



Film screening and discussion of "How Saba Kept Singing" with Avi Wisnia, award-winning singer/songwriter

The award-winning documentary film, *How Saba Kept Singing*, shares the story of Cantor, Holocaust Survivor, and Military Veteran, David "Saba" Wisnia z"l, who spends his later years traveling with his grandson and musical accompanist, Avi Wisnia, sharing the story of how he survived the Holocaust through music which the duo perform together. For years, Cantor Wisnia's story centered around the belief that he survived Auschwitz mainly by using his beautiful singing voice to entertain his Nazi captors. These performances in the death camp gave him status as a "privileged prisoner." However, when David takes his family back to Poland for one last performance, Avi starts asking questions and they discover that someone else had a hand in Saba's survival. A powerful and uplifting story about music, faith, family and resilience, proving love can grow and take hold in even the darkest of places.



Avi Wisnia is an award-winning singer/songwriter, finding inspiration in 1950's west-coast jazz, acoustic American folk, Brazilian bossa nova, and contemporary piano pop. "My grandfather was a singer and a Holocaust survivor," Wisnia explains, "and while he wasn't one to really talk about his

emotions, he always spoke through his music, using it to help tell his story. Performing with him helped me find my purpose again. He taught me that we can carry a lot of pain and grief with us and still see the joy and the beauty in life; that it's okay if we are unable to move on from loss, because we can always find ways to move forward with it."

Special Toledo connection: David Wisnia's son, and Avi Wisnia's father, Cantor Eric Wisnia z"l, was Assistant Rabbi at Temple Shomer Emunim from 1974 to 1977. The Jewish Federation & Foundation of Greater Toledo (JFGT) cancellation policy is established to ensure a fair and transparent process for participants who need to cancel their registration for JFGT events. Our primary goal is to accommodate all participants while managing the logistical aspects of each event efficiently. This policy will generally apply to JFGT events unless otherwise stated in connection with the registration for the event.

Policy:

Participants who wish to cancel their registration for any events must do so by 48 hours prior to the event. Cancellations made after this date may result in forfeiture of the registration fee.

To cancel your registration for any event, please send an email to sherry@jewishtoledo.org with the subject line "Cancellation: [Your Name]". Include your full name, registration information, and a brief reason for the cancellation in the email.

Make sure to send the cancellation request before

the 48-hour deadline. Cancellations made on or before the 48-hour deadline are eligible for a full refund of the registration fee.

Cancellations made after the 48-hour deadline may not be eligible for a refund. However, Jewish Federation & Foundation of Greater Toledo may consider exceptional circumstances on a case-by-case basis.

If you are unable to attend any Federation sponsored event after the cancellation deadline has passed, you may nominate a substitute participant at no additional cost. Please notify Sherry Majewski (sherry@jewishtoledo.org or 419-724-0351) of the substitution at least 24 hours before the event.

Participants who do not attend events without providing prior notice will not be eligible for any refunds or substitutions.

If any event is canceled by the Jewish Federation & Foundation of Greater Toledo due to circumstances beyond our control, such as a natural disaster, pandemic, or other unforeseen events, we will make every effort to reschedule. If rescheduling is not possible, participants will receive a full refund of the registration fee. All the Jewish MLB players to watch in 2024

(JTA) — The 2023 MLB season represented a watershed moment for Jewish players and fans, as a record 18 Jewish players appeared in at least one big league game.

That record, topping the previous high of 17 in 2022, is likely to be broken yet again this year.

The new season began in earnest March 28, following a two-game series in Seoul between the Los Angeles Dodgers and the San Diego Padres.

There are plenty of Jewish storylines to keep an eye on: The two best Jewish players in the game — Atlanta Braves pitcher Max Fried and Houston Astros third baseman Alex Bregman are both entering the final year of their contracts. Zack Gelof, the 2023 rookie phenom, looks to continue his ascension in his first full season, while MLB veterans Joc Pederson, Kevin Pillar, Richard Bleier and Rowdy Tellez all suit up for new teams.

The big leaguers

Max Fried, Atlanta Braves, starting pitcher: When Fried, 30, stays healthy, he's one of the best pitchers in baseball. The 2022 National League Cy Young runner-up has a career ERA of 3.03 and has racked up his 62 wins at a historic pace, with a career winning percentage above .700. But Fried, who won three consecutive Gold Glove awards for his defense from 2020-2022, started only 14 games last season while battling a number of injuries. Now, in the final year of his contract, the stakes are high for Fried — a Los Angeles native who grew up idolizing fellow Jewish lefty ace Sandy Koufax.

Alex Bregman, Houston Astros, third baseman: Pegged as a potential future Hall of Famer by some Jewish baseball experts, Bregman, 29, has solidified himself as one of the premier third basemen in baseball, averaging 28 home runs and 99 RBI over his eightyear career. The two-time All-Star and two-time World Series champion has become one of the best postseason hitters of all time (his 19 home runs are tied for fifth all-time), and like Fried, he is entering the final year of his contract. Bregman has been an active member of the Houston Jewish community and has shown support for Israel since Oct. 7, drawing a Star of David on his hat. Joc Pederson, Arizona Diamondbacks, outfielder: After two seasons in San Francisco, the 31-year-old twotime All-Star and two-time World Series champ joins the Arizona Diamondbacks, the defending National League champions and the fifth team of Pederson's career. Pederson, who played a key role for Team Israel in the 2023 World Baseball Classic — both as a player and a recruiter — hit 15 home runs in 121 games last season. He's no longer the elite slugger he was when he crushed 36 homers in 2019, but Pederson remains a solid big-league hitter and veteran clubhouse presence.

Dean Kremer, Baltimore Orioles, starting pitcher: Kremer made 32 starts for the Orioles in 2023, the heaviest workload of his career, posting a 13-5 record with a 4.12 ERA. A California native with Israeli parents, Kremer told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency during last year's WBC that Israel is "like another home." Kremer, who won Israel's lone game in the tournament, against Nicaragua, was the first Israeli ever drafted into the MLB. Kremer also became the first Israeli to start a postseason game last year — just days after Oct. 7 — but the outing did not go well: The righty surrendered six runs in less than two innings as the Texas Rangers swept the Orioles on the way to winning it all.

Zack Gelof, Oakland Athletics, second baseman: Since making his MLB debut last July — which made him the 17th Jewish player of the 2023 season — Gelof, 24, has already cemented himself as one of the league's best second basemen. In just 69 games last season, the rookie hit .267 with 14 homers, 72 hits and 14 stolen bases — earning the Team Israel player a spot in MLB Network's list of the 10 best second basemen entering 2024.

Harrison Bader, New York Mets, outfielder: After parts of two seasons with the New York Yankees - and a brief stint in Cincinnati - the New York native joined the Mets ahead of 2024. Bader, 29, has battled injuries the past couple seasons, which kept him from playing for Team Israel. The 2021 Gold Glove winner spent the first fiveand-a-half seasons of his career with the St. Louis Cardinals. Bader's father, who is Jewish, told the Forward last year that his son is considering formally converting to Judaism. Rowdy Tellez, Pittsburgh Pirates, first baseman: The 29-year-old slugger is joining the Pirates after two-and-a-half seasons with the Milwaukee Brewers. Tellez, who has Jewish as well as Mexican heritage, had considered playing for Israel in the WBC last year but chose to play for Mexico. Tellez will look to regain the thump he had in 2022, when he hit 35 home runs. Garrett Stubbs, Philadelphia Phillies, catcher: As the Phillies' backup catcher, Stubbs, 30, does not play much — he appeared in 46 games in 2022 and 41 last year. But Stubbs still makes his presence known: he has gained a reputation as a beloved clubhouse presence and the life of the party, especially during Philadelphia's postseason celebrations. Stubbs also played for Team Israel in the 2023 WBC, and has already committed to playing for the team again in 2026.

Jake Bird, Colorado Rockies, relief pitcher: Bird, 28, was among the most reliable relievers in the majors last year, appearing in 70 games for the Rockies, tied for seventh-most in the MLB. Bird, who had planned to pitch for Team Israel in 2023 but dropped out due to injury, posted a 4.33 ERA with 77 strikeouts.

Richard Bleier, Washington Nationals, relief pitcher: Bleier, 36, who also played for Team Israel last year, will pitch for his fifth team in his ninth MLB season, joining the Nationals after spending most of last season with the Boston Red Sox. Bleier, who didn't break into the big leagues until he was 29, has a 3.27 career ERA and has enjoyed stretches of dominance: from 2016 through 2018, his ERA stayed under 2.00.

Kevin Pillar, Chicago White Sox, outfielder: The 35-year-old is one of the more experienced players on this list: Pillar has played 1,114 MLB games across 11 seasons with seven different teams. Pillar played in 81 games for the Braves last year, and signed a minor league deal with the White Sox in February. He is expected to make the team's Opening Day roster as a bench/ platoon player. Pillar has embraced his role as a Jewish ballplayer, including by speaking to up-and-coming Jewish derailed his rehab.

The minor leaguers who could see MLB action

There are a number of Jewish players who are set to begin the 2024 season in the minor leagues. Some have played in the MLB before, while others are still eagerly awaiting their first taste of the majors.

Matt Mervis, Chicago Cubs, first baseman: Mervis made his much-anticipated debut last year, but lasted only 27 games before being sent back down the minors. The Team Israel player has prodigious power — Mervis crushed 36 homers in the minors in 2022 and 22 last year. But with the Cubs re-signing star first baseman and outfielder Cody Bellinger, Mervis' path may be even trickier in 2024.

Spencer Horwitz, Toronto Blue Jays, first baseman: Mervis'Team Israel teammate also debuted in 2023 but appeared in only 15 games. Horwitz can hit — in 107 Triple-A games last season, he posted a .337 batting average with 132 hits and 30 doubles.

Jared Shuster, Chicago White Sox, starting pitcher: Shuster entered 2023 as a highly-touted prospect — and even made the Opening Day roster — but he struggled in his first 11 MLB starts with the Braves and was traded to the White Sox during the offseason. He begins 2024 in Triple A.

Kenny Rosenberg, Los Angeles Angels, pitcher: Rosenberg has appeared in 10 games for the Angels over the past two seasons, making four starts. He will start the season in Triple A.

Dalton Guthrie, Boston Red Sox, utility: Guthrie has appeared in 37 MLB games with the Phillies, but spent most of 2023 in the minors. He joined the Red Sox for Spring Training but will start the year in Triple A.

Evan Kravetz, Cincinnati Reds, relief pitcher: The Team Israel pitcher has yet to make his MLB debut, but 2024 could be his year. Kravetz struck out 67 batters in 36 games across Double A and Triple A last season.

Colton Gordon, Houston Astros, starting pitcher: Team Israel pitcher Colton Gordon made 24 starts across Double A and Triple A in 2023, posting a 4.14 ERA with 151 strikeouts in 128.1 innings. The 25-year-old begins 2024 in the minors, but his future seems bright. Chase Strumpf, Chicago Cubs, infielder: Strumpf was considered a top prospect ahead of the 2019 MLB Draft, when the Cubs selected him 64th overall. In 2023, the 26-year-old hit 21 home runs with 66 RBI in 104 games. He begins the year in Triple A alongside Mervis. C.J. Stubbs, Houston Astros, catcher: Garrett's younger brother C.J. is a catching prospect in the Astros organization. Stubbs spent most of 2023 in Double A, where he struggled at the plate — posting a .196 batting average with 132 strikeouts in 95 games. Stubbs played for Team Israel last year, replacing Garrett after an injury. (They **MLB** continued on page 21

Zack Weiss, Minnesota Twins, relief pitcher: After playing for Team Israel last year, Weiss, 31, appeared in only 12 games in 2023, six each with the Los Angeles Angels and the Red Sox. Weiss joined the Twins ahead of this season but is expected to begin the year on the injured list.

Scott Effross, New York Yankees, relief pitcher: Effross's career had gotten off to a stellar start: in his first full season in 2022, Effross, 30, posted a 2.54 ERA with the Chicago Cubs and Yankees. Then, the injury bug bit. Effross, who wears a Star of David necklace on the mound and had planned to play for Team Israel, missed the entire 2023 season after undergoing Tommy John surgery. Effross will now be out until the summer after a back surgery

Email from Israel

January, 2024

The following is an email from the daughter of a woman who was raised in Toledo and now lives in Israel. The writer is a family physician and her children are Ben, Nicole, and Juliet.

To set the scene I want to describe what's been going on here with a few personal examples.

I am seeing patients at my family medicine practice who have been evacuated from the south of the country who lost 20 or so friends on October 7th in the kibbutzim and moshavim. They are living in hotels and have no idea if it will ever be safe enough to return and rebuild their homes. I am also seeing young people who survived Nova (the music festival) and have severe PTSD having witnessed things no one should ever have to experience. And one of my patients was killed age 24 in the army a month ago.

Ben's friend, Naama, is 19 years old and was raped and taken into Gaza (I'm sure you've seen the video) and is still a hostage 103 days later. She was doing the same job in the army that Juliet did, watching the screens and cameras on the border when her base was invaded by terrorists who raped and murdered most of the girls. Her mother is a family doctor in Ra'anana who helped me when I was working in Ra'anana. They have no idea if she is alive or dead or pregnant or sick.

Ami (Nicole's boyfriend) lost ten friends in his army unit on October 7th and went straight back into the army having just finished his six-year service in an elite unit. Nicole's friend Shirel was shot and left for dead at the Nova festival and is still in hospital recovering from a shattered leg. Her other friend survived hiding in a vegetable patch. Oz is in the army reserve duty in Gaza in a tank unit helping to escort the wounded and protect the soldiers and was initially serving up North, sleeping at night in an open field on the border.

Ben is working extremely hard day and night in the army also. And as Mum mentioned our friends' son is in ICU with head and spinal injuries following a car ramming attack in our hometown Ra'anana on his way back from school. His mother is a family doctor also. Ben is best friends with their daughter.

And as I'm writing this, Ben, who is in Jerusalem this evening for a weekend off the army, has sent me a photo of a crime scene he has just walked past at the bus station where a terrorist who stabbed and killed a tourist in Tel Aviv today just arrived in Jerusalem and was killed after pulling out a knife.

Juliet has had to run in the middle of the night down to the one shelter in the basement of her apartment building during rocket attacks and help the young mothers there with their babies. They have 90 seconds to wake them up and get them to the shelter.

I was given a trauma backpack at work this week to have with me in my car containing military grade tourniquets, head flashlight, cannulas for chest drains, pressure bandages, flare sticks "just in case".

Because the beginning of April celebrates the art of practical jokes and pranks, I cannot help but think of my late husband around this time of year. Brad was endlessly entertaining himself and others with funny stories and just plain silly behavior. While he was constantly trying to make our daughters laugh, one of my favorite stories about his humor was one that I heard indirectly from his sister. This story also perfectly illustrates how my late husband found humor in the

most unusual places. While Brad and his two siblings stood by in the hospital waiting area during their mother's orthopedic procedure, Brad felt compelled to joke around and behave in such an absurd manner that it caught the attention of one of the hospital's nurses. Apparently she was so confused by his unusual behavior that she asked this highly educated, specialist physician if he had ever actually been in a hospital before. Though Brad's chosen profession as a Hematologist/Oncologist was one that focused on serious matters of life and death, he managed to find humor in most situations and subsequently helped ease the heavy burden his patients carried.

When Brad died suddenly in August 2020, I can honestly say that finding levity in life was not an easy task. Still, even in the earliest months following his death, I could not help but smile to myself when considering how he might have seen the absurdity of certain events, such as medical recruiters calling our home to make him posthumous job offers. Even before I could fully embrace the idea of finding humor in the midst of my pain, I found myself trying to help my daughters through the use of comedy and laughter. I knew that Brad would have tried to help us cope by incorporating humor so I soon found myself doing the same. In the hopes of making my girls smile, I would remind them of ludicrous things their father said or imitate the farcical dance moves he regularly did to imitate our daughters. Eventually, my girls started to follow suit, cracking jokes and sharing their favorite amusing Dad memories. While tears are still shed in my home when we find ourselves missing him, I imagine many people would be surprised to learn how much my daughters and I laugh during our reminiscences.

I could go on because the list is endless and the stories are endless.

This country is in great pain and it will take a long time to heal. Friends have been to funerals of their kids' close friends.

Wishing for happier peaceful time.

Please let your friends and colleagues know what it really is like here at the moment.

Sending love and hope we can be reunited in happier times.

Knowing how much my family has embraced humor on our path to healing, I highly recommend finding a way to lighten the burden of loss with laughter whenever possible. Recollecting happy memories of your loved one, sharing the inside jokes that connected you to your person, or simply looking through old photos of times spent together may help. No matter the avenue, giving yourself permission to laugh after loss can be a critical part of coping with grief. Sometimes I have found that embracing dark humor has been particularly helpful: like joking with my daughters about how crazy it is that their dad still seems to get more mail than the rest of us. Perhaps the best part of the joke is knowing that Brad would have approved, and been laughing right along with us. In this way, we honor his memory and continue to feel his presence through both our laughter and our tears.

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Modi, a comedian popular with Orthodox crowds, has a new special. He wants non-Jews to watch, too.

(JTA) — In his new comedy special full of jokes about an Orthodox Jewish ambulance corps, DNA test results and an elevator that is configured to accord with traditional Jewish Shabbat observance, comedian Modi Rosenfeld says he hopes plenty of



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non-Jews will tune in.

"I think one of the best ways to end antisemitism is not educating people on what's happening. It's more just — laugh with us," he told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

Much of the crowd at the hourlong special, filmed at New York's Gramercy Theatre last April, appears to be Jewish. But throughout the special Modi, as he's known professionally, continuously picks on one non-Jew in the audience and presents himself as a guide to explain the Jewish unknown.

"For people who are Jewish, it's just a moment to be like, 'Yes, yes, thank God, someone's got it. Yes, this is what we go through and we're laughing at it," Rosenfeld said of

the special. "For people who aren't Jewish, it's literally a portal into the Jewish world through laughter and pride."

Rosenfeld's husband, Leo Veiga, directed the special, which is now available on 800 Pound Gorilla, a comedy distribution and production platform that has carried specials for names like David Cross, Claudia Oshry, Sasheer Zamata and Tim Heidecker.

Adam Grant solo exhibit celebrates 100th anniversary of Toledo artist's work

Jewish Toledo seniors ventured downtown for lunch and a viewing of the Adam Grant Centennial solo exhibit celebrating the 100th anniversary of the world-class, Toledo artist's work from the Grant family private collection at 20 North Gallery.

Born in Warwaw, Poland in 1924, Adam (Grochowski) Grant (z"l) was a survivor of the Nazi concentration camps Auschwitz and Mauthausen, where he used his art to defy his captors - and live. After the liberation, Adam emigrated to the United States in 1950, securing a job with the Palmer Paint Company in Detroit, Michigan, that had begun to produce the nowlegendary Paint By Number kits (invented by Toledoan Dan Robbins). There, Adam met fellow designer and future wife, Margaret "Peggy" Brennan. The couple married shortly before the business was sold to the Toledo-owned Craft Master company. Americanizing his name, the new Mr. and Mrs. Grant moved to Toledo, Ohio, where Peggy managed his fine art career and Adam painted until his death in 1992. 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

Toledo Jewish history project celebrates seven years

Can it really be seven (our lucky Jewish number, "shin") years since we welcomed a hardcover copy of AHistory of the Toledo Jewish Community, 1895-2006 by inviting its author, David Noel (z"l), to Toledo for an inspiring talk and book launch? Mr. Noel's legacy survives.

And thanks to you, our enthusiastic and generous contributors of over 300 documents and photographs showcasing nearly every ethnic group of our growing, vibrant Toledo Jewish community who have settled in our community almost since its beginning, the Toledo Library system has permanently preserved precious and irreplaceable memories.

These memories continue to be transferred, at no expense to our Federation, through the generous agreement made with its former director, Clyde Scoles (z"l), in 2016. You can access them both online and in person through the Local History and Genealogy Department of the Main Library at https://ohiomemory. org/digital/collection/p16007coll33.

When you have time, enjoy perusing through this digital collection of our Toledo Jewish history, and you may be surprisingly delighted to discover familiar, and now unknown, families dating back to our founders, who they were, and how selflessly they formed groups to help to assimilate fellow immigrants, none of whose native tongue was English. For example, the collection includes photo essays relating to the Jewish Education League ("JEL") and the many social work functions it served prior to morphing into the dominant athletic programs of the JCC.

Without the help of more than 100 volunteers and contributors spanning multiple generations and all three current congregational denominations

Congregation Chaim, Etz Congregation B'nai Israel, and Temple Shomer Emunim - our expansive, precious history of our own ancestors' Jewish life from their earliest arrival as

immigrants, up to the present day (and hopefully well into the future), would not exist.

Furthering our project beneficially, but certainly according to a desired plan, was the arrival in 2020 of the devastating Coronavirus. Many community innovative members needing to feel productive during this isolating time of "sheltering in place" started spring (Passover) cleaning early. They literally emptied attics and basements of long-ignored dusty boxes of inherited family memorabilia, too valuable to donate to a landfill but with nowhere else to go.

Because of a 2016 agreement with the Toledo Library System, our Jewish History Project, under the auspices of Jewish Federation of Greater Toledo (JFGT), has been collecting historical Jewish memorabilia from every possible corner of our Toledo area community. The fireproof safes in the archives of the Main Library were ready and waiting to preserve our records. Even better, the library offered to cover the entire cost of preservation. Concurrently, the digital department and its director physically digitized every archived contribution.

In fact, we recently learned that our 300 accepted submissions (and counting) far exceed similar submissions by any other religious or ethnic group also being permanently preserved by the Toledo Library System.

Anyone with access to a computer can now globally access mid-western Jewish life in Toledo, Ohio and environs, from the arrival of its first Jewish settlers following the Civil War until well into the 21st century and into the future.

This project is ongoing, and we continue to solicit your memorabilia, so please contact me at 419-351-5719 (phone/text) or lbjacobs82@ gmail.com. Our Jewish immortality requires L'dor V'ador (the transferring of knowledge and traditions from generation to generation).

The title of the special, "Know Your Audience," is a reference to a principle Rosenfeld, a mainstay comedian in Orthodox circles who frequently performs at charity benefits for Jewish causes, has followed in his own career: Last January, he publicly revealed in an article in Variety that he is gay, but added that he tends not to discuss being gay when performing for Israel's national anthem at the end Orthodox crowds.



Vacation Safety Tips

Now that the weather is changing and school is either on break for spring or summer, it is vacation season for a lot of families. We know that every journey comes with its own set of worries, and the old adage prevention is better than cure rings especially true if you are out to explore. Ensuring some practical safety tips before and while you are on the road might just save you from glitches in your travel plans.

1. Do your research before you **travel.** First rule of safe travel — do not be ignorant about where you are going. Try to learn about the country, the political situation, the cultural norms, the safest spots for travelers, safe accommodations to stay in and the areas or regions that are best avoided. Head off on your trip with your eyes wide open to avoid surprises.

2. Blend in with your surroundings. Once you have done your research, you can start your visit to a new destination as if you were one of the locals. This is not

only sound exploration advice, but a good safety tip as well. You will make yourself more vulnerable to con artists if you stick out like a sore thumb with your massive backpack, two cameras and confused look on your face. and you will draw much less attention if you try to blend in. You also do not want to disrespect or offend with improper dress or manners. If you are visiting places of worship, make sure to dress modestly in order to prevent upsetting the locals.

3. Do not flash your wealth. Whether this is with cash or expensive gear, showing wealth will only make you more appealing to scammers and pickpockets. Carry a dummy wallet with a little cash in it so that you can give this in case you are mugged.

by frequently checking whether your flight has been are a natural worrier or not, do not hesitate to take rescheduled or cancelled. When using bus services, out travel insurance. Not only will insurance cover

make sure to go with trusted companies that have many reviews online. Moreover, try booking your tickets in advance whenever possible, so you do not end up stranded at remote bus stops with no transport in sight. If you are hiring local taxis, agree upon the fare in advance in case the vehicle does not have a meter. Also, carry a map with you to avoid getting lost.

5. Keep your belongings safe. Avoid carrying too many luggage pieces and invest in a small sturdy lock for your luggage. Try to choose one that does not stand out, so it does not appear as if you have something valuable inside. If you have a hand-carry with you, never leave it unattended. Buy wallets that have RFID protection to avoid identity theft.

4. Stay safe on transport. Avoid air travel mishaps 6. Get travel insurance. Regardless of whether you

any unexpected injuries and trips to the hospital, but it can also protect you from theft or loss of personal belongings.

7. Have emergency info at hand. This should entail contact numbers for the local emergency services (police, fire department and ambulance) and for your country's embassy (if there is one in the place you are visiting).

8. Manage your money. If you plan to use your debit and credit cards, make sure to notify your bank in advance that you will be abroad, or you may find your card blocked for suspicious

activity. Research beforehand where are the best spots to exchange your money into local currency as ATMs might be scarce in certain places. When out and about, always carry a small amount of cash with you.

9. Keep track of your health. Make sure to have a supply of any over-the-counter essentials like motion sickness pills, probiotics, pain killers and bug repellants. Consult your doctor and get the proper vaccines before traveling. Ensure that any prescription pills are filled for some days extra than the intended length of your travel.

10. Know how to communicate. Learn the basic emergency phrases like "I need help," "Where is the nearest hospital/police station/embassy?" etc. in the local language.

10 SAFETY TIPS FOR ALL TRAVELERS

There is nothing more enjoyable than exploring new places with your loved ones. However, traveling with your family members, especially if they are children, requires you to consider other kinds of eventualities. Here are a couple of tips for keeping your family travels safe and sound.

- Before you go, make sure you and your children have all the necessary vaccines required for the destination you are traveling to.
- If your children are old enough, get them to learn important emergency contacts and information in case something happens to you, or you cannot find each other.
- Ensure your children are protected with adequate gear (hats, sunscreen, repellents, etc.) when participating in outdoor activities. Bring a stock of gear from home.
- Make sure the food your kids consume during your holidays is cooked, fresh and healthy to avoid stomach bugs. Bring snacks from home as children might be fussy eaters in a new place.
- If you are traveling with small children, pack diapers and other essentials like wet wipes that can last until you arrive at your destination. Research about your destination beforehand to check whether diapers are easily available.
- Have your kids wear contact bracelets with your phone number and other valuable information in case you lose sight of them.

• Bring a small stash of your usual child medicines (such as paracetamol and motion sickness remedies) from home. Do not assume you will find all that you need abroad. Also, always carry a first-aid kit.
