

Schoke JFS Launches 'Buy One, Give One' Initiative

(Courtesy of Schoke JFS) Schoke Jewish Family Service (JFS) is launching a yearlong food drive initiative called "Buy One, Give One" to combat food insecurity in Fairfield County. In partnership with local synagogues, the campaign encourages individuals to buy an extra food item, one to keep and one to donate. These donations will directly support local families in need. JFS is currently partnering with Temple Sinai,

Congregation Agudath Sholom, Young Israel of Stamford, Chabad of Stamford, Temple Beth El, Chabad of Greenwich, Congregation Shir Ami, Temple Israel of Westport, and The Community Synagogue.

Jen Bernstein, Director of Food Programs at Schoke JFS, emphasized the urgency of the initiative. "With rising food costs, cuts to benefits programs, and more families turning to us for help, the strain on our food pantry

has never been greater. This initiative is a way for the community to step in and ensure that no one has to go without."

Participating synagogues are each committed to collecting specific pantry staples. Temple Sinai will focus on tuna fish and canned fruit, Congregation Agudath Sholom will collect cereal, and other synagogues such as Young Israel will gather various non-perishable items.

Donations will be collected through Hebrew school programs and general synagogue participation, involving families and children.

Laura Tobin, a Schoke JFS Board Member, helped facilitate the outreach."The response from clergy and lay leaders has been extremely favorable, and I'm deeply grateful for their support in creating an


Sukkat Shalom: A Federation United in Purpose



From the youngest preschoolers to bar and bat mitzvahs and teenagers preparing for adulthood, a wide range of programs ensures that every child has a place to learn, grow, and feel connected to their Jewish identity.

Honoring 250 Years of Fairfield County Jewish History

(Courtesy of Jewish Historical Society) Think of Harry Houdini, Sholem Asch, "the First Jewish Feminist" Ernestine Rose, Gilda Radner, Benny Goodman, labor organizer Matilda Robbins, children's author Maurice Sendak, Israeli Naval Commander David Schulman, artist Helen Frankenthal, Senator Joe Lieberman, Arthur Szyk and so many others who called Fairfield County home for a while. In these 250 years since the Declaration of Independence was promulgated on July 4, 1776, Jews have thrived in Fairfield County.

The Jewish Historical Society of Fairfield County's (JHSFC's) project to honor the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence will be to "tell the story" of the Jews of Fairfield County.

The ratification of the Bill of Rights to the Constitution of the United States on December 15, 1791 guaranteed certain basic American freedoms for the Jews resident in and traveling through Fairfield County. The First Amendment proclaims Freedom of Religion to wit: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof ..." These basic American freedoms have enabled Jews to flourish and prosper in Fairfield County.

The major point of emphasis of the project will be to expand upon the Society's 2005 traveling exhibit entitled "A Slice of Jewish American Life in Fairfield County 1654-1986." JHSFC plans to research the Jewish history of Fairfield County from 1987 through

next year, the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence, and also to expand the Slice of Jewish American Life exhibit to include additional information. The Society will rely on other of its exhibits, including but not limited to: "It Happened Here: From Haven to Home To Community" (2023); "Remembering the Family Store"; "Notable Jewish People From Fairfield County" (2019); and the L'Dor V'Dor Intergenerational Project.

Discover the Kabbalah of Meaning

This fall, Rabbi Levi Mendelow,
director of Chabad of New Canaan,
will offer "The Kabbalah of Meaning," a
new six-session course by the acclaimed
Rohr Jewish Learning Institute (JLI).
The course aims to shed light on one
of life's most fundamental questions:
What gives our lives meaning?

The six-week course will be offered on Tuesday mornings at 10:00 am at the United Jewish Federation offices, 2009 Summer Street in Stamford and repeated on Tuesday evenings at 7:00 pm at Chabad of New Canaan, 137 Putnam Road in New Canaan. Both series begin on November 5. Students are welcome to attend at either location each week.

Drawing from the wisdom of Jewish mysticism, The Kabbalah of Meaning provides a refreshing perspective on how to uncover the profound significance hidden in every aspect of daily life. Participants will explore how to weave together the many threads of their busy routines into a unified and purposeful whole.

"We often assume that meaningful moments are rare, reserved for special occasions," said Rabbi Mendelow. "This course shows us how to discover the deep meaning already present in the ordinary experiences of life."

Each session combines the study of classic Jewish texts with practical applications for modern living. Topics include finding purpose in relationships, work, and personal growth, and how all of life's diverse activities contribute to a greater sense of wholeness.

Like all JLI programs, this course is designed to be accessible and thought-provoking for people at all levels of knowledge, regardless of background or affiliation. "Whether you are well-versed in Jewish learning or entirely new to it, you'll feel right at home," Rabbi Mendelow added.

The Kabbalah of Meaning is accredited for continuing education in a number of professional fields, including medical and mental health. Continuing education credits are available for doctors, psychologists, social workers, LMFTs, and LMHC/LPCs in the state of Connecticut.

Café Torah: A Fresh Approach to Jewish Learning

(Courtesy of Chabad of Stamford) Chabad of Stamford is ushering in the new year with the launch of an innovative program called Café Torah, a series of learning opportunities designed to help community members pause from their busy schedules and reconnect with Jewish

"The idea is to help us all carve out an hour of the week to reconnect with Torah, with ourselves, and with something deeper," said Chabad of Stamford Co-Director Rabbi Moshe Shemtov. "It's a personal invitation to pause, sip, and nourish your soul."

The concept takes its inspiration from a café "menu," where participants can choose a class that speaks to them and commit to a weekly dose of meaning. "We all make time for yoga, errands, Pilates, and more," added Chabad of Stamford Co-Director Leah Shemtov. "This one is for your soul."

The Café Torah menu offers programs for both men and women, with options spanning mornings, evenings, and weekends.

For women, Torah & Tea on Tuesday mornings (in person and on Zoom), explores the weekly Torah portion, the Jewish calendar, and life lessons. On Wednesday evenings, a weekly Shaar Habitachon (Gate of Trust) class focuses on cultivating trust and faith through classic teachings. On Thursday mornings on Zoom, the focus is on Tanya study, delving into the foundational text of Jewish philosophy with Leah Shemtov, blending mystical insight with practical guidance. Several times a year Rosh Chodesh gatherings occur.

For men, there is an 8:00 am Sunday morning Tefillin Club, a gathering with tefillin-wrapping, prayer, Torah insights, and bagels and lox with Rabbi Moshe. Tanya Study is also offered on Sunday mornings with engaging sessions led by Rabbi Moshe, and Tzemach Shemtov leads a weekly Torah class on Thursday evenings at a private home in Stamford.



Your United Jewish Federation's (UJF's) Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC) continues to expand its reach and impact on the Jewish community. I am excited to share an upcoming program that will be held on October 19 from 5:00 to 6:00 pm, as part of UJF's Big Give event.

I am pleased to report that two local State Legislators with strong ties to the Jewish community will provide a "State of the Capitol" report addressing general issues and issues of specific importance to

the Jewish community. State Senator Ryan Fazio and State Representative Matt Blumenthal will each have 15 minutes to discuss the last legislative session which ended in June and the new legislative session that will begin in February of 2026.

The remaining 30 minutes of the meeting will include Gary Jones, an opportunity to highlight JCRC Director the priorities of the JCRC and

plenty of time for community members to ask questions of the legislative leaders and reinforce the expectations of the Stamford,



New Canaan and Darien Jewish community.

As you may know from reading this column on a regular basis, what happens at the State Capitol has a substantial impact on the Jewish community in UJF's area, especially now as we endeavor to confront the rising tide of antisemitism and protect our community from the consequences of that rising

tide. As I write this message, we are still hopeful that our bill to establish a working group to study and recommend changes

to protect Jewish students (and others) from antisemitism in K-12 public schools will be considered in the one-day Special Legislative Session anticipated to be held in early October.

This will be a rare occasion to have candid and intimate conversations about issues that are important to our community with legislators who care about our community. The more we educate our leaders, the better they will be able to fight for us. Please plan to join us on October 19 at 5:00 to thank Senator Fazio and Representative Blumenthal for their support and to help ensure that we send the right messages effectively.

Cranberry-Maple-Cashew Pie

It's almost time for Sukkot, a most joyous holiday, one that comes after the introspective and solemn Days of Awe. It's an exciting and busy time in the Jewish world: a time when we build a sukkah in our backyard or a smaller, make-shift version in our apartments. Either way, it's fun to eat in a sukkah and maybe even sleep in one – it's like camping out.

My family never built a sukkah when I was a girl. The closest I ever came was the time my cousin Leslie and I asked her mom if we could set up the bridge table (mostly used for her weekly mah jongg game) and pretend it was a sukkah. Aunt Beck obliged and even threw a chenille bedspread on top to enclose us. She wouldn't let us eat under the table but said it was ok to sleep there if we wanted to. We didn't have sleeping bags and the floor was hard so we only lasted about 2 hours and then went to bed. But we still talk about it years and years later.

When my own children were kids, they wanted a sukkah too, but rather than open

up the card table (mostly used for playing Hearts) we bought an outdoor log cabin and that became our sukkah. No one tried sleeping in the cabin; it was too small, but for several years, we did have some holiday snacks and desserts inside.

Sukkot snacks and

desserts are some of the best! In fact, all the traditional foods are absolutely delicious. It's a harvest holiday, so it's time to cook with the fresh fruits and vegetables of the season, like pumpkins, winter squash, nuts, cranberries, apples, pears and so on.

Our family favorites for Sukkot are easy

Our family favorites for Sukkot are easy to make, portable (if you will be feasting in your sukkah) and delicious: Baked Apples. Hazelnut Cake. Mandelbread. Pear Crisp. Indian Pudding. And the very festive looking Cranberry-Maple-Cashew Pie.


CRANBERRY-MAPLE-CASHEW PIE

- 1 cup maple syrup
- 1/3 cup light corn syrup
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 3 large eggs
- 3 tablespoons melted butter or margarine
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1/8 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup halved cashew nuts
- 1 cup fresh cranberries
- 1 unbaked 9-inch pie crust

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. In a large bowl, combine the maple syrup, corn syrup, sugar, eggs and melted butter and blend the ingredients thoroughly using a whisk. Stir in the flour, salt, nuts and cranberries. Blend thoroughly. Pour the mixture into the pie crust. Bake for 45 minutes or until the top is golden brown and crusty.

Makes one 9-inch pie.

Seeing these sites firsthand was a sobering reminder of the immense challenges Israel continues to face.

For some participants, the trip marked their very first visit to Israel. Jennie Fishman and Ashley Mail described their first-time experience as transformative and expressed their hope to return.



The Expanding Circle Universe

(Courtesy of Temple Sinai) As summer wound down at Temple Sinai, the synagogue began preparing for the High Holy Days, the opening of Religious School, and registration for one of Temple Sinai's most beloved social programs: Circles.

You might be asking yourself, "What are Circles?" Great question.

Circles are small, congregant-led groups, usually comprised of about eight to twelve people (sometimes more, sometimes less) that unite members around a shared interest. They all encompass Jewish values, but they don't necessarily need to be about something explicitly Jewish. In fact, they can pretty much be about anything. If you have a hobby, there's probably a Circle for it.

For example, there are three different Cinema Circles. Three! There's a Grandparents Club Circle, a Grown-Up Game Night Circle, and a Jewish Artists of the 19th and 20th Centuries Circle. There's a Ladies Night Out Circle AND a Ladies Night In Circle. There's a Nature's Path Circle, if you like hiking and nature, and a Whiskey Tasting Circle.

As of this writing, there are 26 Circles to choose from. Larry Stoogenke, Director of Member Engagement, notes, "We've worked hard to create a diverse range of experiences, whether you're seeking something contemplative, intellectual, social, physical, nostalgic, religious, or musical." But the best part? Since it's congregant-led, anyone can start one. So if there's a glaring

hole in the Circle universe, congregants are encouraged to raise their hand and bring their ideas to life.

One of the guiding principles at Temple Sinai is "Belonging," and now, in the seventh year of Circles, it is clear that is exactly what has been created. And this year, in the spirit of "Belonging," the registration process was slightly adjusted.

In the past, members could choose to remain in their same Circle year after year. However, with accelerated growth, Circles are now open to the entire congregation. The goal is for everyone to have the chance to not only share in these rich experiences, but also help newcomers feel a sense of belonging to the community. It's a wonderful way to meet people with shared interests and try something fresh as a congregation.

Circles have grown wildly beyond their original scope. Some have evolved into adult education programs, while others continue to meet informally even if the Circle itself has been disbanded. Temple Sinai is deeply proud of the lasting relationships and bonds that Circles have instilled in its membership. Temple Sinai is a place of worship, yes, but Circles represent the perfect microcosm of the sense of community the synagogue hopes to engender.


