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Inaugural Jewish Learning Fellowship Inspiring Students

Each week, a select cohort of students meets on campus to discuss big questions about Jewish identity, community, and continuity.

Hillels around the country use the same core curriculum about navigating college through a Jewish lens to spark meaningful conversation between Jewish students on campus, deepening their connection to one another and to Jewish peoplehood.

For some, the Jewish Learning Fellowship seminar is the first time they have engaged in text study since their Bar or Bat Mitzvah; for others, the seminar is their one break during the week when they get to learn for the sake of learning without having assignments or tests hanging over their heads.

The sacred time of the Jewish Learning Fellowship extends beyond the class itself now too — students often opt to arrive early and enjoy dinner together or linger afterward and play board games with their new friends.



A recently piloted Ask the Rabbi Brunch and Learn featured former Hillel Director Rabbi Jeremy Simons. During the weekly bagel brunch, he shared his Jewish journey and discussed the role his home synagogue, Temple Israel, plays in the larger Memphis Jewish community. Students had a safe, open space in which to ask Rabbi Jeremy the burning Jewish questions on their minds. This gave students a sense of the offerings available to them in the larger Memphis Jewish community. Based on its success, we hope to scale Ask the Rabbi Brunch and Learn next school year, so each month we host a different rabbi from the Memphis Jewish community.

Shabbat Shul Hop Builds Community

This semester, Hillels of Memphis launched the Shabbat Shul Hop, a new community partnership initiative where local Memphis synagogues host Hillel students for Friday night Shabbat services and a home-hospitality hosted meal by a member of that congregation. We piloted this program in partnership with Baron Hirsch Congregation. They set it all in motion when they approached Hillel about bringing together our local Memphis college students with their visiting Memphis Jewish Federation-funded Yeshiva University Fellows. For some Hillel students, this was their first time experiencing Shabbat in an Orthodox setting, and they left feeling inspired to reconnect to their own Jewish roots.

David Fleischhacker, executive director of Baron Hirsch, noted that "our Yeshiva University Fellows have had such a positive impact throughout the community — from children in our day schools to adults in our senior facilities. The one group that seemed the most obvious was the one we had not yet touched — college students. So we were excited to plan this event together, and are thrilled that students from University of Memphis and Rhodes College enjoyed spending Shabbat together. Our Fellows look forward to getting together with Hillel again."

"I was thrilled when Baron Hirsch reached out about bringing our respective students together, and thought it would be an incredible opportunity for students from both campuses to get to know what life is like for students at Yeshiva University in New York" says Hillel Director Sophie Bloch. "This partnership was also an incredible opportunity for the students who observe Shabbat to host their friends and peers at one of their home synagogues. Instead of bringing Shabbat to Hillel, we brought Hillel to Shabbat. I am so grateful to Baron Hirsch for inspiring this sort of partnership as well as to the Somer family for hosting our Shabbat meal — the students are still raving about the brisket!"

We will be replicating this program with other synagogues based on the incredible success we had at the inaugural Shabbat Shul Hop with Baron Hirsch. We to hope to partner with each of the Memphis congregations in this capacity at least once a school year.



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
