The White Rose Resistance and Its Lessons for Today

Please join the Jewish Historical Society of Fairfield County on Sunday, October 26, 2025 at Temple Beth El, 350 Roxbury Road, Stamford, CT at 11:30 am for The Norma and Milton Mann Annual Lecture: The White Rose Resistance and Its Lessons for Today, which is free and open to the public.



Speaker Dr. Jud Newborn

Dr. Jud Newborn, this year's speaker, is one of the foremost authorities

on the White Rose, a non-violent intellectual resistance group in Nazi Germany, as well as on Jewish anti-Nazi resistance, the Holocaust and antisemitism today. Using stirring theme music, 90 powerful images and suspenseful storytelling, Dr. Newborn recounts how siblings Sophie and Hans Scholl--former fanatical Hitler Youth leaders, along with a few other students and one professor, all at the University of Munich--became extraordinary heroes of the German anti-Nazi resistance. "We will not be silent," their wartime leaflets declared. "We are your bad conscience. The White Rose will not leave you in peace!" On February 18, 1943, after an array of their daring resistance actions,

and just as students poured into the University of Munich's vast atrium, the siblings threw over one hundred leaflets from above, showering those below with a cascade of anti-Nazi leaflets. It was the *only* public protest by Germans against Nazism ever staged. In postwar Germany, the White Rose continues to embody and symbolize the spirit of "Civil

Courage," the active intervention to counter injustice, including antisemitism. Indeed, the significance of the White Rose does not end with the past. Dr. Newborn will also explore their legacy and their urgent lessons for today's compelling current events at home and abroad.


Dr. Newborn, an international multimedia storyteller and lecturer, served as the Founding Historian and co-creator of New York's Museum of Jewish Heritage--A Living Memorial to the Holocaust. He was honored with the prestigious Anne Frank Center's "Spirit of Anne Frank Human Writes Award" in 2018. He is currently

Superheroes Among Us

Grammy-nominated singer/ songwriter John Ondrasik of Five for Fighting, in concert on Sunday, September 7 at 7:30 pm at Rippowam Middle School, 381 High Ridge Road in Stamford. The event, entitled "Superheroes Among Us," will celebrate and recognize an array of community leaders for their outstanding service to the



Ondrasik has penned major hits, including the chart-topping "100 Years," "The Riddle," "Chances," "World," and "Easy Tonight," which have earned tens of millions of streams and placed him as a Top 10 Hot Adult Contemporary artist for the 2000s. The reflective "100 Years" has joined "Superman (It's Not Easy)" as part of the American songbook and continues to stand the test of time, playing at weddings,

birthdays, graduations, memorials, and in many home videos. More than 350 films, television shows, and commercials, such

as the Oscar-winning The Blind Side, Hawaii Five-O, The Sopranos, and the CBS drama Code Black, have used Five for Fighting's music.

Following the events of October 7, 2023, Ondrasik became a staunch supporter and ally of Israel and the Jewish people. In April 2025, Ondrasik revised the lyrics to "Superman" as a tribute to Alon Ohel, a 24-year-old

hostage, still currently held by Hamas. Ondrasik performed alongside Alon's brother Ronen, his mother Idit, and a community of friends who gathered in Hostage Square, Tel Aviv.

"As someone who danced to '100 Years' at my wedding, welcoming John Ondrasik to Stamford this September is profoundly personal," says Wendy Siegel, event cochair. "John may not be Jewish, yet time and again he's used his voice to champion justice and human dignity—values at the heart of UJF's mission. His willingness to

It's a time to ask not only who we've been, but who we hope to become. And just as importantly, who we want to become together.




United Jewish Federation of Stamford, New Canaan, and Darien (UJF), the Stamford

New Canaan Hebrew School Begins a New Year

and brought Joseph to Aaron's Place, the Kosher Comfort Room (a project of United Jewish Federation) where he could get Kosher for Passover meals as well as snacks and drinks for himself and Reut. All the food is provided free of charge by 613 Restaurant, Schoke Jewish Family Service Freedberg Kosher Food Pantry, and community donations through UJF. Carol and Gail also contacted Chabad and the Kosher room volunteers to solicit help, and kept in touch with the family, visiting

and offering warm support.

After the holiday, local Jewish WhatsApp group members reached out and found a family willing to give Reut and her family their finished basement as a home in Stamford. What was expected to be a few days of accommodation stretched to over a month. Chabad welcomed their son at the Gan. Many families from across the Stamford community synagogues, invited the family to join in Shabbat meals.

Reut and Joseph welcomed baby girl, Avigayil, who arrived early and tiny, needing time in the Stamford Hospital NICU.

After quite a journey, the family of four was able to return to Israel in early July, after a farewell swim and ice cream date at the home of the Krims. They left knowing that they were blessed to land in the middle of the warm, caring, giving Stamford Community.



JCRC Update

On behalf of United Jewish Federation of Stamford, New Canaan and Darien (UJF), I attended the Jewish Federations of North America United for Security Fly-In to Washington to lobby Congress JCRC Director to address Jewish community security requirements.



In response to these attacks and the accelerating growth of Jew hatred in our country, leaders of 46 Jewish organizations worked together to produce a joint sixpoint plan to enhance Jewish security (the "Security Plan"). Following is a summary of the six points:

- a substantial increase in funding for the current Nonprofit Security Grant program.
- additional federal funding to provide direct financial assistance to local police departments to protect Jewish institutions.
- provide direct financial assistance to Jewish communities to help pay the massive costs of hiring security guards and extra duty police officers.
- new laws regulating hate speech and incitement to violence on social media.
- expanding FBI resources combat domestic terrorism.
- renewed emphasis enforcing and on prosecuting existing hate crimes laws.

More than 400 lay and professional leaders from across the country descended on Washington to demand a rigorous Federation response to the increasingly difficult challenge of protecting the Jewish community and its institutions.

It was clear that the level of

by our Representatives and Senators. I was honored to be one of the Fly-In participants representing UJF and other Connecticut Jewish Federations. We met with both of our Senators and three of our five Representatives, reviewing the six points of the security plan. They shared their commitment to finding solutions

necessary to fight antisemitism and to protect the Jewish community.

Locally, the JCRC has been working with the Connecticut General Assembly to pass legislation creating a "working group" to study and recommend remedies to address the rampant growth of antisemitism in K-12 schools.

All seven Connecticut Federations have worked hard to gain passage of the bill to establish the working group as the first step in our important effort to fight the increase in antisemitism in our K-12 schools. Although the bill was passed overwhelmingly in the House of Representatives as part of an omnibus bill, it was never considered by the senate when the legislature adjourned on the last day of the session.

There will be a one-day special session of the legislature in September, and UJF is working to ensure that the omnibus bill containing our working group bill will be addressed. Advocacy will be key, and when we have more details, we will ask for your help in reaching out to our State Representatives and Senators to ensure this bill is acted upon and passed.

With continuous threats to the safety and security of the Jewish Community, the summer has been filled with camp assessments and trainings and has now shifted to preparing for back to school and the High Holidays.

In the last two months or so, I have had the opportunity to provide the following security services to our Jewish institutions:

- Provided Arya training (a form of active threat security training) to 100 plus camp counselors.
- Attended Fairfield County Police Chiefs' meeting to confirm that our local law enforcement leaders are continually involved in protecting our community.
- Completed Threat Assessments at Temple Beth-El and at Temple Sinai.
- Scheduled Active Threat Trainings

- and Cyber security trainings at several Jewish institutions.
- Assisted Community Security Services (CSS) in providing training services at several locations.

Community Services Initiative (CSI), the non-profit Jewish security company hired by United Jewish Federation, received grant funding to help defray the costs of security guards hired to cover outdoor events occurring throughout the summer. I am pleased that Temple Sinai put this grant to good use with two outdoor congregational programs over the summer.

As part of my comprehensive service to the community, I am here to advise your organizations on recommended security coverage for all upcoming events.

Cooking With Honey

I never need an excuse to eat or cook something with honey. It's one of those ingredients that I love so much that I look for ways to use it. I try different kinds because each variety of honey has a unique flavor – even the supermarket brands.

So you can imagine that when Rosh Hashanah comes around, my menu will most certainly feature recipes with honey.

Of course, we always have traditional apples and honey as a snack when we get home from synagogue. But, because honey is such an iconic food for the new year, I use it throughout the meal, not just for dessert.

Among the family favorites is Carrots with Honey, Scallions and Hot Pepper. This recipe is from my latest kosher cookbook, *Kosher Cooking For Beginners*. It is a lightly sweet dish and the hot pepper gives it a perfect balance. However, if your family doesn't like spicy food, you can substitute a garlic clove or just leave it out. Either way, because carrots are also traditional for Rosh Hashanah, it's a fitting side dish.

This carrot dish is a natural with classic braised brisket, which so many people prepare for the high holidays. But it is also a big winner with roasted chicken or with

another glamorous chicken dish, like this one, which is also from my new book: Roasted Chicken Breasts with Citrus and Honey.

To end the meal? How about another honey-infused treat: Honey Poached Plums. ROASTED CHICKEN BREASTS WITH CITRUS AND HONEY (FROM KOSHER COOKING FOR BEGINNERS)

- 4 large half bone-in chicken breasts (or 4 whole legs or a cut-up chicken)
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
- 2 teaspoons finely grated orange zest
- 1 teaspoon finely grated lime zest
 1 teaspoon finely chapped fr
- 1 teaspoon finely chopped fresh ginger
- 2 medium scallions, finely chopped
- 1 large clove garlic, finely chopped
- 1 teaspoon thyme leaves
- 2 tablespoons honey
- 1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste
- 1/3 cup orange juice
- 2 tablespoons lime juice

Rinse and dry the chicken pieces. In a bowl, combine the vegetable oil, parsley, orange zest, lime zest, ginger, scallions, garlic, thyme, honey, and cayenne pepper and mix thoroughly. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Add the chicken to the bowl and coat the pieces with the mixture. Let marinate for at least one hour in the refrigerator. Preheat the oven to 425 degrees. Place the chicken in a baking pan, skin side down. Bake for 10 minutes. Reduce the heat to 350 degrees. Turn the chicken pieces. Continue to bake for about 30 minutes basting, occasionally with the pan juices or until cooked through (a

meat thermometer inserted into the thickest part will read 160 degrees.)

Makes 4-6 servings

CARROTS WITH HONEY, SCALLIONS AND HOT PEPPER (FROM KOSHER COOKING FOR BEGINNERS)

- 1 pound carrots
- 2 tablespoons honey
- 1-1/2 tablespoons coconut oil
- 2 scallions, finely chopped
- 1 teaspoon grated lime peel
- 1 teaspoon finely chopped chili pepper
- salt to taste


Preheat the oven to 450 degrees. Line a cookie sheet with parchment paper. Peel the carrots and cut them into 1/2-inch slices. Place them on the parchment paper. Heat the honey and coconut oil together over low heat until the coconut oil has melted. Pour over the carrots. Sprinkle with the scallions, lime peel, and chili pepper. Sprinkle with salt. Toss the carrots to coat them completely. Roast for about 15 minutes, turning the carrots once or twice, or until the carrots are hot, tender and crispy.

Makes 4-6 servings

HONEY-POACHED PLUMS

- 1/4 cup honey
- 2 cups water
- 12 slightly crushed cardamom pods (or use 2" cinnamon stick)
- 1-1/2 teaspoons finely grated fresh orange zest
- 6 large plums
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1-1/2 to 2 cups plain or vanilla yogurt, or use sorbet
- 1/2 cup chopped toasted almonds

Place the honey, water, cardamom pods and orange zest in a saucepan, bring to a boil and simmer for 5 minutes. Remove the pan from the heat. Wash the plums, cut them in half and remove the pit if possible (if not it will be easy to remove after poaching). Place the plum halves in the poaching liquid. Mix in the vanilla extract. Let rest until the liquid cools, at least 2 hours. Remove the plums and set them aside. Bring the poaching liquid to a boil over high heat and cook for 4-5 minutes or until thickened to the consistency of maple syrup. Let cool. Place 2 plum halves per person on dessert plates. Mix a small amount of the boiled-down liquid into the yogurt and spoon some of the yogurt next to the plum halves. Drizzle the plums with the remaining poaching liquid. Scatter the nuts on top of the plums and yogurt. Makes







Bringing Summer Joy through One Happy Camper

Each year, United Jewish Federation of Stamford, New Canaan and Darien (UJF) is proud to help local families send their children to Jewish overnight camp for the first time, an experience that often creates lasting friendships, memories, and a stronger connection to Jewish identity. This is made possible through a partnership with the One Happy Camper program.

Powered by the Foundation for Jewish Camp and supported by local federations, One Happy Camper provides need-based grants of up to \$1,000 to families whose children are attending an accredited, nonprofit Jewish overnight camp for the first time.

Over the past four years, thanks to generous support from UJF and the One Happy Camper initiative, nearly 40 children from the community have had the opportunity to attend overnight camps across North America.

This program is designed specifically for children who are new to overnight camp and are not enrolled in Jewish day schools. At Gan Yeladim, when children lead the way, learning comes alive.



Celebrating Amidah Leadership Graduates

(Jack Welch, long-time GE CEO and legendary corporate leader). For more than fifteen years, Temple Sinai has been helping its members acquire leadership skills and learn to exemplify its motto, "Growth Happens Here," through its Amidah Leadership Initiative (ALI). Every other year, a new group of prospective congregational leaders is recruited to join ALI for an intensive leadership development and training program, and the latest cohort of future Temple Sinai leaders has just "graduated." This was the eighth class and brings the total number of participants over the years to 85.

The most recent ALI members are Nicole Bliman, Melissa Friedman, Eric Goldman, Elisabeth Giles, Rachel Hager, Mike Heller, Sarah King, Allison Lear, Ellen Lewis, and Tamra Lichtman. Each of them brought leadership experience from other venues, together with a deep commitment to growing and sustaining Temple Sinai. Their mix of backgrounds and expertise meant that they learned from each other as much as from ALI.

The program consisted of Sunday morning seminars throughout the academic year led by current congregational leaders and clergy as well as two leadership training experts, Jonathan Fass and Michael Markovits. The sessions addressed leadership skills and techniques, as well as the distinctive aspects of Jewish leadership and the particular governance structure and issues at Temple Sinai. Congregational engagement was a particular focus. Each session included ample opportunities for Q&A and discussion among the participants. The group also attended a temple board meeting in the spring to see it all "in action."

ALI was started by then-president Meryl Japha, who remembered her own "deer-in-the-headlights" moment when she joined the temple board and wanted future leaders to be better prepared for the experience. Since then, it has become an invaluable pipeline of lay leaders for the congregation.

According to current president Steve Zales, "ALI has become our primary tool for developing new lay leaders at Sinai. Many of our current officers, trustees and committee chairs are ALI graduates. And they all get off to a running start in their new temple

Leadership Initiative has been very successful in this effort," said Rabbi Jay TelRav. In fact, four members of this year's group are current members of the temple Board of Trustees, including two who were newly elected this summer.

Temple Sinai congratulates the new class on completing the program and looks forward to their continuing engagement in congregational life.

community together. This in-depth process generated the idea for One Shabbat: One CommUNITY. The weekend will have two components: first, celebrating Shabbat, a day observed across the spectrum of Jewish backgrounds; and second, a Havdalah pre-Chanukah celebration and community-wide party.

For the Shabbat portion of the weekend, each participating community organization has been invited to submit a brief grant application to United Jewish Federation for funding their own inclusive Shabbat celebration. The celebration of Shabbat can occur during the 25 hours of Shabbat, such as through enhanced Shabbat services, or before Shabbat even starts, such as by funding an art project with a Shabbat theme. In the October and November editions of the *New Jewish Voice*, more will be shared about each organization's celebration, which will be open to all.


The second component of the weekend focuses on UNITY and coming together through community collaboration. Plans are underway for the community to join together for a Saturday night celebration of Havdalah and Chanukah, which starts the following evening. Committees are

The service served as a reminder that it is never too late to take ownership of one's Jewish identities and to say "yes" to something sacred. The journey is lifelong.



Bi-Cultural Hebrew Academy Celebrates Its 70th Anniversary

For 70 years, Bi-Cultural Hebrew Academy
in Stamford, CT (BCHA) has served as a
pillar of Jewish education in Fairfield County,
cultivating generations of students grounded
in Torah values, academic excellence,
leadership and a commitment to making a
more ethical and spiritual world in which
kindness and respect for each other is reflected
in the conduct of all community members.

Since its founding in 1956, the school has remained steadfast in its mission: to unlock the potential of every child, guided by educators deeply devoted to both intellectual growth and moral development. At the core of the BCHA philosophy is the belief that it is their responsibility to nurture strong Jewish leaders and compassionate global citizens with an unwavering dedication to *Tikkun Olam*.

For seven decades, these values have guided students who have gone on to lead,

serve, and innovate in meaningful ways. But what is it about Bi-Cultural that inspires this kind of impact?

Some point to the presence of *Legacy Leaders*—faculty members who have taught at the school for more than 20 years—infusing classrooms with continuity, wisdom, and heart. Others highlight the school's pioneering approach to education, from its nurturing Early Childhood program to its dynamic Upper School offerings in engineering, innovation, and Israel education. All are connected by a deep sense of community and shared purpose.

"Every teacher, student, parent, and supporter has contributed to what BCHA is today," said Rabbi Tzvi Bernstein, Head of School. "BCHA is a living legacy built on purpose, passion, and people."

This year, as BCHA marks its 70th anniversary, it is embracing a new school-

wide initiative grounded in an ancient and powerful value: *Gratitude*.

Launched this fall, BCHA's new Gratitude campaign spans pre-K through 12th grade and is designed to encourage the daily practice of *Hakarat HaTov*—recognizing the good. The initiative aims to shift the community's focus away from what's missing to what's meaningful, helping students and families reflect more deeply on the blessings in their lives

Research supports this approach. Studies show that cultivating gratitude can reduce anxiety, lower stress levels, improve sleep, and contribute to better overall health. For BCHA, however, the goal is both personal and communal: to build a culture where

recognizing and appreciating the good we receive from God and Man becomes a way of life.

This is not the school's first initiative focused on character development. A "Kindness Counts" program, launched several years ago, led to a notable increase in intentional acts of kindness across campus. The Gratitude Program, leaders hope, will yield similarly meaningful results, both within and beyond the walls of the school.

"As we celebrate 70 years of Bi-Cultural, we are filled with deep appreciation for those who built, sustained, and elevated this community," said Bernstein. "Now, we're renewing our commitment, not just to teach gratitude, but to live it"

The Versatile Hospital Worker that NEVER Calls in Sick

Unlimited Robotics' Gary robot is already on the job in Israel and Philadelphia, supporting overburdenéd healthcare staff with a myriad of tasks.

Gary works in a hospital. He does a lot of fetching and carrying. He cleans and sanitizes. He also chats to patients, acts as a translator and records and transcribes doctors' consultations. And he's learning to clean toilets.

He works every shift available, he never calls in sick, and he doesn't stop for a coffee, a cigarette or a bathroom break. But he does need time to recharge his batteries – literally.

Gary is a robot, designed and built by Israel-based startup Unlimited Robotics.

Since the start of this year a dozen Garys have been working at two of Israel's largest hospitals — Rabin Medical Center in Petah Tikva and Shamir Medical Center in Beer

in Philadelphia in July. The US is a huge target market for the company.

Gary is one answer to a global recruitment crisis in healthcare facilities, says Altagar. There simply aren't enough people willing to work in a hospital when they can get a job in Starbucks, Dunkin Donuts or McDonald's for the same money.

By 2030, the problem will be so acute that there will be a shortfall of 18 million health workers globally, according to the World Health Organization (WHO).

Gary costs around \$30,000 to buy (plus a monthly fee), which is less than a year's salary for a typical US hospital worker (\$35,000 to \$42,000), says Altagar. Except that Gary works a 140-hour week with no vacations.

Unlimited Robotics, founded in 2020, has narrowed its original focus from "general purpose" robots that could help around the home or workplace - factories, hotels or airports - to those specifically suited to hospitals.

"Focus is part of our maturity as a startup And 10 Garys began working at a hospital company," Altagar tells ISRAEL21c. "You

learn that to conquer the world, you have to start with baby steps that are very carefully measured."

In other words, there are many opportunities for Gary, but Unlimited Robotics must concentrate on one at a time.

So why healthcare? "To be honest I didn't think of it as a prime sector, but it chose us," Altagar says. "The demand that we're getting from organizations both in Israel and the US is huge."

Gary is an autonomous robot, which means he takes "initiative" rather than relying on minute-by-minute instructions.

He also has two arms, whereas most robots have just one because coordination of two simultaneously is exceptionally complicated.

And he's adaptable. Most robots are designed for a single task, but Gary can quickly pick up new skills thanks to an open-source platform that allows software developers with no prior experience of robotics to build applications.

"Our operating system allows us to add more and more capabilities with a relatively





short development time," says Altagar.

I was wondering how patients experience Gary, but although patients do benefit from the robot's presence, it is primarily there for the employees.

"The main problem is a severe shortage of staff, not just nurses and doctors, but the teams surrounding them that help them to achieve and perform better," says Altagar.

"At the same time there's a rise in demand for healthcare services, people are living longer, they're hospitalized more and the pressure on healthcare systems is growing. Gary is designed to help the medical teams."

Gary provides a range of services in healthcare facilities, for example meeting the constant demand for bed linens, water, medical devices and other items so that medical personnel can spend more time treating patients.

Gary also engages selected geriatric patients in conversation, to maintain or improve their cognitive capabilities. He recognizes them and (using AI) personalizes every conversation. Eight out of 10 patients say they are happy to chat to a robot, says Altagar.

Gary also functions as an interpreter and notetaker. In Israel, many patients don't speak Hebrew so Gary provides real-time translations between them and the medical professionals.

He also records and transcribes conversations with patients and adds them to their medical files so the doctor doesn't have to write up notes of every interaction.

"It sounds like a small task, say three to five minutes for each patient, but it adds up," says Altagar.

And Gary cleans. He can mop the floor and sanitize surfaces, and by early next year he'll be able to clean toilets and urinals.

He also keeps an eye out for lost property, broken windows, and anything out of the ordinary that requires human intervention.

"The bottom line is that we're trying to increase the amount of time that the medical teams invest in patients rather than in logistics, administration and simple tasks that they shouldn't have to do," says Altagar.

Staff can see where the Garys are in their hospital on a smartphone app. In theory they can summon one – like a Gett or an Uber – but in practice requests for a Gary generally go through an administrator.

There's inevitably some trial and error. Gary sometimes takes the wrong elevator, or gets out at the wrong floor.

"The technology is young and there's no textbook on how to build a robot for hospitals," says Altagar.

"But the one thing that I noticed is that hospitals are very patient and willing to accept those mistakes."

Having said that, he accepts there will be resistance from some hospitals to the idea of robotic helpers.

"Gary is not as smart as a human," says Altagar. "But Gary's not replacing humans, he's assisting them."

Unlimited Robotics, based in Petah Tikva in central Israel, has attracted \$10 million in funding from big names in the startup world – including Avishai Abrahami, CEO of Wix; and Micha Kaufman, CEO of Fiverr. The company has 30 employees, and offices in Boston (USA) and Bogota (Colombia).
