

Anti-Semitism on the rise

There have been over 100 bomb threats made to Jewish institutions over the past five weeks (as close as the Indianapolis ICC), there have been at least three Iewish cemeteries desecrated with hundreds of headstones vandalized (as close as Fort Wayne). Swastikas have been discovered carved into buildings, sidewalks and playgrounds, rocks, and in some cases, bullets, have broken windows at synagogues, and there is a rise in anti-Semitic comments and propaganda on the internet. It seems that a wave of anti-Semitism along with many other kinds of hate and prejudice is upon us once again.

Currently Indiana is one of only 5 states (along with Arkansas, South Carolina, Wyoming and Georgia) that does not have a Hate Crimes law on the books. Efforts have been made for years to get Indiana legislators to adopt a law, but the most recent attempt, a bill drafted by a Republican

Federation confronts anti-Semitism in our schools

Over the past year we have seen a serious rise in anti-Semitic hate crimes in America. In 2016, American-Jews were the number one target of hate crimes against religious groups. Here in our community, we have dealt with several incidents of anti-Semitic remarks to Jewish students in our local schools.

It is important for members of our community to know that we as a Federation stand ready to support families and students in these situations. Indeed, we have done that over the past year in each of these instances.

Here is our working strategy for dealing with anti-Semitic incidents in schools. After meeting with the family of the student who is the target of an anti-Semitic comment, we take two steps.

First, we strongly recommend that the student and the parents report the incident to a school guidance counselor. It is important that the students who target their classmates with anti-Semitic comments understand there are consequences for their actions. They must be held accountable. In addition, guidance counselors can facilitate reconciliation. Moreover, the information will be relayed to the school leadership and serve to motivate action on a wider level.

Secondly, we immediately reach out to the school principal to offer ourselves as a resource to help schools confront anti-Semitism. At

that point, after the schools understand that we are an ally and important and trusted resource for addressing these problems, we begin a collaborative effort to find solutions.

Over the past year, we have offered speakers from our local Jewish community, nationally renowned speakers, training sessions provided by the Anti-Defamation League (ADL) and the documentary video, "The People Next Door" produced by Temple Beth-El's Simon Fund for Holocaust Remembrance.

In each instance, we have found the schools to be very receptive to our ideas. Whereas the ADL offers antibias training, the main focus of our local effort to combat anti-Semitism is through Holocaust education.

Holocaust education is crucial to preventing anti-Semitism and bigotry of all forms as it shows young people the consequences of the most virulent form of racism that was in Nazi Germany.

Whereas Nazi Germany dehumanized Jews and other minorities simply because they were different, the study of the Holocaust provides an opportunity to teach our children that our differences are what make us human. Indeed, our differences make us American.

Holocaust education can make it clear that those who attack others because of their race, religion or ethnicity are attacking a basic American value.

As a result of our efforts, last year, a local high school hosted Eva Kor, a nationally renowned Holocaust survivor to speak. This year, Dory Goldberg, a member of our community who is a survivor of the Holocaust has been invited to speak to a local junior high class. Also this year, Federation Program Director Monika Wayne has worked with teachers at a Penn-Harris Madison high school to organize a Holocaust commemoration ceremony.

In addition to survivors, our Federation Shlicha, Efrat Naor, now offers a new presentation titled "An Israeli Perspective on the Holocaust" that she will be presenting to a local church and at a local high school.

We encourage parents to have regular conversations about this issue with your children. The most important thing that members of our community can do in regard to this dangerous trend is to report any instance of anti-Semitism or bigotry to us at the Federation. "If you see something, say something".



Freedom by Stephanie Scharf

As Passover approaches this year, thoughts about liberation and deliverance have led me to reflect upon what it truly means to be free. The Jews enslaved in Egypt were freed from physical bondage and oppression, the most obvious and concrete example of emancipation. When thinking more abstractly about independence and the autonomy that comes with it, I often think of the many ways in which we are controlled.

Some people are bound by their addictions, their relationships with others, their illnesses both physical and mental. Restraint and dependence in this regard is not always of our own choosing. A person who is profoundly ill is going to have their freedom curtailed through no fault of their own. Conversely, a person whose liberty has been taken away because they have been convicted of a crime and are imprisoned has also lost their freedom, but the causation of their loss is distinctly different.

While enslavement might be too broad of a word to use when talking about the way forces in our lives define and direct us, I think it is fair to say that freedom is a very mallea-

ble term. When our children are young, we are tied to them by their many needs. After they are grown, we fall into the nostalgia of missing their dependence on us. People often tell those who are newly retired. "Now you can pursue your dreams, you are no longer burdened with the responsibilities of work and schedules!" While many retired people would echo these sentiments, there are also those who do not feel relief as much as uselessness. What should feel like the joy of freedom might feel like the desolation of no longer being needed. While we can never trivialize the horror of those who live under the tyranny of true slavery, we can also recognize that bondage can happen on many levels. We are often shackled by our own anger, fear, jealousy, frailty, and hopeless-

This Passover, as we consider the manifest freedoms we enjoy as a faith community and as a nation, I hope we can take a closer look at our individual lives, and gain some insight into how our happiness, sense of self and contentment may depend on more that what is tangible.





From the desk of Israeli Shlicha

Thoughts about Freedom, Slavery and More

April is here, and our calendar is getting really busy! We go from Passover to Yom HaShoah, and then we'll take a break for a week to go straight into Yom HaZikron and Yom HaAtzmaut. As a Jewish mother says, "I will rest in the graveyard."

I will tell you the truth, Passover was never my favorite holiday. The Matzah is so dry, my dad's jokes at the Seder repeat themselves each year. And I can't even begin to describe how awful it is to clean the "Hametz" from an industrial-sized army kitchen.

But maybe the idea of this holiday is not to have the happiest time of the year, but a time of deep thinking, introspection and remembrance.

The subjects that come up in the story of Passover are as relevant today as they were back then. Leadership, freedom, and refugees are just some of the ideas that are reflected in the story of the Israelites leaving Egypt and coming to the Promised Land.

One of the topics that intrigues me is the idea of slavery and freedom. What does it mean to be free? Could it be that we are slaves even today?

One of my favorite Israeli artists, named Barry Sakharof, wrote a great song about this subject called "Avadim," translated "Slaves." In the song he writes: "We are all slaves, even though we have this and that, we open our mouth and wait to receive the next pleasure."

When I hear that song, it always makes me think about the meaning of freedom.

When I finished my army service, I thought that I entered the land of freedom: no one could tell me what to do, no commander could tell me where to go and so on. It was everything I've wished for during those two years.

But a few weeks after I finished, I realized that freedom has many aspects, and not being obliged to someone else is only one of

In his song, Berry points out that we are all slaves to something-even if we don't necessarily understand it. It could be money, work, social expectations, cellphones, technology, social media and many more.

There is a saying in psychology: awareness is the first step. And I think that Passover comes every year to awaken us and remind us that even though we are very fortunate to live in a democracy and to be free people, we are all still slaves to different things. I think by understanding that, we get one step closer to achieving real freedom.

At the end of April, we commemorate Holocaust Remembrance Day- we remember the biggest tragedy of mankind against Jews. As the phrase, "For foreigners you've been in the land of Egypt", echoes in our minds.

I want to share a prayer for all people who are not blessed to live in a free country, and especially the refugees in the world: to find peace, freedom and home. Along with remembering this month the tragedies and victories of us as the Jewish people, we should continue the Jewish mitzvah for "Tikkun Olam"- healing a broken world.

that had strong bipartisan support, was killed in the State House of Representatives just this month. In every case, where states have adopted Hate Crime laws, the laws were drafted by both Republicans and Democrats and had strong bipartisan support. It seems to be special interest groups that have been able to prevent them in Indiana. Please call your representatives and encourage them to continue to fight on our behalf.

Here at the Federation we have trained our staff on bomb threat procedures. We have reviewed our security policies and will continue to make sure that our building, staff and guests are as safe as possible. But our efforts go beyond just the Federation. We will gladly help other Jewish agencies in Michiana. We can provide training sessions, and help draft emergency procedures (not just for bomb threats, but also emergencies, weather general safety, fire and lockdown procedures). We have our partners at the Secure Community Network through our national partner that works directly with Homeland Security and the FBI to offer services to Jewish communities. Don't hesitate to ask us how we can help you increase safety in your facilities and at your gatherings.

Additionally, if you hear of any anti-Semitic

incidents in town, no matter how minor, please let us know. We have worked with many area schools when students have felt like an incident or policy is anti-Semitic. We have found that the school leaders have been grateful, open and wonderful partners in helping us address these issues when they have arisen and we are grateful for their dedication and understanding of the importance of swift and serious action.

Our partners at the Anti-Defamation League and Jewish Council for Public Affairs want us to let them know about every incident, so that they can collect the data to help us act on a national scale. We have a strong network of support in place and we are here for you.

Michiana is a special place. We are a small but mighty Jewish community, and we are strongest when we unite for our common good and values. We have strong allies and support from the non-Jewish community as well. The best way to combat the rise in hate, is for us to come together to celebrate our shared traditions in joy and love.

Telling Our Story

The Historic Achievement and Legacy of Brown and Lebermuth

The Brown and Lebermuth story continues from the March issue of Our Community News.

After World War II there was an explosion in demand for mint oils and the business thrived. By that time the Brown family contracted with farmers to grow mint oils. We traveled to the farmers with scales portable weighed the oils "on the spot." There were no written contracts back then all transactions were verbal and based on trust. The Browns were always regarded with the highest level of integrity as no contract was ever reneged on. Since farmers did not have the money to buy the oil distillery equipment, the Browns bought it for them. The farmed distilled oil was transported to Bremen where the Browns refined it once again. It was a good business, and back then the Browns divided the profits evenly across the family even including family members who did not actually work in the business.

Alan's mother's parents came to the Michiana area from Ohio via Texas. His mother was born in Wichita Falls, Texas. Her father David Lebermuth worked a clothing business right next to a small jewelry store owned by Morris Zale, whose business eventually spread all across the US. David and Morris were very good friends till the day they died. Alan's parents met as students at Indiana University and got married in Texas.

As a child Alan often visited the family business in Bremen. "We had to keep the drums of peppermint and spearmint oils in a vault in the basement. Dad said it was required

because farmers would only accept gold for payment and the banks insisted the oils remained in a vault. I remember that as a boy I loved to run on the drums and they made a great thundering noise as they rolled over the basement floor."

Over the years M. Brown and Sons grew into one of the biggest mint oil dealers in the world. By 1969 they had over 40% of the market share. Today the company's name has changed from M. Brown and Sons to Lebermuth. This is in honor of Alan's grandfather David Lebermuth, "who as far we know is the last Lebermuth of our family in the world." The company has grown exponentially and added fragrances, flavors and other essential oils to their product offering. It has some of the most advanced processing equipment in the industry.

The name may have

changed but the company ethos has not. In a YouTube video, part of the Heartfelt Leadership series, Alan Brown explains the company's continued moral commitments www.youtube.com/ watch?v=ypNea3czbUE. He firmly adheres to the Jewish principle that we come into the world as servants and that it is our responsibility to leave the world a better place than we found it. As was true with his ancestors, the Lebermuth Company still has a strong commitment to helping others. Within the company, the leaders feel that not only is Lebermuth run by the family, but everyone who works there is family as well. Management is committed to leading by example and creating an atmosphere where everyone can thrive. As Alan puts it, "there needs to be soul in the company at the top."

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
