CASE STATEMENT

At Akiva we pursue excellence, foster critical thinking, and inspire informed Jewish living. As the only Jewish day school in Middle Tennessee, Akiva School ensures Jewish continuity by educating the next generation of knowledgeable and committed Jews. We are a welcoming, multi-denominational school, open to all children with at least one Jewish parent. By offering a Jewish day school education in Nashville, we help make our dynamic city an attractive relocation destination for all Jews.

Our curriculum integrates General and Jewish Studies. As part of our Jewish Studies program, students develop a love of Judaism and Israel through a Hebrew immersion approach to learning. Our General Studies focuses on STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics) and prepares them for future success in “life after Akiva.” Our school educates the whole child - mind, body, and soul - and instills core Jewish values into the curriculum and daily activities. We integrate Jewish learning into the students’ everyday lives, so that our graduates are passionate about learning, Hebrew, Israel and their Jewish identity. Akiva graduates are leaders in the Jewish community and the greater Nashville community, with a deep awareness of how to treat others and take deep pride in who they are.

Akiva families represent a broad and balanced spectrum of Jewish beliefs and practices, coming from secular, Reform, Conservative, Modern Orthodox, Chabad, and unaffiliated homes. With a generous scholarship program, we attract Jewish students from a wide range of socio-economic backgrounds.

More Jewish Teens, More Meaningful Jewish Experiences.

Since the 1930s, BBYO has been shaping Jewish leaders by providing exceptional identity enrichment and leadership development experiences for thousands of Nashville's Jewish teens. Through programs that shape confidence and character, both Aleph Zadik Aleph (AZA) and B'nai B'rith Girls (BBG) provide fun, meaningful, and affordable Jewish experiences that inspire a lasting connection to the Jewish people and provide the foundation for a meaningful Jewish life.

Every Jewish teen can be a part of BBYO due to its pluralistic nature which enables them to create a vast network of friends. Friendships are not only built within Nashville, but also within the Delta Region and around the world via their participation in regional and international programs. At the end of their four years, BBYO will ensure that teens:

Can lead the community for years to come. Since BBYO programs are teen-led, our participants quickly learn how to inspire their peers.

"BBYO, during my many years of participation both as a participant and as a staff member at summer programs, was an avenue for leadership. By connecting in various avenues throughout life, BBYO alums become roommates in college, fraternity brothers and sorority sisters, groomsmen and bridesmaids at weddings, and even married couples.

"The first word that comes to mind when I think about BBYO is permanent. Starting my BBYO experience, I knew I could find my permanent home in Music City BBG. I immediately started to create incredible connections in the chapter and in Cotton States Region. After attending CLTC 1 this past summer, I learned and grew not only as a person but as a Jewish teen and most importantly I made friendships that I know are permanent."

Chabad is a spiritual life-line and home for all Jews regardless of their background or socio-economic status. Established in 1999 by Rabbi Yitzchok and Esther Tiechtel, and is based on Ahavat Yisroel (love for all Jews), Chabad of Nashville continues to be a trend setter for the Nashville Jewish community and the community at-large with our inclusive, multi-faceted programming and unique out-reach.

We accept Jews unconditionally for who they are and who they wish to be.

DONOR ADVISED FUNDS, SPECIAL INTEREST FUNDS AND DESIGNATED FUNDS	
FUND NAME	PURPOSE
Area of Interest Fund	Support specific areas of interest, such as Israel, education, the elderly, individuals with disabilities, and scholarships for school or recreational activities.
Designated Fund	Allows a donor to support a specific nonprofit organization in perpetuity.
Donor Advised Fund (DAF)	A DAF can be created with a minimum donation of \$5,000. Donors and/or their representatives recommend distributions to qualified charitable organizations for causes and programs they wish to support.
General Unrestricted Fund of the Jewish Foundation	Distributes donor's gift into the general Unrestricted Fund of the Jewish Federation and Foundation of Nashville and Middle Tennessee, to be used for purposes or needs identified by the Jewish Federation.
Legacy Fund	A legacy fund is a subset of a Designated Fund. Each year, the donor's fund distributes its income to the causes or organizations designated by the donor.
Lion of Judah Endowment Fund	Permanently endows a woman's annual campaign gift of \$5,000 or more to the Jewish Federation and Foundation of Nashville and Middle Tennessee.
Perpetual Annual Campaign Endowment Fund (PACE)	Permanently endows an annual campaign gift to the Jewish Federation and Foundation of Nashville and Middle Tennessee. The annual gift continues in perpetuity on your behalf.

- The minimum amount required to create a designated fund is \$25,000.
- Naming opportunities for both funds and programs are available at varying levels.
- Other initiatives and programs may be available to fund in addition to those on the list.

CASE STATEMENT

The Holocaust is the most horrific event to occur in human history. Unfortunately, the scourge of Antisemitism remains, and we must continue to make every effort to address it. The Nashville Survivor community and their descendants created a Holocaust Memorial and educational space to recognize and honor their loved ones, many of whom have no graves. With the help of generous donors, the Memorial includes an area for personal reflection and a location which provides an educational opportunity to learn about the Holocaust through the history of Nashville Survivors and their families.

Based on the wishes of the Survivors, the Gordon Jewish Community Center donated the land for the Memorial. The area includes a self-guided tour, Memorial walls inscribed with the names of deceased Holocaust Survivors and victims, an eternal flame, a symbolic sculpture inspired by a Holocaust Survivor and a reflection area with seating. The Memorial is handicap accessible.

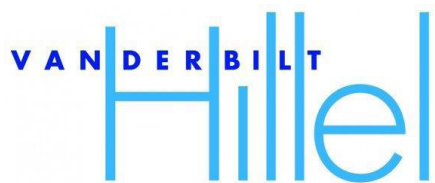
