money on camp, which was a big surprise. Finally, the law of averages caught up with us and we had a **COVID related case in preschool** despite our superb efforts to follow and implement CDC and health department guidelines. The incident, which was contracted outside of our preschool, caused us to shut down preschool for a short period. But we got **back to normal** and are doing well.

Without obtaining almost **\$235,000 in grants and \$150,000 in Payroll Protection Program loans** we would have been be in trouble. The KJA also took over the lead in concluding the acquisition of a **\$100,000 security grant** from the Department of Homeland Security/Tennessee Emergency Management Agency. This grant is to be shared equally by all 5 Jewish institutions in Knoxville that have buildings.

We also had our **second indigent burial** in a short period of time after going six years without one. So the Dewey Reich fund is somewhat depleted and we need to replenish it.

We need a normal camp this coming summer and a full enrollment preschool next fall to make it past the pandemic.

Thank you to all of those who have helped me and supported the Center. There are too many of you to mention. The only person I will single out is **Ed Hunter**, a tireless worker, gem of a guy, man of great integrity, a dedicated professional with a passion and vision for the Center, who, more than anyone else has sustained this vital institution for over 20 years. I love him.

The highlights of my 3 year administration, in my mind, were the **Vigil** we had at the Center for the Tree of Life Synagogue murders, having a very successful second year in all facets - **record numbers for preschool, Yom Hashoah** attendance, and 5 year **highs for camp attendance** and almost achieving our **Annual Campaign goal** of \$300,000. After many years and several others attempting, we obtained **representation on our board for Chabad and Beth El – Jewish Congregation of Oak Ridge.** We erected the historical highway type marker downtown memorializing native Knoxvillian **Master Sgt, Roddie Edmonds, a Righteous Among the Nations**, for saving 200 Jewish prisoners of war from probable death with his declaration, "**We are all Jews here**"; developed a **Master Plan** for the AJCC campus and reached an agreement for the **Knoxville Jewish Day School** to relocate to our campus. However, the Day School found another location that is ideally suited to their needs. I am very happy for them. Then, the very strong response to **Adam Brown's family donation** making the **playground enhancement and expansion** possible and all those who supported the effort with the purchase of a commemorative brick. The **swim team** at record levels and winning their category at the city swim meet. **BBYO girls** winning best chapter at their annual convention. Art Exhibits. Assisting with the founding of the **GKJ Men's Club**. **Knoshville.** Strong rental revenue from the grounds, pool and building. **Collaborating with Temple, Synagogue and Hillel on adult education**. The expansion of Hillel at UT under great directorship and **Hillel addressing all the Jew hatred that was painted on The Rock.** Our **Knoxville Against Hate billboard**, our **'2 page newspaper ad** expressing our support to the **Black community** both of which garnered us **grants from the East Tennessee Foundation**.

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Continuing dramatic **physical improvements** to the pool and building from renovating the ladies restrooms, to LED lighting, renovations to the Orwitz room, to knocking down walls to create more and better classrooms. Maintaining our **3 Star in all categories rating** for our preschool.

Most proudly, we are a rising **\$1.4 million dollar operation**, and after having deficit after deficit for years, last year we had a **significant \$70,000 surplus**.

There have been many new Jewish families coming to Knoxville during the past year. Knoxville's Jewish community is growing! Whether you are affiliated religiously or not, affiliate with the KJA and AJCC.

Life is a journey of successes and disappointments. I feel good about my tenure. We will get though the Covid-19 Coronavirus and the **future is bright** for the at large Greater Knoxville Jewish community.

In the past twelve months the Archives accomplished the following:

- Added 3 new family files so we now have 759 family files [as of 2 November 2020]
- Continued implementing recommendations from the preservation assessment
- Continued to preserve and file bulletins and publications of Knoxville and surrounding Jewish communities' organizations
- Provided photos and text for "The Way We Were" feature in each Ha'Kol issue
- Responded to several online queries
- Continued adding new clippings, documents, and photographs to existing files, biographical and organizational
- Committee member Jonathan Branton continued selling books discarded from the erstwhile AJCC library on eBay with portion of proceeds to Archives
- Filed items, old and new, and updated the classification ledger
- Sought and received invaluable assistance from both current and former community members to help identify persons, places, events, and times in photographs and other materials
- Continued work on the Memorial Plaques project
- Continued editing transcribed interviews
- Sought and sometimes found photographs and other materials as requested by KJA staff and others in the community
- Archives assistant worked with digitization specialist in digitizing *The Center Menorah* issues; several years are available online
- Created procedures for handling materials during the coronavirus pandemic
- Made the Archives room "camp-ready," removing items from all surfaces and placing everything, including the computer and scanner, behind the closed accordion doors
- Responded to query from Mark Littmann seeking assistance preparing his Heska Amuna history play, *Those Synagogue Jews*
- Continued serially showcasing panels from the AJCC's 75th anniversary celebration of 2004 in the hallway near the Archives through March
- Continued finding nuggets of Knoxville and surrounding areas' Jewish history in local Knoxville newspapers through newspapers.com

Hillel at UTK inspires students to explore and embrace Jewish life at the University of Tennessee. The KJA provides commitment to the Hillel movement through financial support with staff employment, student programming, and faculty and staff connection. Hillel at UTK partners with Hillel International to achieve the mission of "enriching the lives of Jewish students so that they may enrich the Jewish people and the world."

Hillel International encourages and strives for a student-led movement. At the beginning of the 2020 spring semester, the Hillel Student Board decided to transition to a calendar year board term instead of the current school calendar term. Doing so would allow for greater engagement opportunities over the summer months with new and prospective Vols and an easier transition over the winter break. With complete agreement and enthusiasm, the following Student Board held their positions from June 2019 through December 2020.

As we began 2020, Hillel at UTK held three Shabbat dinners in January, including our annual SoUPER Shabbat and ways the Super Bowl and Judaism connect. In February, Student Board members attended services at Temple Beth El and Heska Amuna for the annual KJA Shabbat. The highlight of spring semester was the Hillel in the Smokies Shabbaton. Hillel at UTK received a grant from Hillel International's Israel Action Program for this Friday night through Sunday morning weekend retreat. Weekend activities included: preparing an Israeli-themed Shabbat brunch, diving into deep discussion on the Jewish connection to Israel and their personal connection to Israel, creating Israeli-themed tile mosaics, hiking on Shabbat in the snow, learning to make Shakshouka, and playing Israeli trivia. The students also had a wonderful visit with Rabbi Alon Ferency, who led them in a Havdalah service under the stars. The first Shabbat of March, Hillel gathered at the International House and welcomed a visiting student, Leah Faupel (and her mother, Dalia), from Georgia – who joined our Volunteer and Hillel family in the Fall of 2020. For Purim, seven Hillel students assisted with Temple Beth El's Purim Carnival.

Then came the Coronavirus outbreak. Over spring break, the University of Tennessee closed its doors, sent students home, and immediately began strictly virtual learning. Hillel at UTK continued to "create a home away from home" for its Jewish students despite the challenges. Highlights of Hillel at UTK creative student engagement through the fall semester were:

- Personal deliveries of "Everything You Need for Seder" care packages for six students who remained in Knoxville
- Virtual Afikomen Hunt created by Helene Sinnreich for students to search for the cartoon afikomen on UTK faculty webpages with prizes
- Graduate celebration via Zoom with a special slide show
- Special gifts mailed to five Hillel graduates
- Drive-Thru Senior Celebration for Emily Schulman, Immediate Past President of Hillel, and Noah Geltzer, former AEPi President from community members, including Chip Rayman and the Boxt family
- Weekly social media/GroupMe engagement, including You and Your Pet
- Shout Outs to celebrate member birthdays
- Connection to Hillel International's Hillel@Home events
- Virtual New Student Engagement Zooms in conjunction with Hillel International's College Guide

- New Vol Welcome Swag Bags
- Midweek Breaks to gather and for grab n' go bagels and donuts
- Sukkah time thanks to a sukkah donated by Helene Sinnreich and Wes Johnson at Campus House of Prayer

- Taschlich service at the Tennessee River
- Yom Kippur break-the-fast curbside pickup
- S'mores and Shabbat at the Campus House of Prayer firepit
- In-person dinner at the International House with curbside pickup an option
- Study Break goodie bags before students head home at Thanksgiving
- Menorah lighting via Zoom during winter break

Hillel at UTK is proud of what we have accomplished despite our world's circumstances. However, Zoom burnout, antisemitism, racial tensions, election anxiety, general anxiety, and loneliness have been evident evils for the UTK Jewish students. Wellness has therefore been of utmost importance. Personal reaches and individual requests have been a priority in these many months. Students have been moved from their dorms into new housing. They have been diagnosed with Covid-19. They have faced quarantine due to contract tracing. Tara has provided Zoom office hours, outdoor office hours, and meal and grocery delivery. At UTK, Vols Help Vols. In this spirit, we have also donated time and supplies to Smokey's Pantry during Mitzvah Mornings at the AJCC and the Knoxville Dream Center with the Campus House of Prayer. We have also created a resource for students to connect with mental health sources, academic supports, and local rabbis. Hillel at UTK is dedicated to take extra care for students no matter what they may need at this atypical time.

Tara Bain, Hillel at UTK Director, maintains a close relationship with the Hillel International's Schusterman International Center. She is directly supported by Rabbi Danielle Leshaw, SIC Campus Support Director. Rabbi Danielle provides consultation and education to solo professionals and small Jewish campuses. Tara also participates in weekly and monthly calls with Hillel professional cohorts for Solo Pros, Women Solo Pros, and Federation-Employed Professionals. SIC maintains an extensive online resource, Hillel HUB, for Hillel Professionals to apply for grants, to find programming inspiration, and to increase their professional toolbox.

Throughout the year, Tara has also participated in SIC's Dwell:in Depth and Joy sessions. These opportunities provided deep dives into critical thinking, ideas, and questions and short gatherings to activate the inner Jewish-maker, such as creating a microgreens garden. In December, Tara will virtually participate in the two-day HIGA, Hillel International Global Assembly, connecting Hillel professionals through Torah study, wellness, cohort gatherings, and best practice workshops. In July, Hillel at UTK began tracking student engagement through SIC's HEaRT (Hillel Engagement and Relationship Tracking) database. Despite the challenges of the pandemic, Hillel at UTK has achieved the following measurements for engagement from July to October, 2020:

Hillel at UTK receives the majority of its financial support for leadership and student engagement from the Jewish Knoxville community's donations. In 2020, the program also received generous grants from the Hillel International and the Federation of Nashville and Middle Tennessee to support:

In a typical year, JFS has many opportunities for community members to volunteer, from leading our monthly Shabbat service, cooking a meal for Mitzvah Meals or Family Promise (or hosting a Family Promise meal), blowing the shofar during the high holy days, visiting seniors, and more.

Activities planned by the Jewish Family Services committee in 2020 included:

- Visiting residents of assisted living facilities and nursing homes (including delivering homemade challah!). Starting in mid-March, our visitors pivoted to writing monthly notes to our long-term care residents to keep in touch with them, as visiting was no longer allowed. We also couldn't bring Shabbat or holiday goodies to our residents, but mailed them cards instead.
- Holding a monthly Shabbat service at Sherrill Hills on the first Friday of each month. Our last service was in March.
- In September we began a weekly "coffee klatch" on Zoom at 10 a.m. on Thursdays. It took a few weeks to gain traction, but now we have a regular group of attendees and look forward to gathering each week.
- Cooking and hosting dinners for Family Promise when situationally homeless families are staying at Tennessee Valley Unitarian Universalist Church. You can read more about the local Family Promise at http://www.familypromiseknoxville.org/
- During the pandemic, families have been sheltering in place at the Family Promise day center. On the weeks when they normally would have been staying at TVUUC, we coordinated volunteers to drop off meals at the day center.

Some of the many things that JFS has assisted clients with in the past year include:

- exploring long-term care options with seniors and/or their family members
- researching senior services in the Knoxville area
- navigating the health care arena (hospital stays, rehabilitation facilities, what to do when you are discharged, etc.)
- providing emergency financial assistance for things such as utility bills, rental assistance, food, or other qualifying expenses
- finding affordable housing
- exploring transportation options
- assisting with counseling referrals
- selecting home care or home health care
- assisting in job searches, including résumé help
- locating culturally-sensitive grief counseling

Normally the KJA Friendshippers group gets together once a month (except for a summer break), usually for lunch and entertainment. Friendshippers is open to all—we don't check IDs at the door! The luncheons begin at noon and the program begins at 1:00 p.m. Lunch is \$8. There is no cost for attending the program alone. Unless

otherwise specified, Friendshippers meets at Sherrill Hills Retirement Community, 271 Moss Grove Boulevard. We started 2020 with a trivia program, before getting derailed by the pandemic. We are eager to resume our in-person programming when it is safe to do so.





Early Childhood Report

The AJCC Preschool has received their 3-Star Rating for the 20th consecutive year, with 3 STARS in all 8 categories.

- 1. Director Qualifications
- 2. Professional Development
- 3. Developmental Learning
- 4. Parent/Family Engagement
- 5. Ratio and Group Size
- 6. Staff Compensation
- 7. Program Assessment
- 8. Child Health and Well-being

The 3 Star program implemented a new category this year, Child Health and Well-Being as well as changed the criteria for some of the existing categories. With this being said, it will be very difficult for centers to maintain 3 Stars in each category. This will be a very prestigious honor going forward.

What does a 3-Star Rating mean?

The Star-Quality Program offers recognition to those providers who exceed minimum licensing standards. Under the program, a provider can earn a rating of 1, 2 or 3 stars, which can then be displayed along with its license. The more stars a program has, the better the quality of care it offers to children. Providers also receive a full report of their Environment Rating Scale observation, so they can continue to understand and address areas that need improvement. Simply by participating in the Star Quality Program, providers show families in their communities that they are working to offer the highest quality child care.





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Preschool at AJCC (January 2020 – May 2020)



Preschool at AJCC was booming when we returned from the Winter Break. We had a total of 75 students enrolled and with some wonderful programming and activities going on. We continued through March 13th and never could we imagine that this would be our final day of preschool for the 2019-2020 school year. During the shut-down/quarantine we had to lay off our hourly employees and refund tuition payments to parents. Several of the parents wanted to chip in and help our preschool staff members during this time so they started the Preschool Relief fund. Many families donated the remainder of their March tuition and April tuition to this fund to help the staff. We were able to provide the staff with grocery gift card and assist with rent and utility payments. This was by far the least we could do in such a time as this. We also provided some resources for families via our social media pages to help keep the children engaged in this time. Rabbi Ferency began a Zoom Shabbat Party with our families. We celebrated our Pre-Kindergarten graduates with a Preschool Completion Diploma and Tassel.



The reopening decision was made to open our summer camp program due to childcare being deemed an essential service during the pandemic and we did just that. We brought back some of our employees in May to begin prepping for the summer camp experience and train on COVID-19 workplace protocols. Thank you to Martha and Marty Iroff for helping move and transition rooms during all of this and Bryan Goldberg for providing training on sanitizing and stepping in to make sure we had everything needed to open and operate efficiently during this time.

We reduced our operating hours to 9am-3pm to maintain the same staff with children throughout the day and allow for extra time to clean and sanitize. TN Aquatics did a wonderful job teaching our campers swimming skills while the AJCC lifeguards kept us safe.

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Early Childhood Report continued



Throughout this school year our kitchen has scored a perfect 100 with the Health Department and our Preschool obtained the highest recognition of 3 Stars in all 8 categories with the State of Tennessee Department of Human Service Stars Program.

The State of Tennessee CARES Act provided several grant opportunities for Childcare centers across the

state to aid in revenue loss sustained during the COVID-19 pandemic. Ms. Kristen took on the tasks of applying for several of these grants and we have received over \$200,000 in grant funding to cover tuition loss for COVID-19 closures, equipment and cleaning materials and staff related absences due to COVID-19. We are awaiting word on two final grants that were applied for before these grants dissolved.









During the quarantine we were able to renovate our current Infant classroom by providing more space for sleeping quarters and paint and rearrange classrooms to fit our growing needs. Thank you to Jonathan Branton, BELFOR Property Restoration, and Marty and Martha Iroff for their hard work during this time.

Due to the pandemic tuition dropped as our protocols for class sizes changed to meet CDC guidelines and keep our staff and students safe. We began the year operating 6 classrooms with 50 preschool children. Although numbers were down, we continued to provide excellent care for our students while keeping everyone safe.

Several of our parents were able to receive assistance from the Essential Worker Child Care Certificate payments that was implemented during the pandemic by the State of Tennessee. Currently this added benefit will dissolve at the end of December.







With our new protocols, we did not have any visitors in the building so the teachers had to get creative on how to



implement Judaica and Music into our Curriculum. They did an awesome job. We even got to celebrate Sukkot under our very own Sukkah and had a visit from Rabbi Yossi and the



Sukkah Mobile. We have had a great time singing and dancing and learning about the special holidays.

We provided a safe, socially distanced learning environment for these students during their school day. PJ Library and PJ Our Way Report

Harold Grinspoon Foundation partnership program

Sarah May, PJ Library Coordinator

PJ Library of Knoxville provides Jewish based cultural books on a monthly basis to Jewish families in the Knoxville area for children ages six (6) months to 7.5 years. PJ Our Way continues the books from 7.5 years of age to 12.5 years of age. The Knoxville Jewish Alliance supports the cost of this program each year at a cost of \$40 per enrolled child.

PJ Library had an exciting year in 2020. The PJ Library program received a generous grant from the Harold Grinspoon Foundation. The grant provided funding for families moving to Knoxville and babies born



in the community with a gift basket. Each gift basket consisted of information on all community programs, gifts from locals shuls and local Jewish owned businesses.

In the Spring PJ Library began neighborhood meetings ran by local parent volunteers. Gatherings were held in various neighborhoods in Knoxville and the surrounding areas to help Jewish families become aquainted. On-going programs continued, including our monthly story time at the Zane Jordan PJ Library located in the Arnstein Jewish Community Center facility.

The COVID 19 pandemic suspended our programs in March. In August we began with all virtual social media programming. We have weekly posts on crafts and coping skills. We have been focusing on crafts that are made from nature or from recycled materials so we don't leave any one out who may have been effected financially from the pandemic. The majority of our coping skills posts are directed towards parents but we have combined our craft time once by creating calm down bottles.











Financial Report

Bernard Bendriem, KJA Treasurer

As you may imagine this year has been challenged by the global pandemic that affected all of us including our community and the operations at the KJA. Much of the effort has been spent on maintaining our pre-school and summer camp operations and well as the Jewish community services. After closing the preschool for a couple of weeks we carefully developed a safe mode of operations to follow the Knox County Health department (KCHD) and Centers for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines with a limited number of students, allowing us to stay open except for a few days.

Therefore, the revenues from the school and summer camp will be around **\$400,000** below what we budgeted. Thankfully, through several grants, for a total amount of **\$223,317** obtained by our preschool director and VP of Education, part of our losses will be compensated. In addition, our president applied for a loan of **\$147,032** under the Paycheck Protection Program, which was successfully granted, and helped maintain a healthy cash flow. We are awaiting further information on the payback plan for PPE loans and part or all of it may turn into another grant.

Combined with a careful management of our expenses concerning the building, we should finish the year with a surplus of about **\$70,000**. Note that this amount does not account for the fact that part of the loan may turn into a grant in 2021 and add to the 2021 revenues of our organization. Not accounting for the latter, the 2021 budget was approved with a **\$60,000** deficit, as we will continue to assume that we operate under the KCHD and CDC guidelines. The budget was developed with the current "pandemic" assumptions:

- KJA continues to operate without an Executive Director
- A number of the preschool children enrolled similar to the current one
- A number of summer day camp weeks sold similar to the past summer
- A similar number of our membership

One disappointment is the low level of the campaign, currently at **\$214,218**, which forced the board to carefully plan, and compromise between planning additional required transformations and preserving the most desired programming activities of the KJA. On a positive note, I want to acknowledge the few members that did increase their pledge and helped the KJA through these difficult times. Clearly a VP of Campaign is needed, as this role is currently assumed by our president and other KJA volunteers that can only spend limited time on this important mission.

Accounting Policies

The Knoxville Jewish Alliance's (KJA) management is responsible for the accuracy and integrity of the financial reports. The financial reports contained in the annual report have been prepared in accordance with U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) appropriate for not-for-profit organizations. In preparing the financial reports, management makes informed judgments where necessary to reflect the expected effects of events and transactions that have not been completed. The internal controls and procedures ensure that material information required to be disclosed is recorded, processed, summarized and communicated to the Executive Board and Board of Directors within the required time periods.

The KJA utilizes the accrual accounting method that provides a thorough financial reporting system to reflect the current financial position of the organization by reporting open account receivables, accrued payables and potential contingencies. The accrual method of accounting recognizes revenues when earned and expenses when incurred.

Presentation Basis

The financial statements represent the organization as a whole and report the net assets as follows:

- **Unrestricted net assets:** free from donor-imposed restrictions.
- **Temporarily restricted net assets:** subject to restrictions for support of particular operating activities, a specified future period, or utilized to acquire long-lived assets.
- **Permanently restricted net assets:** subject to restrictions of gift instruments generally require the principal be maintained intact in perpetuity or until the occurrence of a specified event.

The KJA maintains accounts in accordance with the principles of fund accounting to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the KJA.

Each year KJA is required to have independent auditors complete an audit of the financial statements and position for the organization and to file the Form 990 Federal Tax Return with the Internal Revenue Service.

Collections

Knoxville Jewish Archives

As part of its mission, the KJA is home to the Knoxville Jewish Archives, which are maintained to preserve the historical footprint and contributions of the East Tennessee Jewish community since 1796. Materials are gifted to the archives by local residents and other institutions; archived; preserved and maintained for research by academics, families, historical societies and genealogical researchers. The value of the collection is not reflected in the statement of financial position. The KJA does not purchase or sell collection items.

Arnold Schwarzbart Gallery

The Gallery is a permanent home for many pieces by the artisan, Arnold Schwarzbart, a beloved community member, whose memory shall always be a blessing. The fundraising campaign provided the funds needed to construct, install, and acquire the pieces of art that are valued at \$11,715. In addition, the gallery provides other local artists to periodically display works of art for the pleasure of the Jewish community.

Permanently Endowed Funds

The KJA endowment funds are held by the Knoxville Jewish Community Family of Funds, managed by the East Tennessee Foundation. The KJA receives annual distributions in the form of grants, generally limited to income from the funds. These funds are accounted for in accordance with FASB ASC 958. The majority of endowment funds have an annual spending rate of 4.5% of a twelve-quarter rolling average. Discretionary distributions of fund principal are permitted in some of the fund documents, though the intent is to be a permanent endowment. Fund balances represented as of September 30, 2020 are \$826,340.

Historically, the Annual Campaign fundraising has been the major supporter of the Arnstein Jewish Community Center (AJCC) facility and campus with external allocations for regional, national and international philanthropic causes.

2020 continued with the "Strengthening our Roots" campaign to rally community support to strengthen the KJA/AJCC, thus strengthening the Knoxville Jewish Community as a whole. Many volunteers headed by Chip Rayman, KJA President, have worked to fill the vacuum of no Campaign Chair.

The KJA Annual Campaign goal was set at \$300,000 for 2020; as of November 15, 2020, it has raised \$214,218 leaving a campaign shortfall of \$85.782 with only 46 days left in 2020 calendar.

Looking to the Future:

As 2021 quickly approaches, the KJA Board of Directors passed the 2021 Budget recommendation of the KJA Budget Committee for a \$290,000 campaign. <u>Let us look to the future</u> to exceed the 2021 budget and grow our KJA Annual Campaign to fund a return to external allocations for much needed local, regional, national, and international charities for those less fortunate!

2020 has lacked a Campaign Chair. Leadership is pleased to announce that Renee' Hyatt will chair the 2021 KJA Annual Campaign. We are looking forward to having a previous KJA President and active community member, as Campaign Chair.

Since the inception of the Knoxville Jewish Alliance (KJA) in 2001 through present day:

- Annual Campaign has declined 49.43% from the 2002 campaign of \$449,719.
- It accounts for only 17.1% of total KJA revenues compared to 44.7% in 2002.
