

Green family generously gives back to community that has given so much to them

Jeff Green, originally from East Lansing, Michigan, was living in Ann Arbor. Tamara White, with roots in Pittsburgh, was living in Maumee. The ancient concept of fate, coupled with the newer construct of JDate, brought them together. After two years of dating, the two got married and decided to make Toledo their home, while Tamara began her career in physical therapy and Jeff finished graduate school. Though they had each other, they had no other family or friends in their new hometown.

One month after moving here, the Greens were invited to a Jewish Federation of Greater Toledo wine tasting event, which started their journey into becoming involved with Federation's Next Jewish Generation division, including a transformative summit in Washington, D.C., where

they lobbied for Jewish causes. These experiences further grew into committee involvements and Tamara's current Federation Board position. "Thanks to that one event 16 years ago, we met our network of closest friends here in Toledo today," said Jeff.

Soon after that, the Greens went to another Federation event for all ages where Jeff met then-Federation CEO Joel Beren, who talked with Jeff about his background and introduced him to other community members, which led him to a new career. "Honestly, I owe the genesis of my career development to the Jewish Federation," said Jeff, now an executive with Allshred Services, a regional information destruction

Today, the Greens have three children: Gabriel, 11, Avi, 9, and Maya, 6. They joined a synagogue (Shomer Emunim) soon after Gabriel was born. All of their children attended the Federation's Gan Yeladim preschool. "The kids call their preschool friends their family," said Tamara. "And this Jewish community has become our family."

The Greens, in addition to being deeply committed to Judaism, which they point to as the foundation of their relationship, are avid believers in philanthropy. They talk with their children at home about giving back, and are always looking to share different ways to be charitable. "Even for the kids' birthday parties, instead of their getting gifts, we collect gifts to donate," said Tamara. "Our kids will then take their gifts to organizations who help

children who are less fortunate."

So it's not surprising that when Arleen R. Levine, J. D., Director of the Toledo Jewish Community Foundation, began talking with the Greens about making a planned gift, their interest was piqued. "It really fit what we've been wanting to accomplish," said Jeff. "We are always looking for additional ways to give to the Jewish community, and the Toledo community at large, and we thought it was a way we could formalize our philanthropy while leaving a lasting legacy."

The Greens chose to establish a Donor Advised Fund, which enables them to regularly recommend grants to their favorite qualifying charitable organizations, including local Jewish causes; BeInstrumental, a nonprofit music organization for children that they began 10 years ago; and charities that support research for medical conditions affecting family members. "Prior to establishing the fund, we were writing checks for \$50 here, \$100 there," said Jeff. "The Donor Advised Fund lets us plan perhaps larger gifts for the future – and as a family. We also love that now we can watch our donor dollars grow, while helping the Jewish community."

"Our community is fortunate that Jeff and Tamara chose to make Toledo their home," said Arleen. "They are passionate about a broad array of meaningful programs and services in the Jewish community, the arts and the medical arena. Natural leaders, they are inquisitive and thoughtful in evaluating needs and offering perspectives and potential solutions. I am confident that their Donor Advised Fund will provide

many meaningful opportunities for their family's charitable giving, and I am honored that they have chosen the Foundation to serve as their partner."

Donors can establish their fund through a gift of cash, check or any kind of property, including appreciated securities, closely held stock, insurance and real estate; the fund's assets are managed by the Foundation.* Additionally, donors generally receive an income tax deduction for the cash or the full fair market value of the assets contributed to the Donor Advised Fund; if the property contributed to the fund is appreciated securities, real estate or some other capital asset, donors may be able to avoid paying a capital gains tax on the appreciation.

The Foundation Board recently approved lowering the minimum gift to establish a Donor Advised Fund to \$2,000, a significant reduction from the previous minimum of \$5,000, in order to create new opportunities for more Toledo community members to participate in legacy giving.

"Arleen and the Foundation made it easy to get [our Donor Advised Fund] started," said Jeff, noting the newly lowered threshold for opening a Donor Advised Fund. "I would invite any peers interested in leaving a legacy to speak with us about getting started because, collectively, we really can make an impact on Jewish Toledo."

Two local American Red Cross volunteers deliver Healing, Hope and the True Meaning of Tikkun Olam

Approximately one year ago, on April 7, Debbie Levison's beloved husband, Bruce, passed away from COVID-19. "He died alone and was buried alone," said Debbie. After eventually getting to a place where she wanted to find something meaningful to do alongside others, Debbie, a recently retired pharmacist, connected with the American Red Cross. "Being alone in my house has all these memories. I wasn't looking to run away, though, rather looking for a new direction."

Debbie began volunteering in was off to New Orleans for 10 days,

blood services to help with blood to help victims of Hurricane Laura, drives. From there, she began taking online training classes in disaster services. "I was very impressed by the amount of training," said Debbie. "Even though it was online, I felt that when I got deployed, I would really know what I was doing."

Debbie first was deployed for 10 days to Oregon to assist people displaced by fires, relocating them to temporary housing at 18 different sites and ensuring they received meals and snacks each day. Next, Debbie

which was even more challenging. Because in many cases people's homes were decimated, her role in this deployment was recovery planning. Debbie had to help people think through everything associated with starting over somewhere new.

deployment when she worked from home in Toledo to place California residents affected by fires in temporary housing, Debbie went back to New Orleans for 40 days, helping to relocate residents who were

the hardest to place, including the elderly and people with mental health issues. Now, amazingly enough, Debbie is starting additional Red Cross training, to eventually manage casework for Toledo residents.

"In some ways, this volunteer work has really saved me," said Then, after one remote Debbie, who encourages others to explore becoming volunteers. "The Red Cross really, really needs people willing to help. From personal experience I can say it's a blessing to help people."

Upon moving to Toledo in 1973, Devorah Shulamit used her previous experience starting a community blood drive in Tappan, NY, to support Temple B'nai Israel's annual blood drive, eventually becoming the blood drive's co-chair, then chair.

In 1987, Devorah was in Israel celebrating the completion of her master's degree. As the sun was setting on the Western Wall, she heard men chanting in Hebrew, church bells ringing, and the mosque's call to prayer. "I was so moved, I said a prayer, to find a way to help unite people in peace."

Devorah essentially answered her own prayer nine months later when, after receiving an article from her rabbi about an intrafaith blood drive, she began the nation's first interfaith blood drive to benefit the American Red Cross. The first two Interfaith Blood Drives were held at B'nai Israel, with 40 different Toledo-area houses of worship. The next two drives were held at the Hindu Temple of Toledo. Then Grace Lutheran Church offered to host the drive, and it is held there to this day.

The drive's mission is to unite people of all faiths, races and ethnicities by saving lives through blood donations. It fosters positive communication, respect and understanding by working together in peace and by breaking down prejudices and biases. "It's a 'we' organization, not a 'me' organization," said Devorah. "We are an interfaith family of volunteers. Everyone contributes, and everything is done with commitment and dedication to our community. I am both honored and grateful to work alongside such compassionate and dedicated people."

Even the pandemic couldn't stop the Interfaith Blood Drive. Though last year's drive was one day instead of two and the baked goods, socializing and closing celebration were on hold, board members and volunteers followed strict CDC and Red Cross guidelines and held their blood drive because "it was needed more than ever," said Devorah, who noted that Interfaith is the oldest ongoing interfaith blood drive in the U.S., and the first interfaith organization in Northwest Ohio.

This year's Interfaith Blood Drive will be held on June 26 and 27, and Devorah is hoping for 75 donors, in addition to volunteers. "Come help us save lives. Join something so unique, so beautiful. People leave Interfaith feeling uplifted and knowing that they have done something wonderful in an atmosphere of acceptance, love and hope. Tikkun olam, repairing the world, I try to live my life guided by this. Interfaith is the perfect example of tikkun olam, of a way to make the military members in the Toledo area. world a better place."

"I am inspired by the efforts of people like Devorah and Debbie to engage in selfless acts of kindness that make this world a better place," said Stephen Rothschild, Executive Director, Jewish Federation and Foundation of Greater Toledo. "Devorah, through her long association with the blood drive, has saved the lives of thousands of people who will never even know of her efforts."

"And Debbie is simply a hero," continued Rothschild. "When life delivers challenges, it is easy to withdraw. It is a Jewish value to not stand idly by, lo ta'amod al dam rey'echa--when people are in need of help, it is a value to help. Debbie found that by helping others, she was also able to help herself. It's a wonderful lesson for us all."

The American Red Cross Northern Ohio Region is hoping there are community members willing to follow Debbie and Devorah's amazing lead. The Red Cross, whose mission is to prevent and alleviate human suffering in the face of emergencies by mobilizing the power of volunteers and the generosity of donors, has a great need for volunteers to support blood drives, local disasters and

Mayors United Against Antisemitism

The American Jewish Committee (AJC) and The U.S. Conference of Mayors have partnered on a new initiative called Mayors United Against Antisemitism. This comes after the FBI's most recent Hate Crimes Statistics revealed that Jews, who make up less than 2% of the American population, were the victims of 60.2% of anti-religious hate crimes. The Mayors United Against Antisemitism initiative seeks to respond to these alarming trends by calling on mayors to reject antisemitism in all its manifestations.

The Jewish Federation of Greater Toledo's Jewish Community Relations Council (JCRC) is supporting this initiative and has assisted AJC in reaching out to Toledo-area mayors. Local mayors who have signed the Mayors United Against Antisemitism statement include Richard Carr of Maumee, Thomas Mackin of Perrysburg, Craig Stough of Sylvania, and Wade Kapszukiewicz of Toledo. Across Ohio, over 25 additional mayors, including the mayors of our state's six largest cities, have signed on.

Mayor Stough of Sylvania said, "Anti-Semitism, racial prejudice, or any form of division or intolerance has no place in our community. We must set a better example for our children and grandchildren so they can make our world a happier and healthier place to thrive."

"To date, more than 475 mayors, like Mayor Stough, have spoken out strongly against antisemitism, bigotry, and hate," said Lee C. Shapiro, AJC Cleveland regional director. "Speaking in unison, the mayors state unequivocally that antisemitism is incompatible with fundamental democratic values. AJC Cleveland is proud to partner with the Jewish Federation of Greater Toledo to raise awareness, educate, and seek to combat rising antisemitism."

Masa celebrates twelve Jewish women making a difference to mark International Women's Day

NEW YORK - Masa Israel Journey released its inaugural list of Masa's Inspiring Twelve: Jewish Women Working to Make SVP for global operations of the with International Women's Day and honors 12 women driving change in the global Jewish community. 

Based on documents discovered concealed within a simple chair for seventy years, this gripping investigation into the life of a single S.S. officer during World War Two encapsulates the tragic experience of a generation of Europeans

One night at a dinner party in Florence, historian Daniel Lee was told about a remarkable discovery. An upholsterer in Amsterdam had found a bundle of swastika-covered documents inside the cushion of an armchair he was repairing. They belonged to Dr. Robert Griesinger, a lawyer from Stuttgart, who joined the S.S. and worked at the Reich's Ministry of Economics and Labor in Nazioccupied Prague during the war.

In The S.S. Officer's Armchair, Lee weaves detection with biography to tell an astonishing narrative of ambition and intimacy in the Third Reich. When Lee stumbles on an unforeseen connection between Griesinger and the murder of his own relatives in the Holocaust, he must grapple with potent questions about blame, manipulation, and responsibility.

The S.S. Officer's Armchair is an enthralling detective story and a reconsideration of daily life in the Third Reich. It provides a window into the lives of Hitler's millions of nameless followers and into the mechanisms through which ordinary people enacted history's most extraordinary atrocity.

Daniel Lee is a senior lecturer in modern history at Queen Mary, University of London. A specialist in the history of Jews in France and North Africa during the Second World War, he completed his doctorate at the University of Oxford, and is also the author of Pétain's Jewish Children. As a BBC Radio 3 New Generation Thinker, Lee is a regular broadcaster on radio. He lives in north London.





The ghetto girls tricked the Gestapo into carrying their luggage filled with contraband, hid revolvers in teddy bears, flung Molotov cocktails, and bombed German train lines. They flirted with Nazis; bought them off with wine, whiskey, and pastry; and then shot and killed them.

A gripping, poignant tale of extraordinary female agency, The Light of Days reminds us of the importance of recognizing the control we have over our own selves even during the darkest times.

Judy Batalion is the author of White Walls: A Memoir About Motherhood, Daughterhood and the Mess in Between. Her essays have appeared in the New York Times, the Washington Post, the Forward, Vogue, and many other publications. Judy has a BA in the History of Science from Harvard, and a PhD in the History of Art from the Courtauld Institute, University of London, and has worked as a museum curator and university lecturer. Born in Montreal, where she grew up speaking English, French, Hebrew, and Yiddish, she now lives in New York with her husband and three children.

ANTITRUST is important, urgently needed book from the much-admired senior senator from Minnesota, and former candidate for president of the United States--a fascinating exploration of antitrust in America and the way forward to protect all Americans from the dangers of curtailed competition, and from vast information gathering, through monopolies.

From Standard Oil, and the Sherman Anti-Trust Act, to the Progressive Era's trust-busters, Amy Klobuchar, in this large, compelling history, writes of the fight against monopolies in America.

She writes of the breakup of Ma Bell, the pricing monopoly of Big Pharma, and the future of the giant tech companies (Facebook, Amazon, Google).

She begins with the Gilded Age (1870s-1900), when builders of fortunes and rapacious robber barons such as J. P. Morgan, John Rockefeller, and Cornelius Vanderbilt were reaping vast fortunes as industrialization swept across the American landscape, with the rich getting vastly richer and the poor, poorer. She discusses President Theodore Roosevelt, who, during the Progressive Era (1890s-1920), "busted" the trusts (breaking up monopolies); the Clayton Act of 1914; the Federal Trade Commission Act of 1914; and the Celler-Kefauver Act of 1950 (it strengthened the Clayton Act). She explores today's Big Pharma and its price-gouging; and tech, television, content, and agriculture communities and how a marketplace with few players, or one in which one company dominates distribution, can hurt consumer prices and stifle innovation.

As the ranking member of the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Antitrust, Competition Policy, and Consumer Rights, Klobuchar is at work on, among others, issues raised by giant tech companies, such as Facebook, Google (it reportedly controls 90 percent of the search engine market), and Amazon, and puts forth her plans, ideas, and legislative proposals designed to strengthen the antitrust laws and antitrust enforcement.

AMY KLOBUCHAR is the senior senator from Minnesota, the first woman from that state to be elected to the U.S. Senate. She was born in Plymouth, Minnesota, and graduated from Yale University and the University of Chicago Law School. She lives in Minneapolis, MN.


