When creating a large installation with glass, Adam uses those attributes as tools to discover ways that glass object can be more: using handmade prisms, or reheating one-way mirror to create reflections and new light patterns; using pattern and repetition to showcase the importance of each unit.

In addition to sculpture and glass, Adam is interested in garden and landscape design. Away from the studio, he spends a lot of time in nature with his wife, Andrea.



Daniel Pearlman is the Jewish Community Relations Council Director at the Jewish Federation of Greater Toledo. Originally from Cleveland, he is a graduate of the University of Michigan with a B.A. in Political Science and Judaic Studies and a minor in the History of Art. At Michigan, Daniel was a student leader at Michigan Hillel and completed a JCRC internship at the Jewish Federation of Cleveland. Upon graduating, he became the New England and New Jersey Campus Coordinator at an Israel advocacy organization called The David Project in Boston, MA, before moving to Israel to pursue his master's degree in Nonprofit Management and Leadership from the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. While studying in Israel, Daniel completed an internship with Hand in Hand: The Center for Jewish-Arab Education in Israel. He also co-founded and managed the Lilmod language exchange program which brought together English

and Hebrew speakers across Jerusalem to build relationships and foreign language skills. The program's success led to its acquisition by Nefesh B'Nefesh, part of the Jewish Agency for Israel, and fueling its growth nationwide.
